DEVILLE, La. (LBM) – Former Vice President Mike Pence did not reveal his plans regarding the 2024 presidential election: however, in an exclusive interview with the Baptist Message, March 19, he did ask for Louisiana Baptists and other people of faith to pray for him and his wife Karen as they seek "to discern our path forward."

NATIONWIDE REVIVAL

Pence, whose spiritual awakening took place during a Christian music festival in Wilmore, Kentucky, home of Asbury University,

Louisiana women to 'Embrace' their purpose

NATCHITOCHES, La. (LBM) – Louisiana Baptist women will be challenged to embrace their God-given purpose to make disciples of all nations during the upcoming Louisiana Baptist Women's Missions and Ministry conference, April 21-22, in the facilities of the First Baptist Church, Natchitoches.

Embrace is a time for women who are involved in missions and women's ministry to gather and encourage one another," Christine Gill told the Baptist Message. She is the Louisiana Baptist Women's Missions and Ministry strategist "They are also equipped with practical skills to support missions while discovering new opportunities for service. The ladies take the ideas they learn at Embrace back to

their churches and communities, because they want to be part of God's plan in spreading the Gospel in all places to all people."

The conference will include messages from Tara Dew (wife of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary President Jamie Dew), and worship will be led by Ann Gilbert Fenn (wife of First Baptist West Monroe Associate Pastor Mark Fenn). Attendees also will engage with an **International Mission** Board missionary; hear from representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention Woman's Missionary Union and Lifeway Christian Resources; attend breakout sessions; and participated in a panel discussion with licensed mental health professionals from around the state.

Breakout topics this year cover such issues as

spiritual warfare; reaching college-aged women; rediscovering children's missions; hospitality as a ministry; setting healthy boundaries; nurturing mental health in children; building a team; benefits of WMU membership; life as an IMB missionary; planning a women's ministry event; and basics about addiction recovery ministry.

Women also will have an opportunity to "Pack the Trailer" for Rolling Hills Ministries, which will open a new thrift store in Natchitoches, soon (a list of acceptable donation items can be found at rollinghillsministries.com/ donate). "We wanted to provide the women who attend Embrace an opportunity to participate in a mission project this year, since they greatly desire to serve others in tangible ways," Gill said.

Dedicated FBC Longville serves in the storm

LONGVILLE, La. (LBM) - August 27, 2020, will forever be a milestone in the life of the First Baptist

Church in Longville, Louisiana. In the early morning hours, Hurricane Laura – a category 4 storm with 150 mph winds – struck, tearing off the worship center roof, and damaging sur-

ngville, Loui-rounding buildings. Parly morning The fifty people with

The fifty people who had taken refuge in the church found themselves moving from room to room as the roof began to pull free. Then, with the rising of the sun a few hours later, a new reality dawned.

"I knew we needed to get started with something," Pastor Corey Townsley told the *Baptist* Message. "We didn't sleep the night before, but it wasn't like we could get any rest that day with no power. The destruction was overwhelming. We knew we had to start working and serving. Some got to work at the church grounds, others went out to clear roads and people's homes."

Dedication and service is not new to FBC Longville, a congregation that dates to 1907. The church has a longtime Helping Hands ministry that assists members as well as the surrounding community. Several congregants have trained and served with the Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief.

"Immediately after the hurricane, we began using chainsaws to clear drive-ways and roadways. We set up a command area at the church," says James Barrow, a deacon and member of Helping Hands. "We started taking and prioritizing work orders. We cut trees off roofs and tarped the damaged areas, set up generators for seniors and disabled."

A distribution area was set up for donations of canned goods, cleaning supplies, fuels, tarps, and various needs. The church family prepared food for work crews and distributed free meals to the community.

Almost a year to the

day of Laura's landfall, Hurricane Ida –identical in strength to Laura – hit the eastern part of the state. Even though FBC Longville was still in recovery mode, their servant attitude kicked in.

"We sent a team to cook and serve hot jambalaya out of First Baptist Church, Thibodeaux," FBC Longville Associate Pastor Phillip McDuffie said. "Another time, we took a roofing team that went out and tarped another local church's facility."

It took a year to settle with insurance, and with skyrocketing building costs during the delay, FBC Longville faces a pricey rebuild.

Helping Hands saved demolition costs by tearing down the old sanctuary and classrooms. They then sorted the remnants and

"But to see young people stepping forward today at Asbury and campuses around the country is deeply inspiring to me," he said.

In that context, Pence shared about a phone call with the AU president, who told him the chapel service that began the recent Asbury revival was "actually very ordinary." But he told Pence that at the end of it "people stayed and kept praying and people came forward, and said that 'God did something here at Asbury.'

"I think that God is doing something at campuses all across the country as young people today, who have literally been steeped in a culture of a postmodern America, appear to be turning back to what's timeless and what's true, and it's changing lives all over the country," Pence observed.

POLITICAL DISCORD

The former vice president also addressed the obvious political divisiveness in the country, calling it "a very challenging time in the life of this country."

He pointed out that "the policies of the Biden administration have weakened America at home and abroad," and expressed that "the American left seem every day to be assaulting the traditional values of religious liberty, the sanctity of life that really goes to the heart of what has always made this country strong and prosperous and free.

"But I do believe something very special is happening around the country," he emphasized. Foreign troubles as well as domestic challenges are pushing people to seek change, he said. But at the same time people are "longing for the kind of civility"

that American people show each other every day."

"I tell people, 'Once you get 15 miles out of Washington, D.C., the people in this country get along pretty well. But we just have got to have government as good as our people,'" he explained.

Pence said that means "being as principled as patriotic, as committed to life and liberty and our timeless

values." But he also said it means "doing what we can as believers to see if we can raise the debate, argue the issues firmly, but as the Bible says, always do so with gentleness and respect."

GREATEST SUCCESS

"With a son and sonin-law in the military, I think rebuilding the military after years of reckless budget cuts always is the first priority of the national government," Pence said, when asked to name his proudest contribution as vice president. "But after that I have to believe that the enduring legacy of our administration is the appointment of three of the justices that overturned Roe v. Wade and gave the American people a new beginning at life.

"I always believed that we would see Roe v. Wade sent to the ash heap of history where it belongs, much like the Dred Scott decision of more than a century and a half ago, he revealed. "But I didn't know if I would see it in our lifetime, and to have played some small part in the president's decision to appoint those three justices whose philosophy of the Constitution set a foundation to return the question of abortion to the states and the American people is a historic achievement.'

The page, found on LouisianaBaptists.org, offers phone numbers for reporting instances of abuse and to seek help for the victim; a proactive checklist to avert abuse; sexual abuse definitions and state statutes; how to protect minors; how to respond to an allegation; and resources for training and background screening.

"As I promised Louisiana Baptists during our past two annual meetings, this issue remains a priority," Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn told the Baptist Message. "The Sexual Abuse Resource Council I appointed has met diligently and has collected resources that will prayerfully assist churches and individuals in the prevention and response to sexual abuse. I ask Louisiana Baptists to join me in asking God to protect our churches from all forms of sexual abuse as we seek to maximize Gospel impact in our state."

Ray Swift, chairman of the Sexual Abuse Response Council and also director of pastoral leadership, said while they are not an investigative body, they were tasked with the responsibility to provide much needed resources.

"Our pastors and churches start have a biblical mandate to pursue righteousness and justice," Swift said. "As we have seen over the last several years, we have a sin problem within the Southern Baptist Convention. People are doing some evil things. As a Convention we certainly want to be available and be on the front line and to help in the area of sexual abuse prevention.

"We hope to provide a listening ear and a compassionate heart," he continued. "As people call us, which we do anticipate could happen, we will listen and given them good biblical advice."

For the past five months, Swift and other members of the Sexual Abuse Response Council have met to help guide work in sexual abuse awareness and reform. Swift, Administrative Assistant to the **Executive Director Jeannie** Saylor, Communications Associate (Stewardship and Cooperative Program) Stacy Morgan, Baptist Collegiate **Ministry Team Director** Mark Robinson, Adult Ministry Strategist Jeff Ingram, Administrative Assistant / **Human Resource Specialist** Jessica Fontenot and Women's Missions and Ministry Strategist Christine Gill have served as committee members.

Those meetings produced the resource page that was posted on March 13.

Additionally, Louisiana Baptist leaders took other measures including:

--LBC staff members, including personnel from Tall Timbers Baptist Conference and Baptist Collegiate Ministries, were trained by Ministry Safe, a national ministry that equips churches and ministry programs to better protect children from sexual abuse, with particular emphasis on recognizing signs that abusers are "grooming" victims. Horn noted staff will continue ongoing online training to stay current on the matter.

--The administrative committee adopted a change in its personnel manual prior to the Executive Board meeting regarding the chain for reporting abuse within the staff. Instead of stopping with Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn, employees are advised that they can report to the Executive Board president.

--Language was added to the LBC Personnel Handbook as to what steps to take regarding any allegations of reports of abuse within the organization.

--Horn and LBC President Reggie Bridges attended a meeting in Nashville, Tennessee, April 4, 2022, with other state convention leaders for an update from the Southern Baptist Convention Sexual Abuse Task Force.

Journey Church celebrates 100 baptisms in 2022

PINEVILLE, La. (LBM) – Journey Church is in revival and all signs point to this movement of the Holy Spirit continuing for some time.

Since January, Pastor James Greer has seen lives changed as they have recorded 222 salvation decisions and 43 baptisms.

"I've never seen anything like what has happened the first four months of this year," Greer told the *Baptist Message*. "It's not what we are doing but what God is doing."

Originally Lee Heights Family Church in Pineville, the congregation moved in 2009 to the former site of Donahue Family Church and changed the name to Journey Church. Since then, the congregation (which averages 562 in Sunday worship and baptized 105 in 2022) has

celebrated the baptism of 1,072 new members into the body of Christ and witnessed hundreds of other spiritual decisions, including repentances to restore fellowship with Christ, and commitments to vocational missions and ministry.

The congregation's core value, "Growing People Change," facilitates growth. Meanwhile, its message to the lost, "I mess up, you mess up, we all mess up," helps start conversations to convey the truth that Christ is the answer.

That mindset is what drew Arlene Clark to Journey Church. Clark was baptized Sept. 28 alongside two friends, after the Holy Spirit convicted her of the need to make her decision to accept Christ public and follow through with baptism.

"I chose to do it as an outward symbol of how Christ changed my life,"



she said. "While watching the 'Chosen' series, I saw even Jesus was baptized and I was like 'girl you need to get baptized.' If this Savior was baptized, I should.

"Our church has a warm, non-judgmental atmosphere," she continued. "The world beats a lot of people up. They don't have to put on anything special to come to each week. At Journey, we show a lot of love. When people walk in, that's what they feel and my life is a testimony to that."

Journey Church ministries include Fall Fest, Vacation Bible School, tailgating at all Tioga High School home football games, a "stuff the bus" with school supplies for students at Lessie Moore Elementary School, Together Tuesday (an effort where they joined community members for a time of encouragement before the school day began at area schools), Celebrate Recov-

Still, he said, work remains to be done, and "whatever our life leads to" he said he is determined to push to "restore the sanctity of life to the center of American law in every state in the country.

"I truly do believe," he

continued, "we save the babies, we will save America."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

As for work that still needs to be done, Pence identified a looming




financial crisis as the "greatest challenge" the country faces – especially future generations. "We have a national debt today the size of our nation's economy," he noted. "That hasn't happened since the end of World War II."

He also proposed a national conversation about reforming these safety nets "for Americans under the age of 40," so any changes would not impact anyone at the point of the need or who will retire in the next 25 years.

"I think we have an obligation in this generation, when we can do it without imposing hardship on people in the form of much higher taxes or actually cutting programs," Pence said. "We can reform those

systems with compassion, with common sense and we can set our nation back on a path to fiscal solvency."

He said the next administration "has to roll our sleeves up and put

our nation back on the path to fiscal responsibility and reform."

PRAYER REQUEST

Vice President Pence closed the interview by asking Louisianans to pray for him and his wife, Karen.

"We believed, at least the last 20 years, that we just wait for a clear sense of our calling; and we have been praying about just having a sense of where we might be called -- not next serve -- but where we might step forward," he disclosed. "John Adams said memorably, 'Duty is ours and outcomes belong to God.' So, I covet the prayers of any of the faithful here in Louisiana as we try to discern our path forward and see what role we might play in the days ahead."



'Value of a soul' ignites Gilbert revival, awakening

GILBERT, La. (LBM)— It is not often that a revival begins with evidence of the work of the Holy Spirit already in sight. But the annual Bill Britt four-day event with the First Baptist Church in Gilbert began with 19 baptisms, reflecting transformed hearts before the first word was preached.

Pastor Bubba Ezell told the *Baptist Message* that lives began to be changed after the congregation committed to showing greater respect for the value of one soul.

He said he returned from the 2023 Louisiana Baptist Evangelism Conference in January and told his congregation, "I would sell this building for one soul. I would give it all up for a soul."

He said it was the challenge of "How far are we willing to go?" that created a spark in the church.

Ezell emphasized this


point by sharing about a particular example within their Amazing Grace addiction recovery ministry, which has about 30 members.

"I started asking them to witness to one person a week, and to write it down," he explained. "Three of our guys led people to Christ." Other things began happening and before long, he said, "We started getting our hearts right with God about the value of a soul."

"The Holy Spirit is moving among the members of our church, and it's been that way for six weeks," Ezell added.

He offered other instances of how revival among the saved has led to an awakening among the lost.

SBC EC hires Guidepost Solutions for additional role

NASHVILLE, Tenn. – The Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force has recommended the Southern Baptist Convention Credentials Committee hire Guidepost Solutions to establish and maintain a "Ministry Check" website database for those credibly accused of sexual abuse, according to *Baptist Press*, the news division of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.

The Pathway, the news service of the Missouri Baptist Convention, reported that the task force's recommendation of Guidepost was made despite criticism about Guidepost's open support of "Gay Pride" month. Last June, Guidepost Solutions, which, on behalf of the SBC, published the disputed "Report of the Independent Investigation"

about alleged mishandling of sex abuse by the SBC EC, tweeted, "Guidepost is committed to strengthening diversity, equity and inclusion and strives to be an organization where our team can bring their authentic selves to work.

"We celebrate our collective progress toward equality for all and are proud to be an ally to our LGBTQ+ community," the post added.

Marshall Blalock, ARITF chairman and pastor of the First Baptist Church in Charleston, South Carolina, conceded to SBC EC members that "some Southern Baptists will immediately have concerns about our choice.' However, he claimed Guidepost Solutions had "altered their social media engagement so this will not be an issue going forward," Baptist Press reported. He also said Guidepost Solutions had

formed a new "faith-based division" whose leader has ties to Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary to oversee the \$1.5 million - \$2 million project (funded by \$3 million contributed by the International Mission Board and the North American Mission Board via Send Relief).

NAMB hires D.C. firm for McRaney lawsuit

AMORY, Miss. -- Court records show the North American Mission Board has added the law firm of WilmerHale of Washington, D.C., to represent it in the lawsuit, McRaney v. NAMB, which alleges the SBC entity illegally interfered in Will McRaney's employment as executive director of the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware as well as other potential work opportunities

NAMB has already retained ButlerSnow, a law firm of 390 attorneys, that "emerged from being primarily a regional firm to one with national scope," according to butlersnow. com. The company is based in Mississippi where the lawsuit was filed, and they continue to represent NAMB.

U.S. News & World Report lists WilmerHale as "a leading, full-service international law firm with 1,077 lawyers located throughout 13 offices in the United States, Europe and Asia." Additionally, WilmerHale "clinches the title of most-liberal among the nation's largest law firms," according to law360.com (citing a Stanford study). Meanwhile, WilmerHale boasts on its website: "WilmerHale Again Receives 100 Percent Rating on LGBTQ Equality"; "WilmerHale Named Among the Best Places to


Work for LGBTQ Equality"; and "WilmerHale Becomes Visionary National Legal Partner of the National Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce."

McRaney is represented by W. Harvey Barton (Pascagoula, Mississippi) and Scott E. Gant (Washington, D.C.).

SBC EC releases CP trend report

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -The financial office of the SBC Executive Committee released its monthly report for February, and the year-to-date numbers showed Cooperative Program gifts had declined year-to-year for the first five months of the 2022-2023 budget cycle (Oct. 1-Feb 28). Donations were down \$7,885,949.66, or 8.77 percent off, com-

"People are getting their marriages back together. Then their kids get saved,' he said. "Sunday, a lady got saved when one of the deacons led her to the Lord."

"I got down on my knees to speak to a little kid dressed in cowboy boots in the front row," he continued. "He acted like he was shooting at me and then hid his hand behind him. I stuck my hand out and said, 'Let me pray for you, young man.' His mother was with him, and I could hear her start to sob. I

said, 'Ma'am, are you okay?' and she said, 'I need to get saved.'"

Ezell said the result of this renewed focus by the congregation on the value of one soul is that someone has repented for salvation each week.


"We had a guy saved at 5:30 this morning," Ezell said during the phone interview, describing how the man came to grips with the fact that he was a sinner and needed a Savior. "I told Brother Bill, 'This is good."

Importantly, he underscored that the church begins discipleship immediately after a person declares Christ is Lord and was especially detailed about the program of spiritual health and growth for the men enrolled in Amazing Grace: "Monday night, another local pastor works with them. Tuesday is testimony night. We have people from all walks of life. Wednesday night, I teach them discipleship. Thursday night, we do Celebrate Recovery which walks them through steps of discipleship. Friday, we send them to another church to participate in 'Parting Waters.' Saturday night, we have a lady who sits down and

teaches them in specific steps in discipleship. She is 84 years old, and she studies the Bible more than any person I know. Sunday, of course, we have Sunday school. Also, six days each week I teach them Therapon, which is a belief therapy.



LRTL RV Tour: Helping to keep Louisiana pro-life

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) - Pro-life supporters must be proactive in opposing a possible bill that if passed during the upcoming legislation could legalize abortion in the case of rape or incest in the state, Louisiana Right to Life Executive Director Ben Clapper said during the "Keep Louisiana Pro-Life! RV Tour' stop at the Louisiana Baptist state mission center, March 15.

"We're concerned about that type of legislation passing in Louisiana," he said. "That's why we have decided to canvass the state, cross the state, to engage with legislators, engage with pro-life citizens to make sure people are educated and talking about these critical issues in our society."

Clapper was among those who spoke during a tour that began Feb. 27 and ends May 10 at Pro-Life Day at the Capitol in Baton Rouge. During each stop, speakers have encouraged the crowd to defend life and provide support to women in need. Participants also have been encouraged to sign a petition that asks Gov. John Bel Edwards and state legislators to oppose any legislation that would legalize abortion.

BACKGROUND

The tour comes on the heels of a June 24, 2022, ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court that overturned Roe v. Wade. Though the ruling did not itself ban abortion nationwide, the decision triggered a 2006 state law, updated during the 2022 legislative session, that instantly outlawed abortion in Louisiana.

Edwards, who previously had voiced his opposition to all abortions, reversed course last year and publicly supported abortion in the case of rape or incest. State legislators are expected to take up the bill when the legislative session convenes April 10.

"We know there is going to be a piece of legislation that's going to be brought forth to legalize abortion in these cases," Clapper said. "And our hope is that we want to go forward. We don't want to go backwards. We're going to have a tough time to stop that effort."

'PLANT THE FLAG, MOVE FORWARD'

Will Hall, director of the Louisiana Baptist

Office of Public Policy, reminded the crowd they helped in a large way to pass the 2020 state constitutional amendment, the Love Life Amendment (which prevents a rogue actor in the judicial system from suddenly finding a right to abortion in the state constitution that is not actually written in it). The statewide ballot initiative garnered 1,274,167 favorable votes, the most in Louisiana's history for either a candidate or ballot measure.

He said that while some may contend abortion should be allowed in the case of rape or incest because of "compassionate reasoning," he does not support such action because he is opposed to killing a baby "for the sin of the father." Additionally, Hall said, he is pragmatic, explaining that these exceptions would

allow Planned Parenthood to advise clients to claim rape or incest in order to obtain an abortion, noting that in the past, fewer than one percent of abortions were due to rape and fewer than onehalf of a percent of abortions were due to incest.

He encouraged Louisiana Baptists to continue their fight for life.

"We can't give up any ground," Hall said. "You take the ground, you plant the flag and you move forward. You keep advancing from the ground you have taken."

Kim Lyons, director of the CENLA Pregnancy Center in Alexandria, shared that the facility has served more than 1,500 women and provided more than 5,000 services, including most recently abortion pill re-

versal services. The center is listed on a national hotline that connects **CENLA Pregnancy** Center staff with women seeking to reverse the effects of the first pill taken for chemical abor-

'We so excited to know that when these moms are facing these crisis situations, the world is telling them if you have an unplanned pregnancy, you take the chemical abortion pill," she said. "That's the mentality our society has been breeding and festering. To know the love and the non-judgmental place we are everyday to our moms in need is really a safe haven.'

Dustin Bertrand, Louisiana Right to Life outreach director, shared how his mother chose to give him life even though he was conceived through rape.

"I'm really excited and I'm passionate and I'm mission driven to partner with Louisiana Right to Life to increase our courage and our boldness, to keep on being a pro-life state from the womb to the tomb with no exceptions," he said. "I'm definitely compassionate to women that undergo physical abuse. I don't condone it. I don't believe in it. But we also must protect innocent babies' lives. Because God had a plan for this unplanned man. How much more would he have for all of us here?"

State Rep. Mike Johnson, also a member at First Baptist Church, Pineville, thanked the crowd and asked them to contact their legislators now and get a commitment they will support pro-life bills that will be

voted on this session.

Johnson said he will be pushing legislation during the upcoming session that would make adoption more affordable to families in the state.

"I hope I can count on you to be just as enthused about being pro-life beyond birth for our children and for our mothers," he said. "You can make a difference. It's this group that has made a difference thus far with your help to bring us to this point. We've considered one of the most pro-life states in the nation. We want to continue to be that way, protecting these young lives and these great gifts from God.'

Abby Rose Nichols, youth director for Louisiana Right to Life and CENLA Pregnancy Center, shared about how students can become involved in pro-life efforts sentations, retreats and camps that train students to be pro-life leaders in the state.

'There is a startling statistic that says 47 percent of American women enter college identifying as pro-life but only 27 percent remain pro-life after graduation," she said. "I went to a Christian university and I still knew how difficult it was to remain pro-life in the


midst of our culture," she said. "We know one of the most important things we can do is equip our youth with education and empowerment.'

walked into the baptistery, March 12, with six more scheduled to be baptized. Moreover, by the end of the revival, March 15, 20 persons had


professed Christ as Savior and seven had surrendered their lives to ministry.


It was an amazing outpouring of God's love

pared to 2022.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

\$81,993,237.22 (YTD, FY 2023) \$89,879,186.88 (YTD, FY 2022)

Gifts through the Cooperative Program were 2.35 percent above what was budgeted for 2022-2023, according to Baptist Press. However, there is a twoyear lag in the SBC budgeting process, meaning the 2022-2023 budget was based on 2020-2021 Cooperative Program receipts, which were negatively impacted by the global pandemic and substantially less than donations in 2021-2022. So, 2022-2023 gifts are above what was planned based on 2020-2021 numbers, but down from the amount received during 2021-2022.

Designated giving for the first five months of the fiscal year also experienced a year-to-year decrease, falling 3.61 percent, or \$3,410,637.33 from the 2021-2022 budget cycle, with both the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering being negatively impacted.

IMB: 1,200 missionary candidates in pipeline

RICHMOND, Va. -- The SBC International Mission Board reported that its pipeline for missionary candidates has 1,200 trainees. This is a significant milestone for Southern Baptists, as the number of missionary candidates in 2019 was 300, according to the IMB press release.

The goal is to always have more than 1,500 applicants in the pipeline. [This is the number of candidates in line prior to the 2016 drawdown (focused on 50-year-old missionaries with five years of field experience) under former IMB President David

Platt.]

The announcement comes as IMB has suffered an ongoing decline in overseas missionaries for more than two decades but sliding significantly since 2010. IMB reported having 3,527 deployed missionaries on February 28, the lowest number of missionaries on the field since 1983 (3,386), counting only paid personnel (3,401), or 1984 (3,432) if 126 "team associates" are included. In 1985, there were 3,597 missionaries on the field.

Southern Baptists have given generously to abate the shrinking missionary force, donating record amounts to the last three completed Lottie Moon Christmas Offerings: \$203.7 million (2021-2022), \$177.6 million (2020-21) and \$159.5 million (2019-20).

James to nominate Barber for second term as SBC president

LAKE CHARLES, La. -

Steve James, pastor of the Trinity Baptist Church in Lake Charles, Louisiana, announced Feb. 13 his intention to nominate Bart Barber, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Farmersville, Texas, for a second term as president of the Southern Baptist Convention during the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting in New Orleans this June.

James and Barber served together on the board of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

According to information supplied to the Annual Church Profile, FBC Farmersville reported 14 baptisms in 2022 and averaged 320 in weekly worship. The church collected \$1,014,990 total undesignated receipts, with \$108,276 given through the Cooperative Program. The church also gave \$64,713 to the 2022 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering as well as \$630 to the 2022 **Annie Armstrong Easter**

Offering.

Barber is a graduate of Baylor University and has both an M.Div. and Ph.D. from Southwestern. He and his wife, Tracy, have two teenage children.



Importantly, the promise of salvation is to both the lost sheep of Israel as well as other sheep "not of this fold," meaning Gentiles like you and me (John 10:11-16). This is to fulfill the promise of Isaiah 49:6 that Jesus will "raise up the tribes of Jacob" and "restore the preserved ones of Israel" as well as be "a light to the Gentiles," extending salvation "to the ends of the earth."

Moreover, it is no small matter that the promise of salvation was fulfilled on the cross and the fullness of salvation was completed in the tomb.

Instead, the empty cross is a reminder that you and I don't have to be crucified to pay for our sins. The Bible tells us that "God demonstrates His own love for us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). And when Jesus

cried out "It is finished" (John 19:30) while dying on the cross, He was using an accounting phrase. He was saying, "The books are closed, and the cost has been 'paid in full!" He paid the price so that you and I don't have to bear that cost.

Likewise, the empty tomb offers assurance that one day we will be raised from the grave. Paul made this point by mocking death and the grave in his letter to the church at Corinth, telling believers that death has no sting for them, and the grave has no victory over them (1 Cor. 15:55).

Fortunately, the promise of salvation is still open to anyone who would humble himself or herself to Jesus, ask Him for forgiveness and mean it. The Bible says, "Though your sins be as scarlet, He will wash them white as snow" (Isaiah 1:18). In other words, He will give


you a clean slate.

In the end, this empty slate is the promise of Christ's empty cross and empty tomb. And above all else, both signify that the hope of Easter is not an empty promise.






