

ECON 2023: PRAY, WIN SOULS DAILY

WEST MONROE, La. (LBM) – Five months ahead of evangelistic events tied to the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting in New Orleans, participants at the recent Louisiana Baptist Evangelism Conference were challenged to share the hope found in Christ each day.

Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn told the ECON crowd that they can change the state if they would commit to pray for and share Christ with others "daily."

ECON was held in the facilities of the First Baptist Church, West Monroe, Jan. 23-24.

"Would it be said of us that we could be known as a group of churches, a people, that are known to have a culture of evangelism," Horn said. "What does that look like? When I read the book of Acts, I see 'daily.'

"The Bible says in a variety of places in the book of Acts that 'daily' the Lord was adding to His church. I know that you as Louisiana Baptists believe every word of God's Word. Would you believe that word with me – 'daily'?"

Horn previously said he has prayed for 2,023 people to be saved through two evangelistic events tied to the SBC Annual Meeting: "Crossover," a large-scale evangelistic effort held before the SBC Annual Meeting, and the North American Mission Board "Serve Tour," an effort that seeks to involve participants in service projects as the foundation for evangelism the weekend before the SBC Annual Meeting.

The LBC state missions center is helping to coordinate sign up for both initiatives, he said, and he hopes to have a team from each association to participate in each of "Crossover" and "Serve Tour."

ECON featured Louisiana Baptist pastors, seminary professors, an apologetics professional

# First Person: My Asbury Journey

ASBURY, Ky. (LBM) --It began with a phone call from a friend on Thursday afternoon. He had heard that a spiritual awakening was underway at Asbury University in Wilmore, Kentucky. In February 1970, Asbury was the epicenter of a campus revival that impacted hundreds of college and seminary campuses across North America. After reaching out to other friends and searching online, I began piecing together a few facts.

On Wednesday, Feb. 8, following a routine 10 a.m. chapel service in Hughes Auditorium, a small group of students remained behind to worship and pray. As students made their way to the altar rail across the front of the stage, the Holy Spirit ignited a deeper, heart-level work.

Word spread swiftly as students began to message one another "you need to get back to Hughes!" As I write this account 180 hours later, the worship of our Father continues without pause. Two other campus chapels and a local church building have been opened to accommodate the crowds that now exceed three thousand students, faculty, and guests.

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) - More than 500 Louisiana Life March Central participants were encouraged to continue fighting for the rights of the unborn, seven months after the Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade (a decision in 1973 that legalized abortion), triggering a ban on abortions in Louisiana.

"Though Roe v. Wade has been overturned that battle is not over," State Rep. Mike Johnson, a member of First Baptist Church, Pineville, said Saturday, Feb. 4. "I'm proud to be part of a legislature that has stood up for life long before Roe v Wade was overturned. We have to be pro-life. We have to give the children love."

Men and women, young and old, from various denominations and ethnicities joined together to make the journey from the Louisiana Christian University campus to the riverfront in Pineville.

Other speakers included State Rep. Gabe Firment, a member of First Baptist Church, Pollock; Kim Lyons, director of the CENLA Pregnancy Center, Alexandria; and David Jeffreys, LCU executive vice president and chief operations officer.

The life march was the last of five held in the state over the past few weeks.

According to Louisiana Right to Life officials, a crowd of 750 gathered in Baton Rouge and also in Monroe/West Monroe, 1,500 in Shreveport and another 500 in Lake Charles in marches that took place over several weekends in January.


"Everyone deserves a birthday" was the theme for this year's events.

Jeffreys told the crowd to show love.

"We know it's not the end of the fight," he said. "We pray for continued victories, one life at a time, one family at a time."

Firment shared how his mother chose to give him life, even though she was told he would be born prematurely.

"The world says, 'Don't take a chance," he said. "At the time it was legal to take a baby's life. Thank God she didn't. Thank God we have legislators like Mike Johnson

fight for what's right, especially when it comes to life.

"The other side already is working on us," he said. "They say, 'We need exceptions for this or that.' A child is never an exception. Every child is a precious unique gift from God."

Lyons shared that the **CENLA Pregnancy Center** continues to serve women by providing many resources, including pregnancy decision coaching (by trained advocates), free pregnancy tests, free ultrasounds, information about pregnancy options and, most recently, abortion pill reversal services. The center is listed on a national hotline that connects CENLA Pregnancy Center staff with women seeking to reverse the effects of the first pill taken for chemical abortion.

"In this post-Roe generation, we are here to stand in the gap," she said. "We are here to stand and journey with women."



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
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


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# LOUISIANACHURCHES Vendors being sought for CENLA missions, ministry fair

and evangelism associates from the North American Mission Board. The event also included times of worship led by the Jason Lovins Band and Michael W. Smith, an award-winning Christian contemporary artist, as well as breakout sessions.

Louisiana Baptist Evangelism and Church Growth Director Keith Manuel charged the crowd to share their faith.

"You will be a blessing to those you share with, but you will reap the rewards of Heaven you will not believe," he said. "Someone is waiting on you. Find a way. Share the Gospel!"

#### JOHN FREAM

John Fream, pastor of Cypress Baptist Church, Benton, said too many Christ followers have lost their passion for soul winning.

"It works and sometimes we lose sight of what we really are supposed to be doing," he said. "We've lost what really, really matters.

"We've got to remind our people Hell is hot and time is short," he continued. "We have a mandate to go out there and get things done."

#### **JAMIE DEW**

Jamie Dew, president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, told the crowd not to "overthink" sharing the Gospel.

Referencing Matthew 10, Dew said baptisms have decreased in churches because Southern Baptists are less evangelistic than they were 20 years ago. He challenged Louisiana Baptists not to focus on a specific style of evangelism, but rather just be intentional about sharing Christ.

"Don't overthink it," he said. "Get every bit of training you can get. Train your people as much as they can possibly get. But at the end of the day, preach the Word and share the Gos-

#### pel!" JAKE ROUDKOVSKI

"Whatever you do, do it for Jesus," New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Professor of Evangelism and Pastoral Leadership Jake Roudkovski said. "Do it for Jesus because Jesus alone is worthy."

Drawing from Revelation 5, Roudkovski said Jesus is worthy because He is the Lord of history, victory and glory.

Roudkovski urged the crowd not to forget what Jesus has done for them.

"Our problem is we have gotten over what Jesus Christ has done for us when He shed His precious blood for our sin," he said. "A reason we have seen a decline in evangelism is we have gotten over Jesus. In eternity we will be praising Jesus who will be the theme of our worship. May we never get over Jesus in this life."

#### J.J. WASHINGTON

J.J. Washington, NAMB national director of personal evangelism, said that simplicity, humility and the right motive – not eloquence – are needed to share the Gospel.

Summarizing 1 Corinthians 2:1-5, Washington said the Apostle Paul planted the church in Corinth not to glorify Himself but rather to give praise to the Creator.

"He had come to Corinth to glorify the Lord," he said. "We need to do it and we need to do it for Jesus' name, not ours. You don't need eloquence, friend. Just open your mouth and let the Gospel out."

#### TIM DOWDY

What America needs today is a holy boldness, according to Tim Dowdy, NAMB vice president of evangelism.

"What's going to make the biggest difference in the life of the people you and I know is to start telling 'the story," Dowdy said. "With all the bad news, there is good news. "There is hope. God is

at work."

Basing his message on Acts 4:31, Dowdy said the early church had a boldness to share Christ despite the opposition.

"The hope that we need is only found in Jesus," he said. "And He gives it to us, one heart at time."

#### **MARK MITTELBERG**

Mark Mittelberg, executive director of the Lee Strobel Center for Evangelism and Applied Apologetics at Colorado Christian University, closed ECON by reminding the crowd that Christ has given each believer a mission to lead others to join His family.

He shared that each Christ follower has at least one of the five contagious faith-sharing styles to use in evangelism: friendship-building, selfless-serving, storysharing, reason-giving and truth telling.

"We are all called to share the Good news with other people," he said. "But we all don't have to do it the same way."

We had people come to repent for restoration and numbers of people praying on the knees at the altar," Bowlin said. "There was a great presence of the Holy Spirit in both services.

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

# Win 2,023 souls during 2023 SBC

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) – Louisiana Baptists have a golden opportunity to reap a harvest of souls during a pair of evangelistic efforts preceding the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting, which is scheduled for June 13-14 in New Orleans.

The "Send Relief Serve Tour," an effort that seeks to involve participants in service projects in Houma and New Orleans as the foundation for evangelism, will take place June 9-10. A celebration service will be held June 10 at First Baptist Church, New Orleans, with a meal at 5 p.m. and service at 6 p.m.

Additionally, "Crossover," a large-scale evangelistic effort, will take place in the New Orleans Baptist Association and North Shore Baptist Association, June 10. The "Serve Tour" and "Crossover" weekend will wrap up with a Harvest Sunday, June 11. Churches in these areas will be encouraged to utilize evangelists to fill the pulpit that day.

Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn has set a combined goal for soul-winning through these two evangelistic efforts. In his report to the Executive Board in September and then again at the LBC Annual Meeting in November, he shared that he is praying for 2,023 people to be saved.

"We know that the harvest is ripe for abundance in New Orleans," Horn said during the annual meeting. "And, now we can say that the workers in that harvest are going to be more than usual at least for this abbreviated time. We cannot miss this strategic opportunity."

Jacob Crawford, the

"Crossover" point person for the New Orleans area and director of City Life NOLA, shared during a breakout session at the 2023 Louisiana Baptist Evangelism Conference, Jan. 24, that prayer will play a key role in both evangelist efforts.

"Even the smallest church can do this and be a part of seeing communities come to know Jesus," Crawford said. "Whether it's 'Crossover' or 'Serve,' God is calling us to live on mission and share our faith. We could see God do something huge, but it all starts with prayer.

"It'll be so encouraging to know your brothers and sisters are serving that day," he continued. "You are the piece of a bigger puzzle. We will have to think outside the box in some communities to communicate the Gospel. I'm excited about what God will do."

# Former Angola inmate Hyde begins Mississippi prison ministry

PARCHMAN, Miss. (LBM) – Robert Hyde, the immediate past pastor of Grace Baptist Church in the Louisiana State Penitentiary, who was granted parole in March 2022, has begun discipling inmates at the Mississippi State Penitentiary.

In his role as a program supervisor, Hyde oversees more than 300 men who are taking classes in vocational school, adult basic education, Mississippi Delta Community College courses, careers services, book clubs via Zoom from Mississippi Library Commission and Jackson State University, and the extension center of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary classes. He also is an adjunct professor with the NOBTS extension center.

Hyde, who began working at the prison in July 2022, said his new role is a way for him to give back to those who helped turn his life around while as an inmate.

"It feels right to be here doing this," Hyde, who shared his testimony at the 2023 Louisiana Baptist state Evangelism Conference, told the Baptist Message. "This is exactly where I am supposed to be, which is helping guys. I finally get to be for these guys what other men were for me at Angola. It's the ultimate way to give back."

#### **ROAD TO REDEMPTION**

Hyde grew up in Baton Rouge with an abusive stepfather, and the domestic violence eventually led to his mother's death from a gunshot wound. He then went to live with his grandfather, whose aloof attitude left Hyde with no parental leadership. This led to a life of drugs, alcohol, the occult and eventually manslaughter in 2001 of another man at a party in Rayville at age 28.

While in Richland Parish Detention Center in Rayville, the Holy Spirit brought him under conviction and in his cell, Hyde turned to Christ.


Two years later, Hyde was given a 35-year sentence for manslaughter and was transferred to the Louisiana Department of Corrections. At Winn and Dixon correctional centers, Hyde began to lead Bible studies and eventually learned of an opportunity to transfer to Angola, enrolling in 2012 with the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Extension.

Hyde earned associate's, bachelor's and master's degrees with the extension program, and was ordained by Grace Baptist Church in 2017. In 2015, he was called to be the associate pastor of Grace Baptist Church in Angola; and, during that time, October 2015, Washington Baptist Association unanimously voted to accept the congregation into its fellowship. He served in that role until 2019, when he succeeded Paul Will as senior pastor.

Hyde spent the final two years of his time in Angola helping to establish a Christian-based substance abuse recovery program. Using the Celebrate Recovery model, Hyde witnessed 150 inmates turn from drug addictions to changed lives with Jesus. First Baptist Church, Saint Francisville and the Washington Baptist Association provided the materials, but the inmates have paid for uniforms of mentors, the speaker system and most other costs.

Now, Hyde supervises programming and education at the Mississippi prison. Burl Cain, the former warden at Angola who started the seminary program in 1995 and now is the commissioner of the Department of Corrections in Mississippi, encouraged Hyde to apply for the position.

Hyde said the seminary was instrumental in preparing him for his new role.

"It's a real honor because the seminary meant so much to me," Hyde said. "Every penny of our seminary education was taken care of by Louisiana Baptists. The professors and pastors who poured into me and the others were the spiritual dads we at Angola never had. I never could have done it without Louisiana Baptists."

#### **PATH TO FORGIVENESS**

Securing his release from Angola and landing a job at Parchman have been tremendous gifts from God, Hyde said. But he emphasized that reconciling with three of his four daughters has been a special blessing from Him.

When he entered prison in 2001, Hyde already knew two of his daughters, Pamela and Kyra, who were 7 and 9 years old at the time. Through the years he maintained ongoing conversations with them.

He later learned he had a third daughter, Janae, whose adopted parents finally agreed, 14 years after he entered Angola, that she would meet Hyde in 2016.

Once he was released, Hyde was reunited with his two oldest daughters in Baton Rouge. In December, he met his youngest daughter for the first time in Monroe. Hyde is praying that one day he will be able to reconcile with his fourth daughter.

Despite the crime he committed, Hyde said his daughters have shown unconditional love.

"If you are a parent and you have done something stupid, you know what it's like to experience the deep forgiveness of a child," he said. "There is something in the forgiveness from a child that is so pure because you know there is no ulterior motive. When you mess up as badly as I did, forgiveness is the one metric you have to verify you are back on even ground with your relationships.

"I have learned there is nothing more important, besides Jesus, than your blood and Christian family," he continued. "I took that for granted before I knew Jesus. Now I can appreciate it and I will never take it for granted again."

Hyde asked for continued prayers as he ministers to Mississippi inmates.

"Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for helping me learn how to be the man of God that Jesus Christ asked me to be," he said. "Without your contributions, without your ministry, without your churches, without the brothers and sisters in Christ, I wouldn't have stood a chance of becoming the man I am today."

Hosted by First Baptist Church, Blanchard, the gathering brought together Christians of various ages and ethnicities to pray for law enforcement, the persecuted church, missionaries serving around the world, pastors and other church leaders.

Just like the previous gatherings at NLBA churches, this event was marked by prayer from the worship center stage, in small groups around the room and by individuals who pleaded with God for revival in their community, state and nation.

#### **URGENCY TO SEEK GOD**

"We are in an uncertain hour all across this nation," NLBA Director of Missions Lane Moore said in his opening remarks. "These last couple of years have been challenging in ministry. We are obviously living in a more wicked and fallen world every day. However, we also know from Scripture, that the Father has us in His hand. Let's remind ourselves of that truth tonight."

Clay Fuqua, pastor of FBC Blanchard, told the crowd to ask the Lord to search their hearts, as King David did in Psalm 139:23-24. A spiritual cleansing will follow, he said.

"This could be your prayer for every day," he said. "Search me, know me, look inside me. Search me introspectively."

Mark Crook, pastor of Trees Baptist Church, Vivian, said Christ followers must stand strong. By doing so, they will experience His power.

Referencing Ephesians 6:10-13, Crook noted the importance of putting on the armor of God in the face of spiritual attacks.

'This is a spiritual warfare and the only agency on the face of the earth that is equipped to wage this spiritual war is the church," he said. "We need a praying church. We need a Spirit-filled church, a soul-winning, disciplemaking, sin-hating, Jesusloving church. It's time to take a stand. It's time to be 'the Church.' It's time to put on our armor, get out of the trenches, rush the gates of Hell, until we reach souls and pull them out of the fire.'

# **CHURCHES: How to file for ERC tax refund**

WASHINGTON (LBM) – The Employee Retention Credit is a tax refund that is available to churches who kept employees on the payroll during the pandemic of 2020-21.

Initially, eligible employers had to choose between the Paycheck Protection Program or the Employee Retention Credit. Then in 2021 Congress allowed eligible employers to apply for both. So, the two programs can be used together to maximize benefits, but they cannot be used to compensate churches twice for the same wages in any quarter of either 2020 or 2021. Importantly, the PPP was a loan that converted to a grant if certain conditions were met. However, the ERC is a refundable payroll tax credit.

The Louisiana Baptist

Message has compiled the following information from multiple sources, and it is **provided on a general information basis only.** Churches should consult with their respective accountants for specific financial advice.

#### ELIGIBILITY

The timeframe includes March 13, 2020, through December 31, 2021, if a state mandate was in effect.

The following Louisiana proclamations were issued by Governor John Bel Edwards:

On March 13, 2020, all public gatherings of 250 or more persons were prohibited.

On March 23, 2020, all public gatherings of
10 or more persons were prohibited, and a "general stay-at-home order" went into effect.

— On March 31, 2021,

"religious services held by churches and other faithbased organizations" were exempted from "crowd size limitations."

Consequently, many Louisiana Baptist Churches will qualify from March 2020 through March 2021. 2020 tax year (March

<u>– December)</u> — No more than 100

employees; and

— a government mandate that prevented operations, either in hours or service capacity, <u>OR</u> revenue was less than 50 percent of 2019 gross receipts for any quarter.

<u>2021 tax year (January</u> <u>– December)</u>

Fewer than 500 employees; and

 a government mandate that prevented operations, either in hours or service capacity, <u>OR</u> revenue was less than 80 percent of 2019 gross receipts for any quarter. A church planted in 2020 may qualify for the ERC as a recovery startup business if it:

— Began after February 15, 2020; and

— annual gross receipts were under \$1 million; and

— one or more W2 employees were on the payroll.

#### NOTES:

(1) The credit is only available for any wages paid to full-time and part-time staff **for whom** the church paid FICA Churches do not pay FICA for pastors, thus the pastor's wages do not qualify in calculating the ERC tax refund. FICA wages do NOT include pre-tax deductions for health insurance, dental insurance, FSA contributions, etc. (employee share). However, FICA wages do include any of the employee's contributions to a retirement account under a salary

reduction agreement.


(2) Qualifying wages include wage amounts paid by the qualifying employer to its employees plus health plan expenses.

(3) Wages used for any quarter to qualify for the Paycheck Protection Program cannot be used to qualify for an Employee Retention Credit for that same quarter.

(4) For 2020, qualifying wages are capped at \$10,000 per employee annually and the credit amount is 50 percent (or \$5,000 per employee). For **2021**, qualifying wages are capped at \$10,000 per employee per quarter and the credit amount is 70 percent (or \$7,000 per employee per quarter). Recovery startup nonprofits are limited to \$50,000 in credit for all employees per calendar quarter.

Slipping into Hughes on Saturday evening, I was one of those "guests." I became a part of the Asbury awakening for the next two days and nights.

For most of my adult life I have been a student of revival, but I am no expert. In smaller groups, I have "tasted" a little of what happens to His

#### people in His Presence, but never on the scale that I experienced at Asbury. While I was driving home, a friend sent a message asking, "what were the marks of this revival?" Without hesitation I replied, "His Presence. Worship. Prayer. Testimony. Scripture reading. Brief pointed preaching. Life

Although leaders are carefully shepherding what is happening behind the scenes, the movement is not being orchestrated by human personalities or manmade agendas. Care is taken not to quench or grieve the Spirit. Grace and mercy are evident in every remark and request from the platform.

preschool that has its own EIN and files its own IRS Form 941 each quarter, has to file for the ERC separately from the church.

#### HOW TO CLAIM THE ERC

The Employee Retention Credit must be claimed by using the IRS Form 941-X, "Adjusted Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return or Claim for Refund." A separate 941-X will be filed for each calendar quarter for which Employee Retention Credit is being claimed. Whoever processes the church payroll will be familiar with how to complete these forms.

#### **FILING DEADLINES**

2020 (2nd, 3rd, 4th quarters)

 A corrected IRS Form 941-X must be submitted by April 15, 2024.

2021 (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th quarters)

 A corrected IRS Form 941-X must be submitted by April 15, 2025.

# 14 CULTURALNEWS Biden's DOJ targets Bible-believing Catholics as terrorists

WASHINGTON (LBM) – A former FBI special agent and federal whistleblower leaked a Jan. 23, 2023, intelligence field report produced by the FBI field office in Richmond, Virginia, which called Catholics who hold to biblical beliefs about marriage and the unborn "violent extremists" and proposed infiltrating mass services because of this "radical-traditionalist" ideology.

Some political observers suggested this was a gateway to declare any Christian a "criminal" for holding to an orthodox view of the Bible on these and other social issues.

Twenty state attorneys general, including Louisiana's Jeff Landry, signed a letter to FBI Director Christopher Wray and U.S. Attorney General Merrick Garland denouncing the blatant discrimination contained in the field report. The Feb. 10, 2023, joint statement demanded the FBI "immediately and unequivocally order agency personnel not to target Americans based on their religious beliefs and practices," and said the obvious bigotry "harkens back to some of the worst chapters of our past."

The chief legal officers for 20 states renounced the field report as "part of a dangerous tendency in the FBI and DOJ to label those who hold views contrary to the Administration as violent extremists or terrorists"; decried spying on Catholics in their churches and cathedrals as "an absurd use of federal law-enforcement and counterintelligence resources"; and expressed alarm that "FBI operatives should be developing 'sources with access,' including in 'places of worship,' to identify the bad Catholics."

The DOJ also came under fire in 2021 for targeting parents after the White House assisted a national school board group with a letter that demanded the investigation of parents who were described as engaging in "a form of domestic terrorism" because these parents objected to mask mandates and the teaching of critical race theory in schools.

The FBI has subsequently rescinded the report.

## Mister Rogers was right: 'Boys are boys'

ARLINGTON, Va. (LBM) – A vintage video has resurfaced of "Mister Rogers" (Fred Rogers) that has triggered at least some transgender advocates.

In the 40-year-old clip that was posted on TikTok, the PBS icon sang, "Everybody's Fancy," an upbeat little ditty about the differences between boys and girls:

"Boys are boys from the beginning. If you were born a boy, you stay a boy. Girls are girls right from the start. If you were born a girl, you stay a girl, and grow up to be a lady. Everybody's fancy, Everybody's fine. Your body's fancy and so is mine," he sang.

In an additional clip, Rogers added the lyrics, "Only girls can be the mommies. Only boys can be the daddies."

The reason for the song was revealed in a different recording posted on Breitbart.com, which captured Rogers on "The Tonight Show" with Johnny Carson.

"Sometimes children think that they might change — they might have to change after a while," he said. "And you know, we laugh about that now, but it's because we had that concern when we were little."


"Yeah, because you're really not sure and you thought maybe you'd become a girl, or a girl would become a boy, right?" Carson seemed to quip.

"Exactly," Rogers responded, but in all seriousness.

## Despite growing numbers of 'nones,' more Americans 'open to God'

VENTURA, Calif. (LBM) – The faith-based Barna Group released recent findings that indicate there is a rising spiritual openness in America.

The October 2022 study published last month adds See CULTURAL NEWS, page 15

complex to the changing spiritual landscape in the country, especially in view of a May 2022 Gallup poll that showed a drop in belief in God. Gallup's survey results indicated that 81 percent of Americans believe in God, a six-point drop from 2017, which includes a 10 percent decrease among young adults (18-29 years old).

Meanwhile, the Barna data revealed that about three-quarters of all adults (Gen Z, Millennials, Gen X and Boomers) want to grow spiritually (73, 77, 77, 72 percent, respectively), and even higher numbers believe there is a spiritual dimension to life (83, 83, 82, 79 percent), and specifically acknowledge that God or a higher power exists (77, 76, 77, 79 percent).

Importantly, Barna found "[n]early half (44%) say they are more open to God today than before the pandemic."

"Though religious affiliation and church attendance continue to decline, spiritual openness and curiosity are on the rise," Barna CEO David Kinnaman, Barna CEO concluded. "Across every generation, in fact, we see an unprecedented desire to grow spiritually, a belief in a spiritual / supernatural dimension and a belief in God or a higher power."

# NAMB VP resigns, infidelity cited

ALPHARETTA, Ga. (LBM) – Michael Crawford, vice president for strategies and development with the North American Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, who concomitantly served as executive director of the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware, resigned Feb. 3.

BCM/D leaders cited "moral failure involving marital indiscretions" as disqualifying him to serve in his state role, according to a letter posted on CapstoneReport.com.

Baptist Press reported that a "NAMB spokesman confirmed ... his contract with the entity was terminated Feb. 3."

Crawford is the third high-profile personality with NAMB ties, during the last eight months, to be disqualified to serve in a leadership role because of moral failures.

Baptist Press published May 20 that NAMB had canceled contracts with Future Church, because its founder, Will Mancini, a church leadership and vision consultant, had admitted "to infidelity." NAMB told the media outlet that Mancini provided "leadership equipping to [Southern Baptist] pastors, state conventions and local associations." Baptist Press said Mancini "worked alongside hundreds of Southern Baptist churches during his time with the organization as well as with Auxano, an organization he founded and later sold to Lifeway Christian Resources.'

Meanwhile, two days later, May 22, *Baptist Press* announced that Johnny Hunt had resigned nine days earlier, May 13, as vice president for evangelism with NAMB after being accused of having "sexually assaulted the wife"

of an SBC pastor in 2010. Hunt, via Twitter, May 27, described the circumstances as a "consensual encounter."

-- Experiencing His kingly authority, they willingly invite Him to come rule over all the spaces in their hearts.


-- Experiencing His holiness, they are wrecked to realize how their sins have grieved His heart.

# LOUISIANACHURCHES Transfer of Gibsland facility preserves Gospel witness

GIBSLAND, La. (LBM) – Cypress Springs Baptist Church was on life support in August 2022 and knew it was only a matter of time before they had to make a difficult decision about their future, according to members. The once-vibrant church had dwindled to just five active members and felt another congregation could move in and better reach the community.

After months of seeking the Holy Spirit's direction, the church shared with Bienville Baptist Association Mission Strategist Randy Hales their desire for a preaching presence to continue in the building. Through the conversation, Hales suggested they transfer their property to the Louisiana **Baptist Foundation until** another church could be found to occupy the facility.

Within a matter of weeks, God answered their prayers.

The sale of the facilities was finalized on Oct. 27 (with funding provided through a grant from the Louisiana Baptist Convention), and Resurrection Fellowship (also an LBC congregation) held its first worship service inside the building on Nov. 20.

Additionally, an endowment to aid ministerial students, who worship with a Bienville Baptist Association church, was established via a transfer of \$30,000 that remained in the CSBC account. The North American Mission Board gifted an additional \$10,000 to the fund.

"Everything just fell into place," CSBC Pastor Don Woodard told the Baptist Message. "We realized we couldn't continue as a congregation and wanted a Gospel witness to continue in that building. When our remaining members were told that a preaching presence would continue inside our facility and we would be able to help out ministerial students, you could just see a gleam in their eyes."

#### **KINGDOM FOUNDATION**

LBF Executive Director Jeffrey Steed said he was honored to help fulfill the wishes of the former Cypress Springs Baptist Church.

"The bottom line is we didn't lose a preaching point at Cypress," he said. "And equally important is Cypress wanted to have a perpetual impact on the Kingdom from the endowment.

"Part of what we do is help with gifts," he continued. "It's one of the reasons we exist. This was a gift given to us by Cypress. We tried to help them achieve their goals. This is one of many ways the foundation can be involved with real estate transactions related to Baptist life that can help grow the Kingdom."

#### **CONVENTION COOPERATION**

John Hebert, who recently retired as Louisiana Baptist Missions and Ministry team director, expressed gratitude for the outcome, and explained that funding for Resurrection Fellowship's purchase of the facilities was provided in part from the Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering.

'One of the main goals of the missions team and the church growth team is to partner with churches that are failing or closing,' Hebert said. "It's a real joy to find a situation like this where help can really make a big difference. Resurrection Pastor Max Rasbury is a seasoned veteran with a passion to reach unreached people. This was a perfect opportunity for Louisiana Baptists to make a huge difference by making this grant which

made this acquisition possible."

#### **RESURRECTED MINISTRY**

Rasbury said the move allows his church to accommodate up to 170 people for Sunday worship at the 1200-sq.-ft. building, compared to 75 that could be seated in their former 400-sq.-ft. facility five miles away.

Because God provided all the funding needed to purchase the new facility, Rasbury said his congregation is financially free to raise money for construction of additional classrooms and a fellowship hall.

"We as a church body feel God has moved us to this location intentionally with the idea that He is going to show us what we can do in this community to reach them and grow his church," Rasbury said. "We know God has a plan and we are praying He will show us where to go from here."
