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LOUISIANACHURCHES Richey Baptist restored and more after fire

DEVILLE, La. (LBM) – A fire damaged the worship center at Richey Baptist Church, Deville, in January 2021, leaving the congregation of 80 seeking God's help to rebuild their facility.

Fifteen months later, their prayers were answered in even greater ways than the congregation ever could have imagined, according to their pastor, Grady Dodge.

Dodge told the Baptist Message he was encouraged so many churches stepped up to assist in the rebuild, modeling the body of Christ.

"When the fire happened, I thought it was the end of the world," said Dodge, also the Louisiana Baptist Building maintenance supervisor. "God showed me so much through it. He showed me unity in the community and unity in the churches."

The fire began at 11 a.m., Jan. 9, 2021, and engulfed the worship center. Fire

crews from Effie and Ruby-Kolin extinguished it later that same evening. While most of the worship center was destroyed,


a steeple and Bible located near the front doors miraculously survived.

Rather than fold, the church, pressed forward with the insurance company paying half of the \$700,000 needed to rebuild, and churches and individuals from around the state donating the remainder.

During construction, the church worshipped in the fellowship hall, which had not been damaged.

LAFAYETTE (LBM) -- Pastor John Fream said Cypress Baptist Church has several "non-negotiable" practices they use in their mission to reach Benton and beyond for Jesus Christ.

Fream, during the ReGroup Sunday school training conference at First Baptist Church, Lafayette, Aug. 6, said his members at Cypress Baptist preach and live out the Word of God, are soul winners, follow the Great Commandment and use Sunday school, worship and big events to draw others to Christ.

Fream was the keynote speaker for ReGroup that focused on restrengthening discipleship efforts. The conference included breakout sessions for pastors/staff/key leaders; preschool, children, youth and adult leaders.

Focusing on four areas – sharing the Gospel, developing biblical community, helping believers mature spiritually, and equipping believers to live missionally – the conference emphasized how to maximize your Gospel impact.

Since he became a pastor 14 years ago, Fream has seen Cypress Baptist grow from 450 in Sunday worship to 2,600; and each Sunday since January his congregation has baptized new believers, totaling 173 to date. Fream said he reminds his members they are on mission to share the Gospel wherever they go.

"Life's too short," he said. "The world is too lost. We believe passionately that everyone can be saved.

"The Gospel is power-

ful," he continued. "Use it. It changes lives."

Fream shared how he accepted Christ in 1991 during an Easter Sunday service -- after accepting his wife's invitation to attend worship. He said a personal invitation is powerful and can go hand-in-hand to draw others to events where the Gospel is presented.

"We are going to use our events to get people to come to worship and Sunday school," Fream said. "If we can get them coming to church, they can hear the Gospel. We will do whatever we can to get them there -- as long as it doesn't compromise." An estimated 320

celebrated with a special service that included a baptism.

Dodge said the congregation has experienced growth from 80 in Sunday worship prior to the fire to more than 100 for the dedication of the new building.

Since April 3, Dodge has baptized four individuals, including Daisy Lachney, 17, who celebrated a spiritual rebirth three months after a heart transplant.

Upon the invitation of her friend, Jasmine Gunn, Lachney attended the grand opening service and was convicted of her need for baptism. She had accepted Christ several years earlier but not followed through with baptism.

The two friends decided to be baptized together on Easter Sunday, April 17.

"At that moment I felt like this pressure had been lifted off me," Lachney said. "I now feel so free."

Moving forward, Dodge said he is anticipating an even greater movement from God and is thankful for how so many came together to help restore the worship center.

'God has brought a revival in our church and His spirit has moved," he continued. "God has a purpose in the church. When the church was on fire, that's when the

people caught fire and went to work doing God's work and pulled together. That's when unity came."

PELICAN POINT, Bahamas (LBM) – Louisiana Baptists, community leaders, and Bahamian officials were among those who gathered at St. Matthew Baptist Church, July 24, to dedicate rebuilt facilities on a campus that had been leveled by Hurricane Dorian in 2019.

Louisiana Baptists John Hebert (missions and ministry team director), Stan Statham (disaster relief strategist) and Reggy Saxon (disaster relief volunteer) were among more than 220 guests, leaders and officials who gathered inside the 4,655-square-foot multi-purpose facility to celebrate the completion of three years of work. The building features a new worship center, covered driveway, restrooms, library, pastor's office and choir room.

During the dedication, church leaders thanked Louisiana Baptists for the prayers, financial support and numerous volunteers who steadfastly labored despite having faced multiple hurricanes, severe flooding, and ice storms, themselves.

The church also recognized the efforts of Gibbie McMillan, who was instrumental in organizing the rebuild.

McMillan, the former LBDR strategist, passed away in August 2021 due to complications from COVID-19.

"The rebuilding of the church is a perfect example of how the disaster relief ministry is used by God to bring help, hope, and healing to those impacted by disasters," Statham told the Baptist Message. "The community began to rebuild only after the church started to rebuild."

Hebert said the rebuild has been an encouragement to the community to press forward on the reconstruction of their own homes that were damaged by Dorian.

"It was only after the rebuilding of St. Matthews was well underway that people in the community started rebuilding their own homes," Hebert said. "When they saw this work, they believed they could make a comeback. It's always a blessing when the church represents that kind of hope.



It was literally a physical manifestation of the hope of the Gospel."


Saxon, who participated in seven rebuild trips at the church, was grateful for how God worked throughout the project. "We could see the





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hand of God from day one," said Saxon, a member of Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles. "Our people just rolled up their sleeves and went to work, even though they were dealing with our own weather-related problems. Every time we had an obstacle, God provided."

Louisiana is among several states participating in 'Bahama Rebuild,' a partnership with the International Mission Board and North American Mission Board SEND **Relief. Since December** 2019, Louisiana and Mississippi Baptists have sent numerous teams each to rebuild the church while the Baptist state conventions of Alabama and North Carolina have deployed teams to undertake other projects on the islands.

St. Matthew Baptist is one of nine Baptist churches (there are a total of 13 Baptist churches on the island) severely damaged or destroyed by the storm that packed 185-mile per hour winds at the height of Hurricane Dorian on Sept. 2, 2019.

Archer to lead South Carolina WMU

ALEXANDRIA (LBM) – Louisiana Baptists' Children and Youth Education Strategist Jess Archer has been named the new executive director and treasurer for the South Carolina Baptist Convention Woman's Missionary Union.

Archer will join the staff Oct. 24 and will assume her new role Jan. 1, 2023. She will follow Laurie Register, who retires Dec. 31 after serving South Carolina's WMU for more than 29 years (including 14 of those as executive director-treasurer).

'I am eternally grateful to the Lord for calling me by name to this new position," Archer told the Baptist Message. "And I am ready to see what God has in store for South Carolina Woman's Missionary Union.

A graduate of Nicholls State University in Thibodaux and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, Archer has spent the last eight-and-ahalf years helping women and young people develop a deeper passion for missions.

During her time with the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Archer has served on the Women's Missions and Ministry team to catalyze mission's education through WMU for preschool, children and youth in the state's Baptist churches.

She also has trained countless leaders of all ages in local associations and churches and planned statewide camps and events such as Missions Jamboree, Louisiana Girls in Action, Royal Ambassadors, Children in Action, M-NOW, a mission's event for Louisiana youth, and numerous children ministry events.

Archer said she has enjoyed watching more youngsters embrace a missions lifestyle, which was reflected in the growth of summer mission's camps that have been sold out every year since 2019 (COVID-19 safety concerns canceled the 2020 camp season).

In 2018, mission's camps traditionally held separately for boys and girls combined into one and drew more than 375 boys and girls. A year later, attendance increased to 425. And in 2021 and 2022 an additional missions camp was added with an attendance of 500 and 600, collectively.

Looking to her new role, Archer expressed gratitude for the opportunity she has had to serve Louisiana Baptists. 'The Lord's given me a

was scared of what people would think. But the family I have become a part of at 'The Creek' was nothing but supportive. I have never felt more loved and uplifted in my life.'

Pruyn is one of 25 students and young professionals at Sandy Creek Baptist Church who have decided to follow Christ in 2022.

Seventeen of those were baptized July 17 (the most the church has baptized in one service) and seven are awaiting baptism. Additionally, five new believers who are not youth or young professionals have been baptized since January in a church that averages 225 in Sunday worship.

Most of the decisions have camp (attended by 95 students) in Pensacola, Fla., June 27-July 1, and at Wednesday night student worship.

'It's been cool to hear students say the most genuine prayers as they talked with another adult individually about their desire to follow Jesus," Youth Pastor James Daniel Schopp said. "Those students have then gone out and invited their friends to our Wednesday meetings, where they heard and accepted Christ. Even the parents are coming on Wednesdays and have started to share Jesus with their families, friends and co-workers."

Not only have students been baptized, but many have grown deeper in their relationship with Jesus through a greater emphasis on discipleship.

Each week, the students meet in homes for Bible study (one for males and another for females).

The students also participate in accountability groups of five (30 groups overall), where they sharpen each other to become more fully devoted followers of Christ.

Eleventh grader Katelyn Easley, who trusted in Jesus during Teen Extreme camp, said her fellow students and adult leaders have helped her grow in her faith.

"The way everyone at Sandy Creek never gave up on getting me to go on a Wednesday night that led to my decision to go to camp was truly unreal," Easley said. "We need those people around us to encourage us and I never understood the importance of that until I was the person needing that in my life."

Schopp is excited about what this spiritual renewal could lead to this fall.

shared the Gospel at Vacation Bible Schools, children's and youth events, senior adult gatherings, camps, a revival, a reading program and worship services.

for state and national Baptist causes. CP gifts provide the "fuel" for all the cooperative missions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists, meanwhile, the GBO provides support for specific operations.

Some of the largest ministries that benefit from the GBO are disaster relief and church planting, both critical efforts in the state:

-- During the last two years, Louisiana Baptists have been engaged in prolonged recovery operations after four hurricanes.

-- Meanwhile, Louisiana Baptists are about to celebrate their 300th church planted since 2010 as part of the President's 2020 Commission Final Report goals (delayed by two years due to COVID-19 restrictions).

On top of that, Louisiana Baptists are about to launch Vision 2030, and a primary goal is to grow from 1,569 congregations to 2,000 constituted churches, with church planting a major factor in the initiative. GBO gifts will figure prominently in reaching this goal and in baptizing 25,000 new believers, also a part of the vision.

Indeed, gifts to the GBO support a wide range of cooperative missions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists: offering help to women and children who have been rescued from sex trafficking; providing groceries to families in dire need; giving hope to men and women formerly trapped by addictions; and discipling students on college campuses across the state.

Ads featuring different scenarios of life, sometimes posing deep questions and other times showcasing a positive Christian response, each end with the tagline, "Louisiana Baptists are here for you!"

John Kyle, director of communications for Louisiana Baptists and the creative force behind the "Here for You!" campaign, said the messages are designed to engage the unbeliever.

"We want the 'nones," Kyle told the *Baptist Message.* "Sometimes our people don't see the ads because they aren't our target.

"We aren't even try-

ing to buy ads on Sunday morning television," Kyle explained. "We are trying to get in as many hearts and homes [of unbelievers] as many times as we can. If someone thinks about church, they will do it later in the week, so the ads run Wednesday to Saturday."

The campaign reaches almost 94 percent of television households, and strategic ad buys -such as during the Super Bowl – give even more visibility to "Here for You!"

But television is not the only media focus. "Here for You!" also

has a strong internet

presence.

"We are averaging a reach of 187,324 people monthly through social media and streaming services," Kyle said.

Moreover, because of a partnership with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, the television presence and social media push don't just give visibility to Louisiana Baptists, but people are giving their lives to Christ because of the multimedia effort.

Kyle said the ads point viewers to the BGEA for prayer and contact with trained counselors who share the Gospel. He added that the partnership has resulted in a harvest of souls in Louisiana.

"Their records show there have been 18,602 views of the Gospel presentation from our state since 2019, and 3,570 people have indicated decisions for Christ," he said.

"We are the only state Baptist convention they are partnering with," Kyle added, noting that the BGEA continually works to improve its internet strategy -- sometimes making simple tweaks that pay big dividends.

They advised us to change our wording from 'Find God' to 'How to find God' and we had our highest number of Louisiana visitors to the landing page last month than we had in any one month during the previous 19 months," Kyle noted. "Right now, we are averaging 400-500 views of the Gospel a month, but I'd like to get that to 1,000. Keeping the ratio [a third], we would see 300 people a month indicate decisions for Christ.'

LIVING LEGACY

The Louisiana Missions Offering ensures the legacy of Georgia Barnette's passion for the people of our state will continue to result in the evangelization of the lost.

Last year, our 1,569 congregations combined to baptize 5,631 new believers, despite coming out of two years of COVID-19 restrictions and while still recovering from the cumulative effects of four hurricanes, multiple tornados and two major ice storms (with 135 church facilities and 69 pastors' homes damaged or destroyed by Ida alone).

In that light, Barnette's encouragement to a friend remains salient to Louisiana Baptists today.

"Do not become discouraged," she wrote. "We are attempting great things for Him and expecting great things from Him."

LOUISIANACHURCHES Church honors pastor, helps him beat cancer

FOREST HILL, La. (LBM) – Pastor Mike Evans recently missed two months in the pulpit during a fierce battle with cancer and other medical issues, but through those trials he experienced God's goodness through the love displayed by his church.

Meanwhile, his congregation, Elwood Baptist Church, Forest Hill, has experienced a personal revival with eight baptisms since April. Five other new believers are awaiting baptism.

"They stepped up," Evans told the Baptist Message. "Since this church was founded in 1912, we have had love, respect and unity. You can never underestimate the value of a prayer or receiving a card from someone. That helped get me through some very difficult days. They stood in the gap for me when I wasn't able."

Evans, from April 11-June 16, spent time in Alexandria and Baton Rouge hospitals and at home as he underwent surgery for prostate cancer and fought off pneumonia and multiple embolisms (obstruction of his arteries).

While he was away

from the pulpit, Evans said the members and other Louisiana Baptists never ceased showing their love.

His church continued paying his salary, cared for the facility and grounds and sent him numerous messages of encouragement.

Moreover, Elwood **Baptist Music Minister** Bobby Mills, Louisiana **Baptists Executive Direc**tor Steve Horn, Louisiana Christian University Chief **Operations Officer David** Jeffreys, lay Pastor Clovis Christman, Philadelphia Baptist Church (Horseshoe Drive campus, Alexandria) Minister of Students Andrew Barber and International Mission Board Missionary (on furlough) David McCann filled the pulpit while Evans was unable to preach.

Once Evans returned, God continued to pour out his blessings through nine salvation decisions during children's and youth summer camps at Tall Timbers Baptist Conference Center in Woodworth.

Among those who decided to follow Christ since Evans' return was Owen Jenkins, who was baptized July 24.


For two months, Jenkins helped operate the sound system in worship and on July 17 he finally realized he needed the Savior.

"At the end of the invitation, I saw him stand and he had his hand up in the air like he was going to 'high five' me," Evans recalled. "I thought he was just signaling, 'It was a wrap and all went well.'

"But later that afternoon he called our youth minister, Brother Brett Faulk, and told him he wanted to be saved and did so over the phone," he continued. "I kidded him that my other thought had been maybe he was high fiving an angel."

Evans said he appreciates how his church rallied around him in his moment of need and is grateful for the subsequent revival the Holy Spirit brought.

"We knew our members loved us, but they loved the Lord too and were just like Nehemiah 4:6, as they 'had a mind to work," Evans said. "I told them that I wondered if they realized

that they did better without me than with me, but they were generous and said it wasn't so. May the Lord bless them and all who prayed and helped."

GLOSTER, La. (LBM) – For many years, Gloster Baptist Church has helped carry the torch of Georgia Barnette, who served as a missionary with a passion for sharing the Gospel as the first elected and paid Woman's Missionary Union executive director/treasurer for Louisiana Baptists.

Not only does the church have boots on the ground in their own community and other towns throughout Louisiana, but Gloster Baptist gives generously to the annual state missions offering named after "Miss Georgia." According to Pastor Ron McLellan, the church (with an average of 100 in Sunday worship) in the last 12 months has given \$14,638 to the annual offering which honors Barnette's dedication to spreading the Good News in Louisiana; and they have set a giving goal of \$16,000 for 2022.

McLellan, who has served

as pastor since 1995, said his church's commitment to doing whatever it takes to further the Gospel nearby never ceases to amaze him.

"Our Gloster family amazes me with their willingness to go on mission with God to places like Sulphur, after hurricanes ravaged the southwest; to Plaucheville to do a music and arts camp; to a foster care camp held in North Monroe; and most recently to the inner city of Shreveport to support The Hub homeless ministry," McLellan told the Baptist Message.

Locally, Gloster Baptist serves meals to teachers; prayer walks and volunteers for events at a local school; assists widows with various needs; helps special needs persons make crafts at Holy Angels Residential Facility in Shreveport; leads worship for a community men's prayer gathering and periodically serves breakfast at The Hub ministry to human trafficking victims and the homeless in Shreveport. The church also sends a team once a month to lead worship at 3:18 Church in Shreveport. Following the service, members prepare meals that are served to those in attendance.

Featured in the Week of Prayer Guide for the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering, 3:18 Church, pastored by Matt Tyson, spreads the hope of Christ among those living in Shreveport's inner city.

The partnership between the two churches began shortly after McLellan was diagnosed in December with cancer. Tyson learned about the situation and stepped up to fill the pulpit once a month from January to April.

In June, Gloster Baptist began sending its first team to 3:18 Church.

"I needed someone like Matt and trusted him in pulpit," McLellan said. "I'm thankful he had the servant's heart to come in, preach the Word, and help us to continue to have vibrant worship experience on Sunday morning."

"We have caught onto his vision to reach the homeless community in Shreveport," he continued. "He's genuine in his desire to touch people's hearts and lives and (he) shows Christ's love to them."

Because of the generous giving of churches like Gloster Baptist, Louisiana Baptists are able to continue the vision of Georgia Barnette more than 114 years after she first led women to begin taking up an offering for state missionaries in 1907. The offering was named after her in 1937.

"This offering stays in the state of Louisiana," Louisiana Baptists Women's Missions and Ministry Strategist Christine Gill, said. "The idea is to encourage our church members to contribute to something tangible. Every dollar is used to minister to people who live in your area. The money given to the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering will literally benefit the person next door to you, whether it's through disaster relief or planting a church in your community, engaging with a compassion ministry, or doing missions education in your church."

"Without Georgia, these ministries cease to exist in our state," she continued. "It's of paramount importance. We want to reach Louisiana for Christ, and the Georgia Barnette offering provides a way to do just that."

Sept. 11-18 has been set aside as the Week of Prayer for state missions and ministries. Resources, including videos demonstrating the scope and impact of the Georgia Barnette Offering, have been mailed to churches across the state. This year's offering goal is \$1.7 million, and churches are urged to begin promoting the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering now. 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16 CULTURALNEWS DOJ opens sex abuse case against SBC

WASHINGTON (LBM) – The United States Department of Justice is investigating allegations of sex abuse against the Southern Baptist Convention.

The SBC Executive Committee revealed that it had been served a subpoena in a letter, Aug. 12. signed by the recently elected SBC president and all 13 national entity heads, stating their organizations are individually and collectively "resolved to fully and completely cooperate with the investigation."

According to news reports, multiple SBC ministries are being targeted.

BACKGROUND

The investigation is being launched as lawsuits are stacking up against the SBC since the release of the controversial "independent investigation" by the progay Guidepost Solutions which was hired by the SBC Executive Committee to conduct an internal review. The SBC Executive Committee has since acknowledged there are 14 cases filed in North Carolina and 4 in Virginia, but scores of law firms are running ads seeking plaintiffs to join class action filings.

The legal situation is complicated by the fact that long-term SBC attorneys Jim Guenther and Jamie Jordan resigned when, against their counsel, the SBC Executive Committee waived attorney-client privilege in October 2021. The SBC had not lost a single lawsuit in the 56 years of representation by Guenther.


The SBC Executive Committee subsequently hired the pro-gay Nashville-based Bradley law firm, a move that caused 217 Missouri Baptist

churches to redirect giving away from the SBC and to the state convention. Such withdrawal of SBC support is in addition to the reported withholding of funds to the SBC by "250 churches in one convention, 94 in another and 46 in a third." reported in March 2021 by an SBC Executive Committee task force that investigated the impact of controversies created by the SBC Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission and its former president, Russell Moore.

ALLEGATIONS

Among those accused of wrongdoing in the Guidepost Solutions report was Johnny Hunt, who subsequently resigned as senior vice president of evangelism and leadership at the SBC North American Mission Board. The report alleged that Hunt



sexually assaulted a woman in a condo at Panama City, Fla., in 2010, but Hunt has denied the charge.

Meanwhile, the report also highlighted sex abuse allegations against former Southern Baptist Theological Seminary professor David Sills. Sills resigned in 2018 with SBTS declining to comment on the "personnel matter."

Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary also experienced faculty resignations that same year, with one "due to a personal moral failure" and the other "to address personal and spiritual issues" -- but neither seminary indicated sexual abuse was involved and neither was mentioned in the Guidepost report.

Meanwhile, capstonereport.com, which provides timely commentary on the SBC, reported Aug. 15 that a former employee of the SBC International Mission Board claimed that in 2021 the national entity "failed to help parents understand the potential exposure of children to a sexual predator."

COMPOUNDING PROBLEMS

The SBC is not a denomination and has no top-down authority structure, however, the Department of Justice appears it will pursue the national



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fellowship of churches in the same manner it has investigated the Roman Catholic Church, which controls personnel matters in a hierarchical system. According to an Associated Press report, "Nationwide, U.S. dioceses tallied complaints from 17,000 people and paid out about \$4 billion to victims since the 1980s." With the FBI opening a probe of clergy sex abuse in New Orleans in June, there are now investigations in 23 states alleging coverups which allowed predator priests to move from congregation to congregation.

Guideposts Solutions reported that it had reviewed a list of 703 names contained in an alleged "secret list" of abusers maintained by the SBC Executive Committee – "with 409 believed to be SBCaffiliated at some point in time.

"Our investigative team reviewed the list and conducted significant research to assess whether any of the alleged abusers were still associated with an SBC church," Guidepost wrote. "Based on these efforts, it appears that nine (9) people remain in active ministry or connected to ministry. Two (2) of those people appear to be associated with an SBC church. The remaining seven (7) appear to be associated with churches that are not SBC-affiliated."

Despite concluding that only two of 703 people on the informal list were still "in active ministry or connected to ministry" and "appear to be associated with an SBC church," Guidepost excoriated the SBC EC for not taking "any action to ensure that

the accused ministers were no longer in positions of power at SBC churches."

Meanwhile, the SBC likely faces self-made hurdles in the DOJ criminal investigation in defending itself against accusations of systemic coverups. In separate legal briefs filed in the lawsuit McRaney v. North American Mission Board, which alleges NAMB influenced the termination of a former state convention executive director, NAMB and ERLC claimed the SBC governs affiliated churches.

Conservative professor alleges 'firing' by SWBTS

FORT WORTH, Texas (LBM) – Long-time faculty member David Allen has released a letter alleging he has been fired. His action was in response to descriptions of his termination as "retirement" by Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Allen was the seminary's distinguished professor of preaching, and he also was the director of the Center for Expository Preaching, having served the seminary in multiple positions since 2004. He had been on a year-long sabbatical just prior to his departure, July 31.

Baptist Press reported, July 29, that SWBTS President Adam Greenway had informed Allen via email that "his full-time faculty position would be eliminated at the end of July." Allen also said Greenway unilaterally had designated him for "retirement." However, Allen declined to retire or resign.

Mid-America Baptist Theological Seminary announced, Aug. 1, that it had hired Allen as the new Distinguished Visiting Professor of Practical Theology and Dean of the Adrian Rogers Center for Biblical Preaching.

Rogers, the now-de-
