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# First Kenner congregation gives big to fix lda damage

KENNER, La. (LBM) -Members of First Baptist Church, Kenner, recently accepted a God-sized challenge and raised, in one day, much of the \$450,000 deductible needed to repair the worship center damaged by Hurricane Ida.

By the end of the Dec. 12 worship service, members had raised \$367,361 that, when combined with another \$80,000 given from the New Orleans Baptist Association and Louisiana Baptist Convention, provided enough to begin renovations.

Interim Pastor Reggie Ogea, who also is a professor at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, said he was amazed that 71 families stepped out in faith and committed to help their church rebuild.

"I am still astounded, and the folks are, too," Ogea told the Baptist Message. "When you consider that many of our families were still struggling themselves to make repairs to their own homes after Ida, they truly gave sacrificially. They have a strong sense that God is about to do something."

# First Lafayette prayed for revival, 56 baptized!

LAFAYETTE, La. (LBM) – Pastor James Pritchard knew God could do something miraculous when he

scheduled a four-day revival for February, but was amazed, nonetheless, when 56 baptisms took place during the final night of the revival meeting at First Baptist Church, Lafayette.

A crowd of more than 900 cheered as individuals from 6 to 95 years old stepped either into a horse trough or the baptistery inside the worship center to symbolize death,

burial and resurrection with Christ,

What happened was the answered prayer of what we hoped the Lord would do," Pritchard told the Baptist Message. "When He showed up like that, all we could say was 'God showed up, look what God

# Local youth saved from sex-trafficking scheme

JONESVILLE, La. (LBM)-- When 19-year-old Daniel Bordelon of Jonesville, Louisiana, agreed to travel to Ohio with two men he had met in an internet chat room, he had no idea what was awaiting him.

Bordelon, a Louisiana Baptist pastor, did, and he launched a rescue mission for his son from what the elder Bordelon described as a "sex-trafficking abduc-

The rescue, which the elder Bordelon described as miraculous, began on Feb. 8, when a text from Daniel to his mother, Cindy, revealed he was riding in a vehicle to Alexandria along LA 28 bound for the Alexandria International Airport with two men, and that he was scared.

Upon learning of his son's situation, Bordelon, pastor of Clayton Baptist Church, Clayton, and owner of Emile Bordelon Transport, Jonesville, im-

mediately took to social media to call upon everyone to pray for his son. He also contacted Catahoula Parish Sheriff Toney Edwards who launched law

enforcement efforts in the rescue operation.

Hours later, Bordelon believes, a miracle oc-

# Mission Builder's Shumock to retire

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – For the last five years, Mike Shumock has helped restore numerous Louisiana Baptist churches as Gospel mission centers by leading the rebuild or repair of their facilities.

Shumock is set to retire Feb. 28 as the mission builder strategist for Louisiana Baptists, but his calling to help churches with construction projects is far from over.

"I realize God gifts everyone," Shumock told the Baptist Message. "God gifted me to build and use my hands and come alongside and work with people in need. It's satisfying to know without a doubt people who needed help rebuilding were able to fulfill that through the efforts of myself and so many volunteers who had a common love and that is to help others in Jesus' name.'

### **CALLED**

Shumock's journey began in 1974 at Wade Baptist Church, Moss Point, Mississippi, when he realized he was a sinner and needed to surrender his life to Jesus. A year later, he accepted the call to

ministry and became the church's youth minister.

For the next four decades, Shumock combined his passion for construction with a love for minis-

Shumock worked for several construction companies in the early 1980s, before he pastored his first church, Valley View Church, Eagle River, Alaska (1984-1990). He also served as pastor of two other churches: Bellevue Baptist Church, Hattiesburg, Mississippi (1990-2002), and East Fork Baptist Church, Kentwood (2009-2016).

During his time at the three churches, Shumock oversaw their respective building projects: adding a worship center and education wing at Bellevue Baptist; remodeling the fellowship hall and kitchen at Bellevue Baptist; and renovating the worship center and fellowship hall at East Fork Baptist.

In August 2016, Shumock received a request from Louisiana Baptist Missions and Ministries Director John Hebert to recruit volunteers to rebuild churches and pastors' homes that had sustained significant damage from a historic flood in southern Louisiana.

As much as two feet of rain fell within 48 hours on parts of East Baton Rouge, Livingston and St. Helena parishes during Aug. 12-13, 2016, in what was

curred, when the plane bound for Ohio from Alexandria was mysteriously delayed, allowing just enough time to catch up with Daniel and bring him safely home.

### THE DECEPTION

Although the drama culminated on Feb. 8, the nearly tragic event was set into motion months earlier when Daniel joined a chat room called "Discord."

"This is how innocent teenagers can easily be caught up in the human trafficking trap," Emile said. "Like all parents wanting to allow their children to have a little freedom and privacy, we did so without checking on him. We trusted Daniel would use good judgment and we trusted he would rely on the moral values we had taught him."

Unfortunately, like many teens today, Daniel felt more comfortable finding friends and confiding in them in these chat rooms than talking with his mom or dad. It's an all-too-familiar trend today.

"Discord' is the chat room that Daniel got into, and he was talking to numerous people," his dad said. "They tricked him into believing he was living in an abusive environment. He was told he did not have to follow any rules or submit to any disciplinary conduct.

"They told him he shouldn't have any responsibility and they could offer him a better lifestyle," said Emile Bordelon.

"These are professional con artists," he said. "In today's internet world, teenagers want to be liked and they want as many followers as they can get, and these con artists knew exactly what to say to Daniel to convince him to trust them."

Bordelon said as time went on, the predators continued to chat with his son, urging him to move to Ohio to live with them, promising a life free from all the rules of his parents.

"After Christmas, they really began to pressure him into moving there with them," he continued.

"Daniel has been raised to be honest and to believe people are also honest, but he is also gullible and be-

lieves what folks tell him."
According to his dad, the Ohio men promised
Daniel a house to live in and even sent him a picture as proof. They offered him an allowance and a life

where he could play video games all day long with no responsibilities. They even told Daniel he could bring his two pet cats with him. The invitation was so alluring Daniel finally agreed.

"So, these men flew to Alexandria on that Tuesday, purchased return flight tickets for themselves and Daniel, rented a car at the airport, and drove to T-Town (a small gas station named Texaco Town near the intersection of LA 28 and US 84 close to the LaSalle/Catahoula parish line) where Daniel met them," his dad said. "They even brought along two pet taxis to place his cats in so he would feel comfortable."

### THE 'ABDUCTION'

Daniel voluntarily got

into the car with the men but as they headed to Alexandria, he became scared and sent a text to his mom.

"He told her he had left his truck at T-Town with the keys locked in it and that's when we knew something bad was happening," Emile said. "Cindy notified me, and I quickly went there and found the

Leslie Hale was among the first to be baptized. During the first revival session, Feb. 6, Hale was convicted of her need to come forward and declare her faith in Christ.

"It was like someone was pushing me forward that morning and I was obedient," Hale said. "Once I came out of the baptismal waters, I felt completely clean. Seeing so many people baptized is something that is hard to describe, and I can't wait to see what the Lord does with all of us who participated in baptism."

### **PRAYED**

Pritchard recognized that for the Holy Spirit to move, the congregation needed to enter focused times of prayer ahead of the revival meetings. During a 40-day period prior to the first revival service, more than 300 members participated in times of prayer and fasting. Pritchard also

led the church in focused prayer moments during Sunday morning and Wednesday evening prayer services in January and February.

And, on the Wednesday evening before the revival, Adult Sunday School classes organized on-campus to hold "cottage prayer meetings."

ings."

"We can do all the planning we want to do, and it can come to nothing," Pritchard said. "So, we knew for us to have any type of success we had to be praying. Revival starts with church people and if you don't have that then you can't expect soul winning to take place.

"We put up the sails, but it was up to Him to make the wind blow," he continued. "He honored the work, prayer and faithfulness of the church and brought a great victory. We are basking in the glow of what He did."

Wednesday.

Pritchard said his members became more excited as each night passed and believes the best is yet to come for his faithful congregation.

"The revival was successful because it got our people praying, serving and inviting lost friends to church," Pritchard said. "And it got our people excited about

the Great Commission. The week of revival really was 'the cherry on top' because, while preparing for the revival, the Lord changed the hearts of our people, and that resulted in the renewal of our church. What a revival does to a church—it says 'If God can do this, what's next? What else can He do and what else can we try?"



summer sharing God's love through what is the largest evangelistic outreach of the year for many congregations.


Churches in which the teams conduct a VBS normally have low baptisms and would have trouble coordinating such an event without the help of the GOLA VBS team.

### **REVIVE US**


Lane Moore, NLBA director of missions, reminded the crowd of the need for revival.



the present God longs for His children to abide in Him. Drawing from Psalm 22:3, McInturf said that "abiding in Him" starts with each believer preparing his or her own heart.

Thomas Myles, pastor of New Birth Baptist Church, Shreveport, encouraged unity among believers who are part of the Church.

"God is in the building business," said Myles, drawing from 1 Corinthians 3:16. "He's not concerned about specific architectural styles or floor plans, but rather He is concerned about constructing great things in His people and building great things by His people.


Leading music will be Jon Reddick, a worship pastor and song writer.



Chitwood cited improved giving through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering as well as the Cooperative Program as evidence that support for international missions is growing. According to the imb.org statement, for the first four months of the current fiscal year:

-- LMCO gifts are up 16.1 percent compared to the same timeframe last year.

-- CP gifts are up almost 10 percent for the same referenced period.

-- Overall, combined revenue from all sources is

running 13.6 percent ahead of the previous year's pace.

Despite the financial windfall, field missionary numbers continued to remain about the same as the 1985 tally of 3,597, although

up from the nearly four decades low of 3,485 missionaries who were on board at the end of the first year of

the pandemic.


In reply to an inquiry from the *Baptist Message*, Julie McGown, IMB's assistant vice president for communications, shared that there were "3,507 fully

funded IMB field personnel" at the end of January 2022.

Personnel numbers vary month-to-month. However, numbers have lulled since the departure of 983 missionaries from the field and 149 stateside personnel under David Platt, during 2015-16, when missionaries who were 50 years old with five years of experience were targeted for early exits while IMB was still commissioning new missionaries. Platt also closed the Richmond communications office of 30 writers and photographers.

Meanwhile, McGowan shared information indicating the Richmond support staff numbers had largely recovered from the losses under Platt. Prior to the large-scale field personnel reduction stateside support persons numbered about 450, according to a

# NAMB dealt another legal setback in McRaney lawsuit

ALPHARETTA, Ga. (LBM)—In January, the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Mississippi denied the request of the North American Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention for a summary judgment in its lawsuit with Will McRaney, the former executive director of the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware.

In his ruling, Senior Judge Glen H. Davidson said it was premature to decide the case ahead of the discovery process, the stage during which McRaney's legal team would be allowed to depose NAMB leaders, staff and trustees under oath.

Subsequently, in February, NAMB entered into a stipulation agreement with McRaney, pledging "it will not withhold any discovery responses on the basis of its First Amendment defenses or objections, including in response to discovery requests served by [McRaney] prior to the date of this Stipulation."

Judge Davidson's decision is consistent with the instructions by a three-

judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals (later affirmed by the full bench), who rejected NAMB's request to dismiss the case, finding instead that "many of the relevant facts have yet to be developed" in the case.


The federal circuit court sent the case back to the federal district court instructing the lower court to determine (1) whether NAMB intentionally and maliciously damaged McRaney's business relationships by falsely claiming that he refused to meet with [NAMB President Kevin] Ezell, ... (2) whether NAMB's statements about McRanev were false, defamatory, and at least negligently made, ... and (3) whether NAMB intentionally caused McRaney to suffer foreseeable and severe emotional distress by displaying his picture at its headquarters ...." These are among McRaney's claims about NAMB's alleged interference with the BCM/D, which he says contributed to his departure from that independent state organization of

Baptist churches.
The federal district court ruling against

NAMB followed a snub by the U.S. Supreme Court, which declined to hear

NAMB's appeal of the ruling by the federal circuit court of appeals.





# Louisiana Drug Board rejects recreational pot

BATON ROUGE La. (LBM)—The Drug Policy Board within the Louisiana Office of the Governor has adopted a resolution stating it "opposes efforts to legalize marijuana for recreational use in Louisiana."

The January 27 vote was 8-0-6, a reversal of the 6-0-8 vote by the Board in October.

The minutes from the January meeting indicate that during the interim Warren Montgomery, district attorney for St. Tammany and Washington Parishes and the sponsor of the resolution, had opportunities to make presentations to the Louisiana Board of Pharmacy and the Louisiana Highway Safety

Commission,
whose representatives on the Drug
Policy Board had
abstained in the October vote because their
organizations had not
spoken to the
issue.

Their representatives voted in favor of the resolution in January.

The vote took place as smoking pot and consuming THC, the psychoactive compound in marijuana, became legal in Louisiana in January if a licensed Louisiana physician "recommends" either as "therapeutic use by any patient clinically diagnosed as suffering from a debilitating medical condition," which includes 31 specific or broad categories.



### **COLORADO'S REMORSE**

Meanwhile, Colorado, which legalized medical marijuana in 2010 and recreational marijuana in 2014, passed historic legislation last year, H.B. 21-1317, to create a scientific review council to make recommendations to address the surging public health crisis in the

state due to marijuana, especially the dramatic rise in psychotic and suicidal victims.

Public health expert, Dr. Chris Rogers, medical director of child and adolescent services at the Medical Center of Aurora, Colorado, testified before the Colorado legislature that person after person was being duped about the effects of pot.

"They've been taught to believe this is a harmless plan and a medicine that is good for everything from headaches to cancer to anxiety – [that] it's natural, without side effects without the risk of addiction. This s the lie that is ruining the lives of far too many people in our state."

Colorado Attorney General Philip J. Weiser, a Democrat, blamed medical marijuana laws for a "rise in teenage use of high-potency concentration THC marijuana" that he described as "alarming." He cited a statewide survey showing student use of THC leapt from 4.3 percent in 2014 to more than 20 percent in 2019.

### LOUISIANA'S FUTURE?

If so, the Colorado situation would suggest a potential disaster looms for Louisiana youth because of the legalization of so-called medical marijuana this year. Already high school students in the state lead their peers in the nation in alcohol use and the injection of illicit drugs, according to national data compiled by ProjectKnow.com. They only rank 14 out of 50 in marijuana use, for now.

truck. What I feared the most – a sex-trafficking abduction -- was happening."

After contacting Sheriff Edwards, the sheriff dispatched deputies and detectives to T-Town where they reviewed the video surveillance and obtained a vehicle description and physical description of the men involved. The information was immediately forwarded to other law enforcement agencies.

A short time later, Daniel and the men were discovered in a car rental parking lot at the Alexandria airport and after a combined group of area officers intervened, Emile was able to bring his son safely home.

Because Daniel is 19 years old and voluntarily went with the men, no charges were filed, and no one was arrested.

### A HAPPY ENDING

Still. Emile was thankful his son had been rescued.

"I can't say enough about how wonderful Sheriff Edwards and his department were and all the law officers involved," he said. "It was due to their fast thinking, great training, and quick response that this story had a happy ending.'

While Emile gave a lot of credit to law enforcement officers, he gave the most praise to Almighty God.

"When we knew what was taking place, I put it out on Facebook and a prayer chain began across denominations," he said. "Folks began to pray, and God began to work – there is just no other explanation. God answered our prayers and brought our son safely back to us."

He credits those prayers for causing the plane delay that allowed officers to get to Daniel just in time.

"According to statistics, sex trafficking is at its highest percentage during Super Bowl week," he said. "I know that people reading this will say it will never happen to them, but


the truth is it can. "I realize many parents raise their children to do things properly, know right from wrong, but please, please be aware of your teenagers' activities, especially online," he continued.

'There are many signs that we need to be aware of and these chat rooms are the perfect opportunity for these predators to lure our teenagers into believing they can offer them a better lifestyle," he said. "While not all chat rooms are bad, parents should still take time to check them out."

Tradewell chose LCU after attending a preview day in 2020. Brewer shared about the importance of critical thinking among students and how


he desired for students to grow in their faith while achieving academic success.

transition since Ogea became interim pastor in April 2021. The congregation recognized the need to revitalize, and on June 27 voted to become the fourth member of First Baptist Church, Covington's network of churches.

The move allows the two churches to work together in ministry to reach the south shore region of Lake Pontchartrain for Christ. FBC Kenner, which averages between 175-180 worshipers for Sunday morning worship, joins Metairie Church, Metairie Korean Church and Hope Church, Bush, in this effort.

The partnership is unique from the others, with FBC Kenner remaining autonomous – meaning it retains a senior pastor and receives revitalization support from FBCC.

### **FUTURE VISION**

Just two months after

described as a "1,000-year" rain event in these areas ac-

cording to the Lower Mississippi River Forecast Center. Other parishes saw a two-day rainfall determined to be a "100-year" event — these included Tangipahoa, East Feliciana, Washington, Ascension, Lafayette, Iberville and St. Martin.

The result of the two-day inundation was historic flooding in southern Louisiana with tens of thousands of homes and hundreds of thousands of people impacted, including more than 60 Louisiana Baptist churches and the houses of at least 20 Louisiana Baptist pastors.


A year later, Shumock became the mission builder strategist and coordinated 16 projects while serving in that position.

Construction on the multi-purpose facility is expected to begin in early February, and the move is being facilitated by a friendly relationship

St. Francis

will allow the congregation to continue meeting where they are until the new campus is completed, estimated to be ready by Easter 2023.

"I'm excited about the church's decision," Doughty said. "We told our members that the church isn't a building, it's the people. The thing that has excited me through this process is to see the church embody that in the vote. Their excitement about moving forward reminds me that God is not done with us at First Monroe."

"I think our country needs to hear the Word of God," Harrigill said. "Our people are pointing folks to Jesus and letting them know how they, too, can have a relationship with Him."




