

their personal relationship with the Lord," she continued. "We combine Christian counseling with discipleship by encouraging clients to have a daily prayer and devotion time, and to worship and be in community with other Christians."

The ministry was established through the vision and generosity of Ray and Mary Anna Granberry. Their million-dollar gift in 1996 helped launch the Christ-centered counseling ministry a year later.

Since 1997, Granberry counselors have served more than 30,000 clients, including 600 pastors and their families. Today, the ministry employs licensed, professional Christian counselors who operate out of 12 locations around the state.

Counseling is available at no cost to Louisiana Baptist ministers, their spouse and/or dependent children through a

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LBCHFM & ELBA partnership aims to improve foster care, adoption

MONROE, La. – The Eastern Louisiana Baptist Association has become the first participant in the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries' new model to help associations better engage churches in foster care and adoption ministry.

Adopted by messengers during its association annual meeting, Oct. 3 at Walker Baptist Church, the partnership encourages a coordination of efforts to serve the foster care community as an association and provides a more streamlined approach to meet urgent needs.

LBCHFM President and CEO Perry Hancock encouraged messengers and guests at the meeting to consider how God is calling them to serve.

"Everyone is not called to foster and adopt, but everyone can help in some way to care for vulnerable children and families," Hancock said. "By becoming a foster parent, you can show a child the hope and healing that is found only in our Lord Jesus Christ."

Under this new approach that was introduced

during a meeting at Eastern Louisiana Baptist Association in late January, an associational foster care and adoption ministry coordinator (trained by LBCHFM staff) will organize foster care and adoption ministry efforts throughout his or her association. Through this model, the association can establish support groups for foster parents, provide life essentials for foster children and sponsor events for foster families.

The coordinator will serve multiple roles:

- recruit a foster care and adoption ministry director in each associational church;
- work closely with Connect1Child staff to develop relationships (among Department of Children and Family Services and community partners) to identify resources and understand ongoing needs within the foster care community; and

— serve as a pointof-contact for DCFS and community partners to communicate needs to associational churches.

Larry Hubbard, pastor of Riverside Baptist Church, Denham Springs, and association moderator, expressed excitement about the partnership.

Our Louisiana Baptist Children's Home ministry, Connect1Child, has provided the vision, structure, and practical advice to minister to foster care parents in Livingston Parish," said Larry Hubbard, pastor of Riverside Baptist Church, Denham Springs, and ELBA moderator. "In a day when many families have been devastated by destructive behavior, leaving children isolated from the essentials of family life, Eastern Louisiana Baptist Association is proclaiming and living out the Gospel through Connect1Child which will transform the hearts of these children and their parents.

added that the partnership will provide another opportunity for children and families to hear the Gospel.

'Connect1Child will provide churches with the opportunity to engage in a Matthew 25:40 ministry, 'And the King will answer and say to them, 'Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did it for one of the least of these brothers or sisters of Mine, you did it for Me," he said. "Connect1Child will be a step in helping to mend broken families and providing children with hope for their future.'

The move comes on the heels of "Stand Sunday." On Nov. 13, churches will be encouraged to dedicate one Sunday to call their congregations to care for vulnerable children and families.

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

Judson Retreat Center to close



SAINT FRANCIS-VILLE, La. (LBM) – Judson Baptist Retreat Center, a camp owned by churches of the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge, has voted to cease operations, and to sell the property.

During the BAGBR annual meeting Oct. 16, a task force that was formed to study the camp's future presented their motion to close the facility and messengers approved the recommendation.

BAGBR Director of Missions Tommy Middleton told the *Baptist Message* he has spent the last 36 years leading camps and enjoying all that Judson Retreat Center offered. The decision was not easy, Middleton said, but the task force spent a great deal of time in prayer in coming to this conclusion.

"Our task force was composed of 10 members, most of whom have been very active in the work at Judson Retreat Center over the years," Middleton said in a statement to the Baptist Message. "Our chairman, Keith Horton, was outstanding in leading this group; and we are grateful for his excellent shepherding of the entire process.

"Our camp director, Justin Busby, and his wife Kim, have done incredible work to continue the ministry, going above and beyond the call of duty over these last five years. We could not have asked for a finer leader than Justin or a more precious family than the Busbys to be there during this season," said Middleton.

"Our task force has worked and consulted with Justin throughout this deliberative process

partnership with Granberry and the LBC Pastoral Leadership team. The maximum fee for others is \$90 per 50-minute session, but financial assistance is available. No one is refused help due to financial reasons.

During the coronavirus pandemic, all Granberry counselors received training and board certification in tele-counseling so clients could continue their counseling uninterrupted.

One of the things that was so difficult during CO-VID was the isolation and lack of community which increased anxiety among so many people," Eichelberger said. "God created us to be in relationships and it was very rewarding to see people helped and encouraged through the tele-counseling we were able to offer them. It was a privilege to help them walk through those hard times and recognize God at work in their lives."

Because of the increasing need for counseling. there are plans to add two additional counselors to the Granberry team.

We want to continue to offer affordable, professional Christian counseling and help individuals and families improve their physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual health," Eichelberger said. "We pray for God's wisdom and discernment in our counseling ministry. We don't have all the answers, but we know He does."

– A tent at a motorcycle rally served as a tabernacle of sorts for 81 new believers who offered themselves as "living sacrifices" in turning their lives over to Christ during the recent "Bikes, Blues and Barbecue Rally" in Rogers, Arkansas.

Bikers from around the country rallied, Oct. 6-8, in the mountainous community, and 22 members of several Louisiana F.A.I.T.H Riders were there, offering an opportunity to win a daily drawing of \$500 to anyone who listened to a three-minute testimony about Christ.

By the end of the threeday event, the members from chapters with Philadelphia Baptist Church, Deville, and Calvary Baptist Church, Ruston, joined other F.A.I.T.H. Riders chapters from across the United States to share Christ with 755 people. The F.A.I.T.H. Riders chapter of Cross Church, a multi-site congregation with a campus in Rogers, hosted the event and will follow up with those who made decisions for Jesus.

Jesse Littleton, assistant state director for Louisiana F.A.I.T.H. Riders, was among those who led a biker to Christ.

After one woman admitted she would spend eternity in hell, Littleton shared she had another option.

"She questioned a lot of why God allowed difficulties into her left, and I told her God gave us Jesus, who would have died for just her," he said. "She was moved to tears when I said she could change where

she spends eternity and her kids' opportunity for their destination. This lady prayed to receive Christ and said God reached down and touched her heart. It was an honor to be able to be used for God."

Joe Gentry, a member of First Baptist Church, Pollock, and a member of the Philadelphia Baptist chapter, said that while he was honored to be used by God to lead 15 former unbelievers to Christ at the rally, the final conversation with a man named Miguel (an atheist) was the most memorable.

"At first he said he didn't need to believe in God because he was an atheist and he drifted out in a philosophical talk about new world stuff," he said. "I managed to lead him to realize those beliefs were wrong, and he prayed to receive Christ. When he finished his prayer of salvation he jumped straight up, and tears started flowing."

David Lemmons, pastor of Harmony Baptist Church, Glenmora, and member of the Philadelphia Baptist chapter,

participated with his wife, Allison. Lemmons led two people to Christ inside the tent while his wife was a "catcher" (those who invite people into the tent).

"It's always truly special to witness someone going from death to life," he said. "And it also was extra special sharing the moment with my wife. All the work and effort we put into it is tiring, but at the same time we left refreshed."

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Indian's courageous act in Jamestown saved La. pastor's ancestors

DRY PRONG, La. (LBM) – An attack by the Powhatan tribe on the colony of Jamestown, Virginia, was imminent on March 22, 1622, but a warning from an Indian convert to Christianity saved the life of settler Richard Pace and many others.

Upon learning of the plot, Pace immediately traveled by boat across the James River into Jamestown to warn those living in the area. While 347 died in the attack, many more were saved.

Kevin Goodman, a descendant of Pace, and pastor of First Baptist Church, Dry Prong, is thankful God used the Indian named "Chanco" to alert the family of the planned attack.

"Somehow, someway, God was working behind the scenes," Goodman told the *Baptist Mes-sage*. "This Indian could have sat on the information and not told Richard about it, but he had the courage to speak up and alert him.

"Richard then rowed his boat across the river to warn his countryman and save some lives," he continued. "It's a reminder that when God stirs something up and wants us to share it, we don't need to just sit and be idle."

William Stith, a historian and third president of the College of William and Mary, documented the impact Chanco had in saving Pace and his bloodline.

In his book, "History of the first discovery and settlement of Virginia," Stith said: "This Slaughter was a deep and grievous Wound to the yet weak and Infant Colony;



but it would have been much more general, and almost universal, if God had not put it into the Heart of a converted Indian, to make a Discovery.

"This Convert, whose name was Chanco, lived with one Richard Pace, who treated him, as his own Son.

"The Night before

the Massacre, another Indian, his Brother, lay with him; and telling him the King's Command, and that the Execution would be performed the next Day, he urged him to rise and kill Pace, as he intended to do by Perry, his Friend. As soon as his Brother was gone, the Christian Indian rose, and went and revealed the whole matter to Pace; who immediately gave Notice thereof to

Captain William Powel, and having secured his own House, rowed off before Day to James-Town, and informed the Governor of it."

Goodman said he learned five years ago that he was a descendant of Pace after his uncle, David, alerted the family about their famous relative.

Now, Goodman and his family take the opportunity each Thanksgiving to reflect on the courage of Chanco and Pace, among other blessings. Though his children are three and five years old, Goodman looks forward, one day, to in-depth discussions about the day in March 1622 that saved the descendants of Pace.

'Thanksgiving a few years ago was the first time he shared it with me, and that memory of his legacy has stuck with me ever since," he said. "You always hear talk about pilgrims, Indians and the Mayflower and the obstacles they had to overcome. But knowing that I am a descendant of a man who had an impact on an Indian, who also was a Christian, that led to saving many lives is pretty special and an incredible story. I would encourage everyone to take the time this Thanksgiving and thank God for all He gives us.'

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












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R.V. Couch takes light into darkness of jails

TROUT, La. (LBM) – For the last 20 years, Pastor R.V. Couch has devoted his life to sharing how Christ can set men free, especially inside prisons.

"It's been such a joy," said Couch, interim pastor at Dunbarton Baptist Church, Ferriday, and a 2021 Louisiana Baptist Convention Exemplary Bi-vocational and Retired Pastor of the Year award winner. "I never thought that I would ever do this as a child. I have enjoyed it thoroughly and everywhere I have gone there is a purpose that God has equipped me to do."

CALLED AMID DARKNESS

A lifelong resident of Jena, Couch was working as a repairman in 1990 when his wife, Malcolm, was undergoing treatment for cancer. While she was having surgery, Mickey Hudnall, then pastor of Summerville Baptist Church, Olla, and now associational missions strategist for Ouachita Baptist Association, paid a visit to the hospital and prayed with the couple. At that moment, Couch's eyes were open to the Gospel, and soon afterward, he accepted Christ.

A year later, Couch felt a call to ministry during a revival service with Aimoch Baptist, Olla.

Then he began accompanying Hudnall to Raymond Laborde Correctional Center, Cottonport, to minister to prisoners.

At first, he rarely shared a Gospel message with the inmates. However, with time he grew bolder and became a visible and vocal witness for Christ within the prison to prisoners and guards, alike.

Since then, Couch has shared Jesus at seven other prisons.

He also has served as pastor with four congregations: Kidron Baptist Church,

Harrisonburg (1998-2015) and Calvary Heights Baptist Church, Jena (2015-2018). Since August, Couch has been the interim pastor with Dunbarton Baptist, where he has seen worship attendance increase from 20 when he arrived to 30 in late September.

Hudnall attested to Couch's steadfast commitment to area churches.

"From the day he accepted Christ, every faction of his life has changed," Hudnall said. "R.V. is a man with many talents but best of all is a great friend to many people."

Couch said he does not know who much longer he will serve at Dunbarton or minister in prisons. But he said he will serve Christ faithfully wherever the Lord may lead.

"God calls us, equips us and commissions us," Couch said. "The only way out of being commissioned is through death and I'm hoping that the Lord has more years left for me. I'm excited the Lord has used me and allows me to continue in His work."

Primeaux reflects on more than seven decades of ministry

LAFAYETTE, La. (LBM) – Wallace Primeaux, retired director of missions and pastor, was moved to tears, recently, while recounting his time as a mess sergeant in World War II.

A member of the "Greatest Generation," Primeaux said his two years as a cook for the U.S. Army in Japan helped prepare him for 73 years of service to Louisiana Baptist churches.

"I am overwhelmed when I think of it now," Primeaux told the Baptist Message. "I matured during that time and learned responsibility and obedience, which are necessary for service. It was just a real blessing to serve my country.

While he was serving in Japan, Primeaux sensed the call to ministry. Once he finished his tour of duty in 1946, he enrolled at Louisiana College (now Louisiana Christian University) to begin what he described as preparation for a lifetime of service to Louisiana Baptists.

Primeaux served just three churches: Oak Grove Baptist Church, Grand Chenier (1948-1958), Jenkins Memorial Baptist Church, St. Martinville (1958-1973) and Esther Baptist Church, Kaplan (1994-2020). He also was director of missions for Evangeline, Gulf Coast and Adolphe Stagg Baptist Associations (1973-1994).

One of his most challenging moments in min-

istry took place in 1957, he said, when Hurricane Audrey devastated southwest Louisiana as a Category 3 storm (125 mph winds). Primeaux buried 14 members of Oak Grove Baptist, but also shared Christ's love with many community members who were searching for hope.

Primeaux said the encouragement received from other pastors helped sustain him through that difficult time.

"I had good friends in our association of churches who stood with me," Primeaux said. "The friendships with the pastors were real blessings, and they supported me, with the help of the Lord." Jessie Charpentier,

help Louisiana Baptists begin to dream again."

LBC President Reggie Bridges echoed the thought, saying he hopes Louisiana Baptists will come to this annual gathering to "dwell together in those things that are true, admirable, and praiseworthy."

Bridges, pastor of Temple Baptist Church, Ruston, added that "the day is going to be filled with worship as we celebrate what our God is doing through the Louisiana Baptist family to advance His Kingdom.

"We will sing together, respond to the Word together, testify of His work together and fellowship together," he said.

AMENDMENT VOTE

Messengers also will

have the opportunity to vote on a proposed amendment to the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation that, if adopted, would allow a church to contribute solely to state causes and still be defined as a church in cooperation with the LBC. Previously a church was required to support Southern Baptist causes in order to be in friendly cooperation with the LBC.

The proposal comes at a time when 27 of about 1,600 Louisiana Baptist congregations have instructed that their cooperative missions and ministries contributions be used only in the state with none of their gifts to be forwarded to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Horn stated in the Sept. 27 Executive Board meeting this move would strive

to "strike that balance of honoring their requests while at the same time continuing to promote the ideal that we are better together with our Southern Baptist partners."

BUDGET PROPOSAL

Additionally, the Cooperative Program budget will be presented to messengers to consider for adoption.

The 2023 financial plan is based on Cooperative Program contributions of \$17,578,009, a decrease of \$48,127, or 0.27 percent. Cooperative Program projections are calculated using actual receipts from August 2021 through July 2022

The allocation formula for distributing CP gifts between the Southern Baptist Convention and Louisiana Baptist causes remains unchanged, 63.26 percent to support ministries in the state and 36.74 percent forwarded to fund national entities.

OTHER BUSINESS

Other highlights of the meeting will include messages by Horn, Bridges, and Chad Gilbert, pastor, First Baptist Church, New Orleans.

Additional items on the agenda include a Bible study led by Thomas Strong, dean of Leavell College and professor at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; reports by the Convention's entities; other updates on state missions; consideration of motions and resolutions; and election of officers.

At press time, Bridges is the only known candidate whose name will be placed in nomination for the office of LBC president. Bridges is completing his first term as LBC president.

Gilbert is expected to be nominated for the office of

first vice president.



RESOLUTION 1: ON THANKING GOD FOR THE SUPREME COURT'S PRO-LIFE RULING IN DOBBS V. JACKSON

WHEREAS, Scripture reveals that all human life is created in the image of God, and therefore sacred to our Creator (Genesis 1:27; 9:6); and

WHEREAS, The Bible affirms that the preborn child is a person, bearing the image of God, from the moment of conception (Psalm 139:13–16; Luke 1:44); and

WHEREAS, Louisiana Baptists have historically recognized the sanctity of life in the womb and repeatedly reaffirmed our pro-life ethic, our opposition to the heinous act of abortion, our support for abortion-vulnerable women as well as our commitment to the sanctity of marriage and the health and growth of families; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana Baptists have prayerfully sought God's favor in moving the nation's highest court to affirm the truth that life begins at conception and that the preborn are worthy of dignity and protection; and

WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court ruled in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* to overturn its harmful decisions in **Roe v. Wade** (1973) and *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* (1992); which, combined, led to more than 63,000,000 preborn lives lost during the past 49 years; and

WHEREAS, The Louisiana Legislature, the governors of Louisiana, and the citizens of our state had enacted laws to end abortion in our state once *Roe v. Wade and Planned Parenthood v. Casey* were overturned; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 175th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Alexandria, Louisiana, November 15, 2022, praise God and thank Him for His favor in the long-term effort to overturn the disastrous pro-abortion precedents set in *Roe v. Wade and Planned Parenthood v. Casey;* and be it further

RESOLVED, That we applaud Associate Justices Samuel A. Alito, Jr., Amy Coney Barrett, Neil M. Gorsuch, Brett M. Kavanaugh and Clarence Thomas for their courageous unity in the face of threats of violence against them and their families to stand firm in returning "the authority to regulate abortion ... to the people and their elected representatives," allowing Louisiana and other states to ban abortion, thus protecting the lives of the preborn and upholding the sanctity of the parent-child relationship; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend the churches and individuals who have worked tirelessly to cultivate a pro-life culture in our state through prayer, spiritual health and growth of our citizenry about pro-life matters, and public policy action (including the overwhelming passage of the 2020 statewide ballot measure, the Love Life Amendment); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we implore Louisiana Baptists to increase their efforts to serve and support local pregnancy resource centers, pro-life organizations, foster-care and adoptive families, doing invaluable and often under-recognized work in the care of mothers and children at every stage of life and the support of fathers so they may effectively bear their parental responsibilities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commit to stand with and pray for abortion-vulnerable women and the fathers of preborn children, to eliminate any perceived need for the horror of abortion, and to oppose Planned Parenthood and other predatory organizations or institutions who exploit vulnerable women for profit; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we urge the Louisiana Legislature to designate the month of June as "Sanctity of Preborn Life Month" in celebration of the Supreme Court's historic ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*.

RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM THE PERMANENT PHYSICAL HARM OF SEX CHANGE SURGERIES AND DRUGS

WHEREAS, Worldwide there has been an unexplained surge in the number of children who claim a transgender identity; and

WHEREAS, Research indicates that "child-hood-onset gender dysphoria has been shown to have a high rate of natural resolution," with Paul R. McHugh, the renowned psychiatrist who led Johns Hopkins University Hospital to stop sex reassignment surgery in part because of a study at Vanderbilt University (Nashville, Tennessee) and the Portman Clinic (London, England) which found "70 percent to 80 percent" of children who experienced gender confusion "spontaneously lost those feelings"; and

WHEREAS, There is no evidence that longterm mental health outcomes are improved or that rates of suicide are reduced by hormonal or surgical intervention; and

WHEREAS, Instead, the preponderance of the scientific literature shows that suicide rates, psychiatric morbidities, and mortality are higher after gender reassignment or hormone therapy; and

WHEREAS, So-called sex change surgeries, puberty blockers and cross-sex hormones cause permanent harm in children, including cardiovascular disease, osteoporosis, irreversible infertility, liver dysfunction and increased cancer risks; and

WHEREAS, Children lack the mental and emotional maturity to give informed consent for such drastic measures; and

WHEREAS, Puberty blockers and cross-sex hormones are a growing source of lucrative income for pharmaceutical companies; and

WHEREAS, Planned Parenthood is now the second largest provider of cross-sex hormone therapy in the United States; and

WHEREAS, LGBT political considerations rather than medical evidence now appear to be the driving force behind sex reassignment surgeries and the prescription of puberty blockers and cross-sex hormone treatments for children; and

WHEREAS, At least four European countries (Finland, France, Sweden, United Kingdom) have reversed course and banned gender reassignment procedures for minors, and

WHEREAS, Even Sweden's Karolinska Institute, home of one of the Nobel Prize advisory panels and a pioneer in surgical and chemical sex reassignment procedures, has ended all use of puberty blockers and cross-sex hormones for patients under the age of 18 years old; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 175th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Alexandria, Louisiana, November 15, 2022, do restate our belief that "God created man in His own image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them," (Genesis 1:27); and be it further

RESOLVED, We understand that this means the sex of an individual is determined biologically at conception; and be it further

RESOLVED, We reject the culture's increasing objectification and sexualization of children, making them vulnerable to predatory grooming and using questionable medical pretexts to justify

drastic chemical and surgical procedures to alter physical organs in attempts to reject the child's biological sex; and be it further

RESOLVED, We rebuke attempts by some in the education system to undermine the rights of parents by exposing students to the ideas of gender confusion, and luring them to adopt pronouns other than those which identify the child with his or her biological sex; and be it further

RESOLVED, We declare our commitment to protect the "little ones" as commanded in Scripture (Matthew 18:6); and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we call on state and federal lawmakers and government authorities to ban the abuse of children via so-called "sex change" surgeries and drugs.

RESOLUTION 3: ON PROTECTING LOUISIANA'S YOUTH FROM THE HARMS OF MARIJUANA

WHEREAS, We are commanded to protect the "little ones" (Matthew 18:6, 10, 14): and

WHEREAS, Louisiana rushed headlong into the legalization of so-called "medical marijuana" in 2016 without respecting the preponderance of scientific research or the opinions of known experts in the field who strongly cautioned against such public policy; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana has rapidly expanded from "limited" use (supposedly to alleviate "a debilitating medical condition" involving glaucoma, chemotherapy for cancer and spastic quadriplegia, while prohibiting "inhalation, and raw or crude marijuana") to now specifying 30 conditions and any "condition not otherwise specified ... that a physician ... considers debilitating" and permitting smoking pot as a treatment; and

WHEREAS, Use of what is accepted as "medical marijuana" in Louisiana is not controlled either by specifying which compounds found in the pot plant are contained in any pot product nor by specifying the dosage of such compounds (lacking research into the effects of such); and

WHEREAS, Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content (the psychoactive ingredient in the pot plant) has surged in pot products from about 2-4 percent as late as 1990 to as much as 30 percent today; and

WHEREAS, Even the New York Times has warned that "Medical Marijuana Is Not Regulated as Most Medicines Are"; and

WHEREAS, Kenneth Finn, a noted pain management specialist in Colorado who published the 544-page, "Cannabis in Medicine: An Evidence-Based Approach," has concluded that "People are using a medical excuse for their recreational marijuana habit"; and

WHEREAS, California, which legalized "compassionate use" of marijuana in 1996 and recreational marijuana in 2016, is now moving to place warning labels on all pot products due to increasing incidences of psychosis, paranoia and schizophrenia in their state; and

WHEREAS, Colorado passed H.B.21-3-17 in 2022, to regulate THC content due to surging medical emergencies (psychosis, paranoia, schizophrenia) among children and youth, with Democratic Attorney General Phil Weiser declaring, "Medical marijuana laws are enabling teens access to high potency marijuana"; and

WHEREAS, Already, Louisiana high school students ranked #14 in the nation in marijuana use before medicinal pot was legalized for smoking in January; and

WHEREAS, The CDC has stated that "Marijuana products that contain tetrahydrocannabi-

Credentials Committee: Messengers must register for annual meeting

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM)
— In order for a church to be represented during the business portions of the Louisiana Baptist Convention to be held Nov. 15 in Calvary Baptist Church, Alexandria, it will need to elect messenger(s), who then must register and be certified by the Committee on Credentials.

LBC Credentials Committee Chairman Steven Kelly noted to the *Baptist Message* that there are five ways for messengers to register and be approved:

— The first and simplest way is for messengers to pre-register using www.LaOne.org and print out the registration card to bring to the annual meeting. This way allows messengers to be certified within a matter of minutes, Kelly said.

— Second, a messenger may bring a note on official letterhead signed by the pastor or church clerk, stating that the individual was elected by the congregation.

— Third, a church officer can phone in the names of elected messengers.

 Fourth, a person can be vouchsafed as a duly elected messenger by a fellow registered church member.

— Finally, when there are no other means by which to validate a person, the Committee on Credentials may be called into session to rule on the registration request.

Kelly emphasized that pastors are not automatically registered as messengers, explaining that they must follow the same procedure as other messengers to participate in the business discussions and official votes of the annual meeting.

Pre-registration letters were

mailed or emailed by Sept. 23. Please use the provided login information to pre-register your messengers at www.La-One.org.

If you have not received your letter, or if you have questions about the process, please contact LBC Information Services by email (Messengers@ LouisianaBaptists.org) or phone (318.448.3402 ext. 242).

Registration and credentials representatives will be available on site to assist messengers on Monday, Nov. 14, 2-7 p.m. and on Tuesday, Nov. 15, 8 a.m.-3 p.m.

nol (THC) can have health risks regardless of how they are used because THC is impairing and can affect memory, attention, decisions-making, and risk-taking"; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 175th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, meeting in Alexandria, Louisiana, November 15, 2022, call for lawmakers to enact a moratorium on THC for medical uses, as well as a prohibition on smoking any part of a marijuana plant; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call on the Louisiana Legislature to appoint the Louisiana Board of Medical Examiners and the Louisiana Board of Pharmacy, and other scientific and research experts as these two bodies determine, to robustly examine the scientific literature to determine what safety concerns need to be addressed in the state's medical marijuana program; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Louisiana House and Senate to require the Louisiana Department of Health to develop and publish a database (similar to the COVID-19 dashboard it created) with cumulative data about adverse health events related to marijuana, especially involving anyone under the age of 21 years old; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the state require approved marijuana growers to include genetic markers in their respective strains of plants to ease the tracking of pot products in the state, facilitating medical safety and legal accountability; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we call on Louisiana legislators to roll back the medical marijuana program until such time as vigorous testing leads to conclusive evidence about what, if any, part of the marijuana plant or the hemp plant offers relief for a medical condition and to the development of proper dosing protocols commensurate with any other medical product.

RESOLUTION 4: ON A CHRISTIAN RESPONSE TO THOSE EXPERIENCING MENTAL, EMOTIONAL, RELATIONAL AND ADDICTION ISSUES

WHEREAS, God made all things perfectly good for His glory and the good of humanity (Genesis 1–2); and

WHEREAS, Adam and Eve rebelled against Him, choosing their own way and the way of

the evil one, and consequently ushered sin and disorder into our world, negatively impacting the whole human race (Genesis 3; Romans 5:12–21; 8:22); and

WHEREAS, As a consequence of this fall, humanity is subjected to many kinds of mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues, spanning a broad spectrum, including autism disorders; intellectual disabilities; conditions like schizophrenia, clinical depression, anxiety disorders, bipolar disorders, and eating disorders; diseases of the aged such as dementia and Alzheimer's disease; as well as a host of addictions that take captive so many; and

WHEREAS, God did not abandon fallen humanity but loved the world (John 3:16–17) and launched a plan of redemption—a restoration that is incomplete in this age but will be perfected in Heaven (1 Peter 1:3–9); and

WHEREAS, Those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues, like all people, are crowned with honor and dignity, being made in the image and likeness of God (Psalm 8:4–6; James 3:9); and

WHEREAS, Those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues often feel isolated, stigmatized, and rejected, sometimes resorting to self-destructive behaviors, including suicide; and

WHEREAS, Suicide is a tragedy, leaving heartache, pain, and unanswered questions in its wake; and

WHEREAS, God has called us to share the Gospel of Christ with all people, including those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the 175th session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Alexandria, Louisiana, November 15, 2022, affirm that those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues are of immeasurable value to God, and we commit to proclaim liberty to them by supporting biblically sound counseling ministries; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we oppose all stigmatization and prejudice against those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues (as well as their loved ones) and declare, instead, that we must offer care, concern, and compassion, including the assurance that those in Christ cannot be separated from the eternal love of God that is in Jesus; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Louisiana Baptists to support the Granberry Counseling Centers provided through the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries, and other ministries such as Celebrate Recovery, and

encourage those experiencing mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues to engage with these biblical counseling opportunities; and be it finally

RÉSOLVED, That we call on Louisiana lawmakers to establish a task force on mental, emotional, relational and addiction issues to investigate the safety nets available through governments, businesses, churches and other non-profits to ensure that the totality of the care and compassion system for these citizens is sound and that the process is secure such that no person is ever without the help they need.

RESOLUTION 5: ON EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION

WHEREAS, Many individuals and groups have had a part in planning, preparing and conducting the 175th annual meeting of our Louisiana Baptist Convention; and

WHEREAS, The messengers of this Convention desire to warmly recognize and express appreciation to the following:

Guidelines for the making of motions at annual meeting

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – It is important to remember that motions may only deal with one topic at a time. When making a motion, you should be as brief as possible and always begin with the phrase "I move that..."

If you are making a subsidiary motion (one that deals with a motion already on the floor), it must be relevant to the motion currently under consideration and not be a motion that is the same or substantially like one already dealt with by this Convention.

If your motion is a privileged motion, it must not be dilatory (unnecessary or made only to delay the conduct of business). If your motion seeks to amend the Louisiana Baptist Convention Ar-

ticles of Incorporation or its Bylaws, prior to offering your motion, please review these documents in advance to review the rules for how to amend each.

A copy of the LBC Articles of Incorporation and its Bylaws are found in your Book of Reports.

Important steps in wording your motion:

-- A motion should direct the Convention to take some sort of action or to refrain from taking some action. Include only the action you want to see taken in your motion.

-- Do not include supporting reasons for adopting your motion in the motion itself. This is done during debate; and as the maker of the motion, you will have the first opportunity to speak to your motion.

 Do not make a motion that instructs the Convention to not adopt some other main motion. Also, do not attempt to amend a main motion in such a way that it becomes the opposite of its original intent. If you are against a certain motion, simply vote "no."

-- If you wish to amend a motion, you may move to strike out words from that motion and replace them with other words or you may move to simply add or take away words from the motion. It is not proper to make a "substitute motion" which seeks to completely change the words of a motion so that it is no longer what was originally offered.

-- If you offer a motion during the report of a convention entity or the Executive Board, do not address the person making the report; only address the chair and state





YEC to celebrate 35th anniversary, Nov. 20-21

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – Louisiana Baptist youth and adult leaders are gearing up for the 35th anniversary of the Youth Evangelism Celebration, a statewide assembly focused on preparing the next generation to share Christ with the world.

Scheduled Nov. 20-21 in the Rapides Parish Coliseum, Alexandria, YEC will continue its storied mission of changing lives and equipping students with the necessary tools to share their faith with their classmates.

'Since its beginning in 1988, the heartbeat of YEC is the Gospel," Louisiana **Baptist Youth Strategist** Brandon Lewis told the Baptist Message. "The two-fold goal has been to share the Gospel's message of salvation through Jesus and to equip teenagers to share the Gospel in their hometowns. Each session is designed to accomplish this goal and an opportunity to respond is offered. All of this is packaged in an exciting event and gathers youth groups from across the state.'

Since 2,100 students attended the first YEC held at the Rapides Parish Coliseum in 1988, the event has grown to be the largest annual gathering of Louisiana Baptists. While Alexandria has hosted the event the most, YEC also has taken place in Haughton, Kenner, Lafayette, Pineville and Shreveport.

have included Mercy Me, Audio Adrenaline, Skillet, the Newsboys, Zac Williams, For King & Country and Crowder.

One of the most challenging years took place in 2020, when COVID-19 attendance restrictions caused the event to move to three smaller gatherings. The three gatherings drew a combined 1,100 students and resulted in 69 students making some type of faith decision.

Over the years, more than 8,000 participants have made spiritual decisions, including more than 3,000 who surrendered their hearts and lives to Christ.

"We have prayed over YEC 2022 for an entire year, and we are super excited to see everyone in Alexandria," Lewis said. "Join us as we continue to pray and make final preparations."

Throughout this year's two-day event, Louisiana Baptist teens will be challenged to celebrate what Christ has done in their lives and to share their stories of how Christ changed their lives. Furthermore, they will be engaged in multiple ways to experience a message about Him:

 Shane Pruitt, National Next Gen Evangelism Director for the North American Mission Board, will share evangelistic messages;

 Rush of Fools will lead worship in song;

– Jared Hall will be emcee and entertainer; and

—We Are Messengers, an award-winning Contemporary Christian artist, will close YEC with a concert.

During the Monday afternoon session, Pruitt will teach students a clear, practical way to share the Gospel. After completing YEC, participants will be equipped to share the Gospel with their peers throughout the state.

This will be the sixth of a multi-year rotation to equip students with various tools and their own testimony to share Christ. Those who began the training as seventh graders during the 2016 YEC will be familiar with seven different evangelistic tools by the time they are seniors.

"We fully intend to have a blast at YEC," Lewis said. "But if that's all we do then we've missed our purpose. We really want to see students return to their hometowns excited to share Jesus and equipped to do so in a clear and compelling way. That's what YEC is all about."

Proposed change to LBC Articles of Incorporation

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – The Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board adopted a recommendation, Sept. 27, to amend the LBC Articles of Incorporation, regarding what constitutes a "cooperating church."

The change would allow congregations to give solely to the cooperative missions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists, when previously membership required giving "to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program."

According to Article XVIII. Amendments of the LBC Articles of Incorporation, any proposed amendment "originating in the Executive Board of the Convention" must be "posted to the LBC website and published in one (1) issue of the *Baptist Message* (print edition or digital edition) no later than fifteen (15) days before the meeting of the Convention."

The complete motion adopted by the Executive Board is presented in italics immediately below with the proposed change <u>underlined</u>:

That the Louisiana Baptist Convention meeting in Alexandria, Louisiana, November 15, 2022, amend Article VI, Section 5 (Membership), of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Articles of Incorporation as follows:

"Section 5. A cooperating church with the Louisiana Baptist Convention 1) is of like faith and order with Southern Baptists as expressed in the Baptist Faith and Message of the Southern Baptist Convention, 2) is sympathetic to the purposes and work of the Convention, 3) contributes to the work of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program or the work of Louisiana Baptists through contributions to the Louisiana Baptist Convention for its use in state programs and agencies and 4) has applied for membership in the local association and, upon recommendation by the LBC Committee on Credentials, has been approved to send messengers to the Convention."



Chad Gilbert to be nominee for LBC vice president

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) — Chad Gilbert, pastor of the First Baptist Church, New Orleans, will be nominated for vice president of the Louisiana Baptist Convention during the 2022 annual meeting.

Steve James, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, notified the *Baptist Message*, Oct. 10, of his intention to make the nomination because Gilbert "is a genuine Christ follower, a man of devotion, integrity, and wisdom."

The LBC annual meeting is scheduled to be held in the facilities of Calvary Baptist Church, Alexandria, Nov. 15.

STATEMENT OF SUPPORT

James said he has known Gilbert for several years but that they worked closely together when Gilbert joined the staff at Trinity.

He said he was able to observe Gilbert's leadership

strengths and servant's heart especially in the aftermath of Hurricanes Laura and Delta, when Trinity became a hub of ministry to hurricane survivors, disaster relief workers and law enforcement personnel.

"Chad did a great job in reaching out to the community," James told the *Baptist Message*. "He was our point person here and coordinated all the things that took place, from supplies coming in ... to where feeding was ... to handling calls ... to donations that were made ... to directing where disaster relief would stay.

"I just got to see his administrative ability, and really, really, appreciated it," James shared.

BY THE NUMBERS

The database of the Annual Church Profile shows that under Gilbert's leadership the First Baptist Church, New Orleans, has increased its support of cooperative

missions and ministries, contributing 7.0 percent of undesignated receipts, or nearly \$152,219 of \$2,185,582 in 2022, through the Cooperative Program (up from 3.12 percent, or \$56,416, in 2021 and 1.93 percent, or \$38,063 in 2020, the year before he arrived at FBCNO).

First New Orleans contributed \$23,102 to the New Orleans Baptist Association, or 1.06 percent of undesignated receipts in 2022. The congregation also gifted \$1,854 in 2022 to the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Mission Offering, as well as \$4,818 to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering and another \$16,418 to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Regarding attendance, FBCNO averaged 307 for inperson worship and another 85 online; and baptized 8 new believers.

CANDIDATE'S RESPONSE

"I am grateful to serve the Lord as a local church pastor, and to the extent that the LBC can help strengthen local churches and pastors, I am honored to serve on a state level," Gilbert shared with the *Baptist Message*.

"My greatest desire for Southern Baptist churches in our state is to cultivate partnerships in bringing the Gospel to the ends of the earth in concert with the IMB. When we labor together to make disciples of all nations, we are at our finest," he said.

PERSONAL DATA

Gilbert earned the Master of Divinity from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and his bachelor's degree from Louisiana Christian University (formerly Louisiana College).

He has served as senior pastor of First Baptist New Orleans (2021-present), as well as Edgewater Baptist Church, New Orleans (2008-2018).

Prior to joining FBCNO, he was the associate pastor

of community and missions with Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles (2018-2020).

Gilbert has been active in denominational service, as a member of various LBC committees as well as serving on the administrative committee of the New Orleans Baptist Association. He is a board member for Global Maritime Ministries, New Orleans; Crossroads (formerly Crossroads NOLA), New Orleans; and New Orleans Baptist Ministries.

He and his wife Cole have been married for 19 years and have four children: Ava, Grayson, Brogan, and Livy.

FINAL THOUGHTS

"Chad is a man of God. He loves the word of God and shares the word of God very simply, very plainly," James emphasized. "I believe he will bring a whole new dynamic in this LBC leadership role. Folks look at him and see this is the kind of guy we would like to lead us."



Penfield grateful for the great adventure of ministry

ZWOLLE, La. (LBM) – Jerry Penfield traveled around the world as a member of the U.S. Air Force, but he said that even that thrilling part of his life's journey paled in comparison to the great adventure he has experienced as a minister for the past 44 years.

"I have enjoying seeing people grow in their spiritual walk," Penfield told the *Baptist Message*. "It's so exciting to see people come to Christ and then begin their walk on the path to a great rest of their life with God."

In 2021, Penfield was named a Louisiana Baptist Convention Exemplary Bi-vocational Pastor of the Year for his dedication to ministry.

Born in Aberdeen, South Dakota, Penfield spent his childhood traveling with his family to Alabama, Alaska and Japan (his father, Ray, served in World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War as a member of the Air Force). While the family was stationed in Montgomery, Alabama, an 11-year-old Penfield attended a revival service at Court Street Baptist Church and gave his heart to Christ.

"I somehow got separated from the rest of my family one night during the service and remember the Holy Spirit speaking to me that night," Penfield said. "That evening changed the course of my life forever and I'm grateful God met me that day."

Several years later, Penfield was called to the ministry, but he said he felt inadequate to serve with a congregation. Instead, he chose to attend North-western State University in Natchitoches (1966-1970), serve as a member of the Air Force in the Aleutian Islands, Alaska, and



Tippit: Take the prayer challenge!

SAN ANTONIO (LBM) Evangelist Sammy Tippit has issued a prayer challenge based on the Model Prayer that he hopes will spark revival within the hearts of Louisiana Baptists - and it is interactive.

The challenge features 13 dramatic monologue videos based on 13 biblical truths in the Model Prayer (Matthew 6:5-15), Tippit said, adding that there is no better example than Jesus' about how to pray.

Participants will receive a link each day throughout the 13-day challenge, giving them access to a brief video and helpful tips about how to pray the biblical phrase for that day. Additionally, each person

will receive a section of "Simply Prayer," a book on prayer by Bill Eliff, directional pastor of the Summit Church, Little Rock,

After completing the challenge, participants will receive a chapter from Tippit's book, "Praying for Your Family.'

Tippit, who was saved at Istrouma Baptist Church in Baton Rouge and ordained at the First Baptist Church in Walker, said the challenge will help each participant develop a deeper prayer life. He offered that that within two days of its release in August, the challenge had produced results, based on messages he has received.

"One Christian leader said that he had experienced depression for a

long time," Tippit told the Baptist Message. "After the first dramatic monologue, he slept through the night for the first time in two years. Others told him of how God had met needs in their lives as they prayed through the Model Prayer.'

Members of First Baptist Church, Blanchard, are among those who have accepted the challenge already.

Shortly after a July staff meeting, during which leaders discussed the need to begin a church-wide time of revival in 2023, Pastor Clay Fuqua learned of Tippit's prayer challenge. After the church completed the challenge in early September, they felt led to have a prayer emphasis in December and begin the "Experiencing God" series in January.

Brother Sammy used

his life journey to give illustrations of how each

sion. But health concerns delayed his baptism for more than a year, until Terry finally celebrated alongside friends and family on a day when four others were baptized.

"It felt good because when I think of all the Lord has done for me, importantly dying for me, I have to live for Him," Terry told the Baptist Message. "To God be the glory. I'd love to see everyone come to Christ.'

McEwen believes God protected Terry in World War II so he could share the hope of Jesus with others.

'He knows the good Lord got him home from the battlefield and all the time since was a gift from God," McEwen said. "Painting that picture of a new life in Christ through baptism is something he has wanted to do for a while. He wanted to honor the Lord for the way he saved his life not only spiritually but also physically on the battlefield.

With Wilbert being a World War II vet, our people love and honor him," he continued. "They gave him a standing ovation and there was hardly a dry eye in the place. The people singing the song


after the baptism struggled to start because they were so emotionally moved."

Since January, 25 new believers have been baptized at Northshore Church, which averages 566 for Sunday worship. McEwen said the baptisms reflect the congregation's passion to see others come to Christ.

Started in 2001 as a plant of Grace Memorial Baptist Church, Slidell, the church has grown from just a handful who met in McEwen's living room. The church has seen hundreds accept Christ and 394 baptized since its formation.

Their outreach has included ministry to first responders, construction of homes in Haiti and Mexico and acts of service for community members by its men's ministry.

'I'm so thankful to be a part of a denomination that places a priority on planting churches to reach the lost with the good news of Jesus Christ," McEwen said. "Our church purpose is 'to see the One who gave His life exalted and the ones He gave His life for transformed!' Thank you for your partnership in helping us fulfill our God-given mission."

Altos, Oklahoma, during the Vietnam War era (1970-1974) and become a counselor with the Coordinating and Development Council of Northwest Louisiana, serving out of the agency's office near Natchitoches (1974-1978).

Still, the Holy Spirit continued to remind him of that call to ministry, he shared, and in 1978 he enrolled with Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

Upon graduation, his first pastorate was with Old

Saline Baptist Church, Castor (1980-1981). He later was education and youth minister with Lakeshore Baptist Church, Monroe (1981-1984), minister of education with Oakwood Baptist Church, Lubbock, Texas (1984-1991), pastor of First Baptist Church, Zwolle (1991-2006 and 2013-2018), and pastor of First Baptist Church, Leesville (2006-2013).

Though he no longer serves in full-time ministry, Penfield (who in 2004 received a D.Min. from Louisiana Baptist University, Shreveport) remains active as Sunday school director with FBC Zwolle and supply preacher at nearby churches.

Looking back on his more than four decades of ministry, Penfield said he is grateful for the opportunity to have led multiple mission trips and baptized one of his three children and five of his seven grandchildren.

"It's been a thrill to lead my grandchildren and children to the Lord," he said. "It's a real special memory that we share."

For those pastors who

are just starting in ministry, Penfield recommends they preach the Word, love other people and promote Sunday school, which he said fuels church growth.

before making their recommendation," he continued. "They then brought their recommendation to our Administrative Council, who after much discussion and prayer, agreed with the task force's recommendation that was then brought before the association at our annual meeting, Oct. 16, 2022. Going forward, we are praying that those who eventually purchase JRC will continue and even expand this ministry that has been so effective over the years."

The move came after the camp announced in February it was suspending operations from May to December because of COVID-19-related financial challenges. Subsequently, a task force was formed to study the center's future.

Busby said in a Facebook post on his page that while supporters of the camp should grieve over its closure, they also should rejoice over the memories and changed lives that happened at Judson Retreat Center.

"And above all else I want you to know that even with the Judson Retreat Center facility closing for good, the ministry of Judson Retreat will continue," Busby said. "It

will continue because that ministry doesn't belong to Judson, it belongs to the Lord. And those lives that were changed and those who were called, they carry that ministry with them. They carry it into their homes, into their churches, into their communities and around the world. Truly we can say, the sun will never set on the multi-generational impact that the Lord has made in the lives of people here at Judson. It is finished, yet it continues, may the Lord be glorified in His faithful work here through the years."



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FBC Luling rededication celebrates God's provision

LULING, La. (LBM) – Members of First Baptist Church, Luling, celebrated the miracles of God during the recent rededication of its worship center that was heavily damaged by Hurricane Ida on Aug. 29, 2021.

A crowd of more than 70 gathered to reflect on how God brought them through both a pandemic and a major hurricane and allowed them to see His goodness amid trying times.

Interim Pastor Gerald Stevens, who retired in July after serving 34 years as a professor at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, called the Aug. 28 service a watershed moment for the church, which is surrounded by damaged homes that still have not been rebuilt a year after the storm.


"We are a lighthouse to this community," Stevens told the *Baptist Message*. "We give everyone hope because they see that you can recover from this. Even the presence of a reconstructed church in a devastated area gives this area hope things will get better for them.

"FBC Luling is the church that keeps chugging along," he continued. "Even though we are small in numbers, we are dynamic in presence and heart."

PERSERVERANCE THROUGH TRIALS

FBC Luling faced multiple trials even before Stevens became interim pastor in August 2020.

The coronavirus pandemic caused the church to conduct small

group Bible studies and worship remotely before regathering in the summer.

Then, on Aug. 29, 2022, Ida made landfall as a Category 4 storm, and its fierce maximum sustained winds of 150 mph caused significant damage to the worship center, and the Weekday Early Education Center. Rather than fold, the members pressed forward.

For the first few weeks after the storm, Stevens held an online service. Once electricity was restored, members began meeting in the fellowship hall for worship.

Even though many members were unable to occupy their homes, they became the hands and feet of Christ as they ministered to the community. Members cooked meals for neighbors, transformed a part of the fellowship hall into a donation center and hosted various relief teams on the church parking lot.

BLESSINGS RECEIVED

Additionally, God provided the funding for what Stevens identified as five miracles God performed:

- -- an insurance deductible that was 45 percent of its operating budget was paid off in an unexpected way;
- -- money, manpower and equipment already were on site (because of hurricane recovery efforts) to implement a permanent flood mitigation plan that helped make the effort financially feasible;
- -- the W.E.E. Center was repaired and reopened in August;
- -- a semi-grand piano gifted to the church many years ago was damaged but replaced with an exact replica; and
- -- the pastoral search committee extended its pastoral candidate a call to come to the church in October.

Rachel Mire, a 20-year member as well as the church administrative assistant and children's

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



director, said the assistance from so many churches and individuals encouraged them to keep pressing forward during the difficult days.

"We had a lot of ups and downs, so to come full circle to our dedication service was a miracle," Mire said. Every step of the way he was there to guide and help us through it and afford the things we did.

"During the days of COVID and Ida we didn't understand, 'Why?' but we did know God had a plan," she continued. "Now, we have a revitalization that is going to happen, and we are excited for the future and our community. For those churches who are going through hard times, look at our situation and know that it might not be as devastating as you think because in the end God can do anything more than you ever can imagine.

Stevens believes the best is yet to come for FBC Luling.

"They have high prospects," he said. "The miracles that took place were impossible financially and practically. For them to come to fruition all at the same time leaves me almost dumfounded.

"God has a future and ministry for this church," he continued. "The dedication service reminded the church that God is rooting for you. I am here with you and now let's go reach this community for me."


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
