NEW ORLEANS – Brenda Lomax-Brown received the ultimate surprise when television personality Mike Rowe showed up with a film crew to give her a \$20,000 check and a new playground for the ministry to use in the Hollygrove-Dixon neighborhood.

During the August 5 Facebookbased episode of "Returning the favor: A forgotten neighborhood fights back," Rowe, former host of the popular TV show "Dirty Jobs," accompanied Lomax-Brown for a tour of her neighborhood while a team, without her knowledge, built a \$30,000 playground in fewer than four hours near the Life Transformation Center, a ministry of Celebration Church with campuses in the New Orleans area, Baton Rouge and the Northshore.

Rowe then brought Lomax-Brown back for a surprise unveiling. "All day, driving around with

Family members cause a stir at Lakefront CC

CATAHOULA (LBM)--The simple obedience of

one man, by sharing the Gospel in the heart of Catahoula, has reaped a spiritual harvest not experienced before at Lakefront Community Church: seven members of one family were baptized in a single day.

everybody here and many are not church goers," he explained. "When they see an entire family step forward and proclaim their faith in Christ, it leaves an impression with other people in this community. We are just excited about how the Lord is going to move next at our church."

The Gospel seeds were planted in early February when Bowman and Savoie ventured out into downtown Catahoula to distribute Bibles and share the Gospel. Savoie, who is a deacon at Jenkins Memorial Baptist Church in St. Martinville, the sponsor church of LCC, struck up a conversation with Tina Busby and learned she was a believer.

Friendship House to celebrate 75 years of ministry

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) -- Pat Shaffer's childhood memories are filled with recollections about backyard Bible clubs and other special times spent with missionaries who lived at the Baptist Friendship House.

She has not lived in New Orleans since her family moved to Kentucky in 1953. But Shaffer's thoughts are not far removed from the fond times spent there with her parents, Henry and Mildred Stein, who founded the ministry 75 years ago.

2 Louisiana News Skills of a church planter: Create ownership

ALEXANDRIA (LBM) – The Book of Esther is

the account of God's remarkable rescue of the Jewish people from annihilation in a foreign land: A story of intrigue played out by larger-thanlife characters.

The cast includes a beautiful woman, an evil villain and a godly man; and the plot, a man's quest for power,

takes place on the world stage within a power

struggle among nations. There are a number of spiritual lessons embedded within the larger context, but there is a study on "creating ownership" nestled within them that when teased out provides some important insights

on leadership.

A little historical context helps highlight the key points:

-- Assyria had conquered the Northern Kingdom of Israel in 722 B.C. taking captive the 10 tribes of Israel living there.

-- Then Babylon defeated Assyria in 612 B.C. and completed the destruction of Israel by invading Judah three times, ultimately plundering and tearing down the temple in Jerusalem in 586 B.C.,



and deporting the tribe of Judah and the Levites.

-- In 539 B.C. Persia overthrew Babylon, and later when Darius was king, Persia's world conquest was halted by defeat at the hands of the Greeks at Marathon in 492 B.C. Darius returned to Persia and died 6 years later, and his son Xerxes was crowned in 486 B.C., and began raising an army to avenge his father.

This is the setting for the 180 days described in Esther about the exhibiting of the wealth of Persia to impress nobles, officials and military leaders, and it is the background for the seven-day banquet so central to the story in Esther.

Here is the key point: Noted scholars believe the festivities were meant to garner these national leaders' support for the military campaign.

In other words, Xerxes was trying to get his people to "buy in" to his plans for war with Greece.

This concept of "creating ownership" is an important skill spiritual leaders need to develop.

Not through "wining and dining" as Xerxes did, but through sharing the vision, relationship building, goal setting and creating a sense of belonging to something bigger than self.

Xerxes was showing his leaders the benefits of joining him. He was casting the vision for the campaign and offering to share in the spoils. His message was simple, if they would make this vision their vision, victory would result and make them wealthy beyond measure.

President Dwight Eisenhower once said, "Leadership is the art of getting someone else to do something you want

Georgia Barnette helps tell state: Louisiana Baptists are 'Here for you'

ALEXANDRIA (LBM) – In February 2019, the Louisiana Baptist Convention, with help from the Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering, launched a statewide evangelistic media campaign, "Here for You," and people have been responding:

-- "Is there any sin too big for forgiveness?"

-- "How do I get God's peace?"

-- "I want an encounter with God that will change me forever."

"Since April of this year, more than 2,000 people have viewed the Gospel presentation on *Herefor You. org* and 376 of those online visitors have indicated some sort of decision for Christ," said John Kyle, director of communications for Louisiana Baptists.

Springing from a recommendation in the "Final Report" of the LBC President's 2020 Commission, "Here for You" conducted pilot campaigns in three of Louisiana's seven markets prior to the statewide release in February.

"We launched the first pilot in mid-2014 in southwest Louisiana and moved to northeast Louisiana in late 2014 through early 2015," Kyle continued. "Southeast Louisiana was the site of the third pilot campaign which was launched in conjunction with the 10th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina in August of 2015."

According to Kyle, more than 325,000 people saw the Here for You commercials via television broadcasts and cable transmissions during these pilot campaigns. The digital component of the strategy (social media) generated literally hundreds of thousands of delivered impressions and tens of thousands of delivered clicks.

"Here for You' is an attempt to reach people who do not attend anyone's church, and the early results have been encouraging," Kyle shared. "Our first two demographic audiences were young mothers and median-aged men. The research indicates we engaged a large percentage of these audiences and we engaged them often."

Kyle likened "Here for You" to the parable of sower in Mark 4.

"Note that nothing happens until the seed is scattered," said Kyle commenting on the passage. "Visible results take time and, according to verse 27, we don't



fully understand what takes place. This is hard for us to grasp in our instantaneous, information-rich culture.

"Most important, there is a harvest directly related to the seed that was scattered," he continued. "If we're not scattering the seed, we shouldn't be surprised when there is no harvest."

The Georgia Barnette State Missions offering has helped produce every "Here for You" commercial created since its inception in 2014.

"More than likely, there would be no 'Here for You' without the Georgia Barnette Offering," noted Kyle. "If you think about it, what is more missional than going to places and people you typically don't reach? From my perspective, 'Here for You' is missions in one of its purest forms."

It is estimated that more than half of Louisiana's four million residents do not have a relationship with Christ and Kyle believes they can be engaged with the Gospel via efforts such as "Here for You."

"Every major indicator we use to measure our progress in engaging people with the Gospel continues to trend down," Kyle said. "If we're going to reach the people that we all agree need to be reached, we need to leverage current communications platforms to get to places and people we typically don't touch."

> "I want to celebrate everybody who has worked in this ministry," Bennett said.

"Being here for 75 years continuously shows the longevity of the ministry and how important it is to this city. For something to have been here this long reiterates how it is a lighthouse in the community.

We minister to the needs of those who are hurting and share the hope of Jesus with them," she continued. "We as Southern Baptists continue to do such important work here in New Orleans. The Baptist presence has always been to bring care and concern back here to a place known as "The City Where Care Forgot." We look forward to another 75 years, and more, of bringing that hope to so many whose lives have and will be changed."

GOSPEL PURPOSE

In the past 10 years alone, records show the Baptist Friendship House has celebrated 388 new converts, distributed 64,069 Bibles, housed 21,898 homeless individuals, fed 1,301,738 people, and handed out 130,334 pieces of clothing.

Additionally, volunteers have distributed 19,346 backpacks provided by the North American Mission Board Send Relief that were filled with donated supplies for school children, human trafficking victims and homeless individuals and another 44,453 hygiene items. More than 11,400 people have given of their time and talent at the center.

The Baptist Friendship House opened its doors Sept. 29, 1944, at 732 Frenchmen Street under the direction of the Home Mission Board (now North American Mission Board). But on June 1, 1947, the ministry center relocated to its current location, 813 Elysian Fields Avenue.

According to ministry reports from the early years, the Baptist Friendship House held Bible clubs throughout the year and also shared the love of Christ through a Mother's Club, First Aid and home nursing classes, prayer meetings and worship services. The Baptist Friendship House also had a strong relationship with New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and held Bible clubs for up to 130 children of the students and campus staff.

GOSPEL COMMITMENT

Through the years, the ministry center has remained steadfast in its commitment to share Christ's love with the people of the city through Bible classes and clothing and food distribution, Bennett said. But in the last 20 years BFH has expanded its ministry to include sharing Christ's love with homeless women and children and human trafficking victims.

Louisiana has one of the highest rates of homeless children per capita in America, according to the National Coalition for the Homeless. So the Baptist Friendship House, on Aug. 19, 1999, began providing a safe haven for them through transitional housing. Since 2010, more than 200 human trafficking

victims have been provided housing, transportation, counseling, clothing, food, hygiene articles and referrals to outside agencies.

In addition to the meals, snack packs, and hygiene products provided to the New Orleans homeless community daily, BFH also advocates on behalf of human trafficking victims, Bennett said. She also hosts training courses on human trafficking to bring about awareness on the issue.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation recognized the ministry with the 2018 Director's Community Leadership Award during a May 3 ceremony at FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C., honoring the BFH for the rescue of human trafficking victims and for and providing lodging, food and one-on-one counseling to them. The FBI also praised the BFH for partnering with law enforcement to identify potential victims, share

resources and offer options to help human trafficking survivors.

Bennett credited the help of caring individuals and churches, but gave God the glory for the ministry's success.

"There is something special about the Friendship House," Bennett said. "Over the years I have seen Jesus work so many miracles in people's lives. It's right on the edge of the French Quarter. It's been such a joy to see how Jesus changes their lives. It's my little corner of heaven. I've seen Jesus show up and show out. I'm seeing people helpless and hopeless and see them get hope to change their lives.'

you, was an absolute blast," Rowe said in the episode. "And the more I got to know you, the more I thought, 'this really is a woman who will go to city hall and get out the hammer and start making all kinds of trouble.' But we really don't want you to have to do that. We really want to do something for the community, and we really want to thank you for everything you've done so far."

Nearly speechless, the retired Air Force officer gave credit to Christ for the unexpected blessing.

"Oh, Jesus, thank you," she said moments after

seeing the new playground. "Lord, have mercy.

"Keep believing in your dreams because they can become a reality," she finally managed to say.

Since Celebration Church opened the Life Transformation Community Center in 2017, the ministry center has helped improve a community marked with poverty and violence.

Volunteers from Celebration Church and other local charities have provided tutoring and mentoring for children and teenagers, and job and life skills training for adults. The congregation also has spruced up yards,

performed home renovations, cleaned up abandoned lots and helped dismantle abandoned homes.

'The residents will tell you Celebration Church has made quite a difference," Pastor Dennis Watson told the Baptist Message. "We came in to serve and help. People see children, teens and adults being helped on a regular basis by Celebration members -- at the Life Transformation Center and throughout the community. The community has become a safer place and a community that people are now willing to move into. We've been able to help children and teens become better students; and, then we have had adults who have said, "I have hope for my family because of Celebration Church's ef-

experience as a pastor and state mission leader, I have seen firsthand the missional impact of state convention ministries.

Where I served in Kentucky, more than 100 missionaries in the state receive varying levels of support for their work.

Ministries to refugees, migrants and ethnic minorities often are led or assisted by state convention team members and resources.

State conventions help facilitate church planting, church strengthening and revitalization efforts as well as provide evangelism training and coordinate disaster relief ministry. In many states, collegiate work is led by the state convention and support

is also provided for the ministry of local Baptist associations.

One of our adopted daughters was rescued and kept safe by our state convention's orphan and foster care ministry before she came into our family.

The lives of unborn children are being saved by crisis pregnancy centers that are often funded, in part, by the state convention.

Several state conventions are actively involved in lobbying efforts for legislation to protect unborn children from the horror of abortion.

Many state conventions provide training and funding for prison ministries, through which inmates are hearing the Gospel, trusting Christ and being baptized by local churches. Women in the adult entertainment industry are being shown pathways to freedom and salvation,

and churches are equipped for ministry to the homeless and those suffering addiction.

Across America, people are finding new life in Christ as churches work together through their state convention ministries.

EARL HEARD: From LC dropout to media mogul

LEAGUE CITY, Texas (LBM) – When Earl Heard dropped out of Louisiana College in 1962 he could not have imagined that he would be a featured speaker at a Texas A&M leadership symposium in 2014. But his dramatic change of fortune and the 52-year period in between reveal something about his struggles and successes as well as his unyielding drive to succeed.

What is not evident from these bookends to this part of his life story is that he was successful in building his business and media empire only after finally surrendering his all to the Lord.

Now, he spends a good deal of his resources creating faith-friendly books and films in his effort to promote greater faith and to support healthy, growing families.

HARD LESSONS

Heard's departure from Louisiana College was set in motion while he was on semester break, when a roommate's brother robbed the school bookstore and then hid the ill-gotten textbooks in Heard's room.

Neither Heard nor his

roommate knew anything about the theft. But when the student body returned to campus, the discovery of the books put the thief, his brother and Heard under suspicion.

"We got back up there and were guilty by association. I learned to choose my friends more carefully after that," Heard told the Baptist Message.

"I went to Louisiana College with the idea of becoming a teacher. That didn't work out," he said about his two years at the school. "But God had another plan for my life."

"Making God, family and friendship priorities, instead of seeking fame and fortune at any cost, is the key to greater peace, happiness and success," he said, summarizing lessons learned from the whole of his personal journey.

But, at that time God was not his priority.

He had grown up in a Louisiana Baptist home, but had enrolled at Louisiana College largely to be with a girlfriend, he said.

"I had accepted Christ at an early age," he shared. He also went to church, "but only to please my parents." However, although he did

not share his parents' deep

faith back then, he did absorb the lessons they taught him about entrepreneurship and hard work.

After leaving Louisiana College, he toiled as a bricklayer and carpenter, earned a refinery position that led to his promotion to general foreman; and, he developed such expertise, particularly in fire safety, that he was made a training coordinator. Eventually his experiences in developing safety training resources led him in 1980 to step out on his own to create a business to service training needs in the energy sector.

HARD TRUTHS

Despite seemingly endless hours and endless miles in effort, his safety films were not a financial success. But, in 1981 he also had started the first petroleum industry training magazine, a venture that showed signs it was about to take off.

Yet he wanted to save his original business effort, because "I had put every-

thing I had into it," he said. "All my retirement money – everything -- was in it," he explained.

Then, despite his wife Bodi's urging against it, he took out a mortgage on their home.

"She told me, 'Look I love you, but you're not making God number one. You're not making your family number one; and, if you lose our home I am going to leave you.'''

"Well, that's what happened," Heard confessed. "I lost everything."

RENEWED RELATIONSHIPS, REALIZED DREAMS

During this time Heard

made a commitment to rebound from his financial straits as well as the spiritual and personal poverty of his own making.

"I vowed I would restore my relationship with God, my family and friends," he recounted.

He leaned on friends and worked several jobs to settle debts and raise seed money to start over.

He also made time to focus on prayer and reading the Bible.

Then, taking inspiration from the magazine he had previously developed, in 1984 he launched **Business and Industry** Coordinator. now BIC Magazine, a multiindustry trade publication that touches multiple professional disciplines.

Importantly, Bodi showed signs that she still cared for him, supporting him in his earnings and tips as a

hair stylist.

By 1987 he had shown her enough change in his priorities, she remarried him, and together they began building BIC Magazine into the premier journal in the energy sector, reaching 120,000 readers in print and online.

But God has given them favor in other areas of media and business, too, allowing them to build a conglomerate known as BIC Alliance that includes BIC Recruiting (matching proven professionals with key industry positions), BIC Media Solutions (which produces inspirational, family-friendly books and movies) and IVS (a mergersand-acquisitions intermediary company, formerly known as Ind-Viro Marketing), along with the original BIC Magazine.

Heard was emphatic to credit his daughter and sonin-law, too.

'Our success as a Christian company is due in no small part to Thomas and Dane [Brinsko]," Heard offered. "He joined us in 1999 and they have been instrumental to growing the

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Heard expressed gratitude for God's patience with him on his life journey.

'I've been married 52 years and I've got a wonderful wife, one daughter and three grandkids," he said. 'My core business has grown more than I could have imagined and my investment bank, in just 18 transactions, has exceeded my greatest expectations.

'I always said that when I was financially able, I would start publishing faith-friendly materials, not to make money, but to change lives," Heard continued. "My wife is just as passionate as I am to change the world through media that is inspirational and family-friendly -- books, movies, networking events, and TV shows."

In that regard, Heard has produced "Gift Horse" starring John Schneider, in 2013, and "Urban Country" featuring Lou Diamond Phillips, in 2017. There also is a series of testimonial videos under the title "Rock Bottom and Back" that are moderated by Danny Trejo.

Heard also has written or otherwise published 13 books, including one for children, "Michael Learns to Listen."

'It's really become my passion," he said of his publishing and producing endeavors.

But perhaps none of his works reflects Heard's passion more than his first book, "It's What We Do Together That Counts," which he is re-releasing in celebra-

"It is our life story -- how we started, how I was a believer but not a follower and how my life changed and how now I've got more faith, and, even at my age, still growing in my faith. It also focuses on the power of networking," Heard said, explaining he defines the concept as "getting together so everyone can get ahead."

But to fully understand what he means by "together," readers need to pay attention to his inscription on one of the front pages:

'This book and the life about which it is written are dedicated to a loving and forgiving God, who has given me the strength to overcome adversity through faith, hard work and perseverance."

He went from Louisiana College dropout to business and media mogul, together with God.

done because he wants to do it."

That is the essence of "creating ownership."

"Creating ownership" works in parallel with the leadership skills of vision casting and instilling intrinsic motivation. Its beginning may be as simple as engaging someone in ministry activity with the goal of moving them to greater ministry involvement.

The leader creates ownership by providing followers with the vital information and training needed to complete a task -- while also giving them the freedom to complete the task and requiring them to accept responsibility for the results.

Followers need the freedom to improvise, or do it in their own way as long as their way does not compromise or jeopardize the outcome. Likewise, they must also bear the responsibility for success or failure -and sometimes you have to let them fail and make them own the outcome.

This process helps to develop followers into new leaders.

However, giving ownership requires more than just "dangling a carrot" in front of someone to get them moving in the right direction. The crunchy treat might work to get a horse to pull the wagon, but it does not cause the horse to take ownership of the wagon.

Creating ownership might involve "dangling the carrot" of ministry, initially, but eventually it requires followers to transition from such external rewards to "taking charge" as motivation.

Dennis Watson, senior pastor of the Celebration Church in New Orleans, is one of the best practitioners of this skill as anyone I know.

He oversees eight campuses and ten pastors who guide thousands in worship and ministry each week.

The campus pastors get thorough training in all of the vital areas of their work, and are given some latitude to "do it their own way." But in transferring ownership to them, Pastor Watson also holds them accountable for a positive outcome in spiritual growth. If the outcome is not satisfactory, he corrects, encourages and coaches his staff to be successful.

Breaking it down, you will find that when a person is well-informed and adequately trained, and is given freedom but also held accountable, he or she will grow as a leader and take ownership of the assigned task.

Your team will always

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need encouragement and coaching, and there are some structural and process issues that will be addressed in the next article.

But "creating ownership" will go a long way to building a team that is an extension of you and help you expand your ministry.
