"I consider it an honor to work with some of our leading churches and also the opportunity to help encourage some of our struggling churches. Fellowship Church: Students embrace discipleship, service

PRAIRIEVILLE, La. (LBM) – Service and discipleship have become a way of life for more than 250 students at Fellowship Church, leaders said, and these young people are committed to serving the Prairieville congregation now and for many years to come.

"We are trying to give ownership of this ministry to the students," Fellowship Church Spiritual Life

Pastor Joe Åshley told the *Baptist Message*. "They step into positions where they are trained and serve. We like our kids to get their hands dirty and get off the sidelines. That's a big part of being a Christian.

"Our focus also has been on discipleship, where we preach hard messages and talk about topics like fasting, spiritual disciplines and biblical sexuality," he said. "And kids are here for it."

Since June 2021, students have gathered every Wednesday evening for both large and small-group discipleship, including 32 who were baptized last year, Ashley said. The discipleship efforts have equipped the students to serve in various areas of the church, including special needs, children's ministry, community service days and youth worship band.

"The Lord continues draw the lost and unchurched to our ministry," Ashley shared. "From the beginning we have stressed the importance for our students to be a 'bringer' and they have embraced that challenge."

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Board SERVE Tour, an effort that seeks to involve participants in service projects as the foundation for evangelism the weekend before the SBC Annual Meeting.

LBC staff will help coordinate enrollment for both initiatives. Manuel hopes to have a team from each association to participate in Crossover and SERVE.

Previously, LBC Executive Director Steve Horn said he was praying for 2,023 people to be saved through these evangelistic efforts.

'We're attempting to encourage our congregations to participate in the SERVE/Crossover tour," Manuel said. "We want to enlist and equip Louisiana Baptists for the opportunity at the SBC in New

Orleans and our state. We're asking each association to pray about having a crossover team and a serve team serve from their area during the weekend before the convention."

Smith will lead praise and worship by song during two sessions of ECON.

According to his website. Smith has been releasing new music regularly and performing around the world to sold-out crowds for the last 35 years. During his storied career, he's written and recorded over 36 No. 1 songs, been honored with three Grammy awards and 45 Dove awards, one American Music Award, was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame and has sold more than 15 million albums.

JOINT MINISTRY EFFORT

While most churches employ one student minister, Fellowship Church has taken a different approach.

After a two-year search ended without a hire, Ashley felt led in February 2022 to ask three parents (Pete Jory, Jaimi Ashley and Clayton Wood) if they would consider taking on the role of part-time youth leaders – which they did enthusiastically.

"We had three people who were killing it as youth volunteers and we wondered if God was telling us instead of doing a nationwide search, the ones He wanted were right here in our own church," he said. "We hired three different skill-sets who see that as a strength and not a point of conflict." Jaimi Ashley (the wife of Joe Ashley) said this has been a special and unique season of ministry in her Christian journey. She especially enjoys working with more than 60 adult volunteers who pour into the students each Wednesday night.

"I have never been in a church where we have volunteers who are as excited and committed," she said. "They are all in. Anything we do, they are there. It's not an uphill battle. They love our students and provide a place for students to process, heal and grow."

IN THEIR OWN WORDS

Sawyer Bufkin, Chloe Massey and Hannah Womack are among the students who have embraced service. The three juniors

told the *Baptist Message* their love for Fellowship Church has grown since becoming involved in ministry.

"The situation between our church and youth group is unique," said Bufkin, who helps lead a fourth and fifth grade boys class on Sunday mornings and also wears a costume to entertain the kids in a monthly large group session on Sundays. "It's nice to know we are encouraged to serve. That's preparing us for beyond our teenage years, to serve Him for many years in the future."

Massey, who serves on the student praise team, said the church has modeled how to lead.

"Our youth group is an authentic biblical community," she said. "As I have gone through high school, the leaders have poured into us. They have encouraged me and showed me how to lead."

Womack, who also helps lead worship for the student praise team, said her faith has grown since she began serving.

"I have made true, Christ-centered friendships that keep me on the right path and on Jesus," she said. "It has taught me a lot of humility, leadership skills and what it means to follow Jesus. And it's reinforced that I need to be a leader outside the church and introduce them to Christ."

Kelly most recently served as pastor with Bayou Vista Baptist Church, Morgan City (2009-2022). Before then, Kelly was the pastor of Circle Baptist Church, Baker (1995-1997), First Baptist Church, Doyline (1998-2002), and First Baptist Church, Many (2002-2009), as well as other

congregations in Iowa and Mississippi.

He also served as a Baptist Collegiate Ministry summer missionary in the San Francisco Bay Area, California, where he sensed the call to ministry and met his wife, Tammilee, who was a partner on his team during the

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summer of 1986. The couple has three children, Andrew, Adam and Sarah, and one grandchild.

In 2015, Kelly became director of missions for the Gulf Coast Baptist Association. During his time as bi-vocational DOM, Kelly continued to serve as a fulltime pastor with Bayou Vista Baptist Church.

Kelly earned the Bachelor of Science from the Univer-

sity of New Orleans and the Master of Divinity from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

As for the future, Kelly said his focus for the first several months will be to build relationships with pastors and churches in the two associations. He will seek to use this time to understand what strategy to undertake to best coordinate the collective efforts and resources of the churches.

"My initial goal is to get to know the pastors and leaders," he said. "People won't follow what you do unless they trust you. I want to get into church offices, sit in worship service, preach in pulpits, and have leaders connect with the work.

"I am looking forward to serving in an area where there is a mix of small and large churches, a university, and a metro area," he continued. "Collectively, I hope to lead the churches of our two associations to work together to impact this region for Christ."

CHRIS HOLLOWAY

Holloway assumed his role with the Gulf Coast Baptist Association on Dec. 1. Like his predecessor,

Holloway serves as a bi-vocational director of missions. Holloway will continue to serve as pastor of Little Pass Baptist Church, Franklin, and will work at least one day a week as director of missions.

While his role as pastor will prevent him from serving as an interim pastor at other churches on Sundays, Holloway plans to meet with pastors during mealtimes, in the evenings and on Saturdays for special events.

Throughout his time as pastor of multiple churches in the association, Holloway has gotten to know most of the churches in the association, which elected him as moderator for 11 years (2011-2022).

A native of Jonesboro, Arkansas, Holloway committed his heart and life to Christ in 1973 while visiting with his pastor, Earl Pounds, at Butler Hill Baptist Church, St. Louis, Missouri. Three years later, he felt the call to ministry and became the volunteer youth pastor with First Baptist Church, Dubach, Louisiana.

During the years that followed, Holloway continued to serve on staff with congregations in Kentucky, as well as with Louisiana Baptist churches: youth pastor, Highland Park, Monroe

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) – Typically, Nick Anderson is a vocal presence on gridiron as an allconference linebacker for the Tulane Green

Wave, but he was at a loss for words as he looked across AT&T Stadium in Dallas, Texas, following a comeback win in the 2023 Cotton Bowl. Anderson

registered five tackles as Tulane, the num-

ber 16 team in the nation, erased a 15-point deficit in fewer than five minutes to pull off a 46-45 upset of the 10th-ranked University of Southern California. According to the Athletic website, over the past five years, Foot-

ball Bowl Subdivision teams were just 1-1,692 when trailing by 15 points with five minutes to play.

A native of Vicksburg, Mississippi, Anderson played four seasons at Tulane. During that time, he amassed 283 tackles, 10.5

sacks and two forced fumbles.

"God has always been the head of my life and my journey," Anderson, who turned to Christ when he was five years old, told the Baptist

Message. "My career has been through many

trials and tribulations, but He has always shown true to his Word in covering me every step of the way. I'm blessed to be in this position and blessed to have been used as a vessel to help guide this team to a historic season by using the light that GOD blessed me with as well as his guidance and putting my faith first."

As he looks to the 2023 NFL Draft, Anderson is hopeful that he can continue to give God the glory.

'I know He will bless me with the opportunity to continue to showcase how great he is and how he's been able to work miracles in my life," he said. "I have always said that I would use my platform to give him the glory, and I will continue to do that when I get to the next level. I want to cement my legacy as a man of God who was used to inspire others through my walk and career to have faith in God, themselves, and the journey."

Tulane BCM Director Corey Olivier first met Anderson in 2019, when the two prayed together before football games. A year later, Anderson asked Olivier if he would disciple him.

"From that point on Nick and I have met together to talk through various books of the Bible, journal entries we made while reading them, and how to navigate through college, football, and life in general with a biblical perspective," Olivier said. "He also attended BCM small groups and weekly dinner and worship gatherings when his class and football schedules allowed him. Nick has been an ambassador of Christ to his teammates and coaches, and I have no doubt he will represent Christ at the next level."

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6 LOUISIANANEWS **CARES Act offers tax refunds to churches**

WASHINGTON (LBM) - Churches are eligible for the Employee Retention Credit (tax credit). which could amount up to \$26,000 per employee, according to the Internal

Revenue Service website.

The ERC is designed to reimburse small businesses, including nonprofits "who continued paying employees while shutdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic or had significant declines in gross receipts from March 13, 2020, to December

31, 2021," www.irs.gov instructs.

An eligible employer is defined as one whose trade or business during the qualified timeframe (as defined in IRS bulletins) was fully or partially suspended due to government restrictions on commerce, travel or group meetings "(for commercial, social, religious, or other purposes) due to COVID-19" or if the employer "had a significant decline in gross receipts," per Internal Revenue Bulletin: 2021-11.

Other notices modify the timeframe for eligibility and qualify "recovery startup businesses" for the tax credit and provide other details.

The tax credit is part of the 2020 CARES Act which was passed to help keep businesses and families afloat when the U.S. economy was shut down during the coronavirus pandemic of 2020-21.

Dale Lingenfelter, Louisiana Baptist's associate ex-

ecutive director and chief financial officer, explained that the ERC is different than the Paycheck Protection Program.

"It is not a loan like the PPP. It is a true tax credit," he told the *Baptist* Message. "You must file amended 941s," he said, adding that churches will need to be patient as their applications are processed due to backlogs with the IRS.

(LBM) – In the first chapter Paul then noted that he was specifically called to preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of explanation about redemption by emphasizing that "the Christ" (v. 8).

He added that the purpose of "the church" includes making known this "manifold wisdom of God ... to the principalities and powers in the heavenly places," indicating that the church's mission on earth extends also to heaven.

A number of biblical scholars explain that this means the purpose of the church is to share the Gospel in such a way as to ultimately glorify God to the universe.

Paul also underscored this point to the Corinthians ("apostles ... made a spectacle to the world, both to angels and to men," 1 Cor. 4:9) and to a Jewish-Christian congregation (emphasizing that their witness was also to "an innumerable company of angels," Hebrews 12:22).

Likewise, Peter touched upon this point, stating that angels "desire to look into" the Gospel mystery (1 Peter 1:12).

Finally, Paul closed this part of his letter to the church of Ephesus by offering to pray – "I bow my knees to the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, from whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named" -- that this congregation would "be strengthened ... rooted and grounded in love ... and ... know the love of Christ" (vv. 14-19).

Importantly, Paul's message to the Ephesians should encourage us, knowing that the Gentiles to whom the "mystery" applies includes you and me, and that our Gospel witness includes a heavenly audience.

In that regard, Paul emphasized unity through obedience, meaning that if we are "in Christ" (and He is in

edifying of the body of Christ" (vv. 11-12). Paul repeats this point, by explaining that "the whole body, joined and knit together by what every joint supplies, according to the effective working by which every part does its share, causes growth of the body for the edifying of itself in love" (v. 16).

Then Paul underscored that how we "walk" after being welcomed "in Christ" should be different from how we behaved before we were saved.

Previously we existed "in the futility of the mind … darkened … alienated" and that "because of the blindness" of the heart, were given to "lewdness ... uncleanness with greediness: (vv. 17-19).

Now, if we are "taught by Him," we should walk in a new way (ending our "former conduct") by being "renewed in the spirit of your mind" and by putting on "the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness" (vv. 21-24).

Paul summed up his guidance on this matter by condemning lying, anger and stealing, and even cautioned against speaking unwholesome words (vv. 25-29).

"Do not grieve the Holy

Spirit" he warned. "Let all bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor, and evil speaking be put away from you, with all malice. And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you" (vv. 30-32).

Although written to the congregation in Ephesus, Paul's words have application to the whole body of believers, and particular meaning for us who compose the church today. Paul did not call believers to a "go along to get along" conformity to achieve the agendas of men, but to submit in unity to the Holy Spirit for the purposes of God.

LOUISIANANEWS Westview sees spiritual revival among students

DERIDDER, La. (LBM) – A spiritual awakening is gaining momentum among the students at Westview Baptist Church.

Since November 2021, 17 students have decided to follow Christ at the Deridder congregation. Seven of those have been baptized since Sept. 18, 2022, and another seven are awaiting baptism in a church that averages 115 in Sunday worship.

Most of the decisions took place at a 2022 summer camp held at the Tall Timbers Baptist Conference Center in Woodworth and at the 2021 Youth Evangelism Celebration in Alexandria.

"Our church is seeing a revival because of our students," Pastor Jason Hoychick told the Baptist Message. "They are inviting their friends and some of them, along with their families, are getting saved. It's creating an excitement in our congregation, who are experiencing first-hand that if you witness to your friends and invite them to come, you can reach many for Christ."

Meanwhile a renewed emphasis on discipleship is helping students grow deeper in their relationships with Jesus.

Hoychick said the primary vehicle for discipleship has been a Wednesday night Bible study. However, he added that students have grown through other opportunities such as a Sunday evening question and answer time on various topics. In the fall that forum drew 13 youth for the twoand-a-half-hour event and produced one profession of faith.

"Teenagers are so hungry to understand God's Word that they would give up a Sunday night to come to discuss biblical and spiritual matters - even though there were no food or games involved," Hoychick said. "I'm telling you, God is doing something special here."

Keith Bell, WBC minister of youth, has been amazed of the students' desire to grow deeper in their faith.

"It's been absolutely amazing to witness the transformation of our students," Bell said. "To see them continue to ask questions, so they can have meat and not just live on spiritual milk, is so encouraging to a youth leader and to our church. Our students continue to see their friends get saved and that fires them up to keep living for Jesus."

Hoychick said he is blessed to serve at a church that invests in the next generation and believes God has greater things in store for Westview Baptist in 2023.

"I have pastored 22 years, but never have quit youth ministry," Hoychick said. "That love has not changed and I'm thankful we have leaders like Keith Bell and

his wife, DeAnna.

"Our teenagers get it and are living out how we as Christians are supposed to," he continued. "Churches need to wake up and learn they can learn from their youth groups. If we invite people and are excited about what we offer, they will come. "There is not a perfect teenager or one that has figured out everything about Jesus," he said. "But they know God loves them and offers them a peace. If we all had the same passion to reach our friends that this youth group does, our world would be a very different place."
