RIDING A SOUL-WINNING WAVE 1,300 saved, hundreds discipled in Hammond

HAMMOND, La. (LBM) – A 20-week extended revival and tent crusade in south Louisiana has recorded more than 1,300 salvation decisions, and hundreds have been enrolled in discipleship programs.

Moreover, all signs point to the meetings continuing for the foreseeable future.

According to local reports, 513 individuals surrendered their hearts and lives to Jesus during revival services, extended five times, Oct. 17-Nov. 18, at Old Zion Hill Baptist Church, Independence. Additionally, more than 800 covenanted to follow Him during the South Louisiana Awakening Tent Crusade, Hammond,

Despite perils, Louisiana Baptists continue overseas ministry in Haiti

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) – Escalating violence may have forced Louisiana Reach Haiti to halt most operations in the country, however, the ministry has found other ways to share the hope of Jesus in Haiti.

Ministry President Darrin Badon said he wishes LRH could have continued "business as usual" in Haiti, but he is grateful the Lord has allowed the ministry to move forward despite the many challenges. The ministry is a partnership between the Louisiana Baptist Convention, Haiti Baptist Convention, Louisiana Baptist churches and the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home & Family Ministries.

"It's been a faith builder," Badon said. "We may not be able to send teams or have as many ministries happening there as in the past. But we do have kids in our Children's Village and staff who depend on us to provide for them each month. The kids still need the Gospel, too, and the board members feel like we can't fail them.

"We are still in the trenches," he continued. "We are still restoring families and still are making a difference in the lives of them and the staff; and we need help to be able to continue to do that."

BACKGROUND

In January 2010, Haiti was devastated by an earthquake that killed more than 250,000 people and left hundreds of thousands homeless.

Cowboy Church ropes in lost souls

LEESVILLE, La. (LBM) – When Jason Nolde left an established pastorate in early 2022 to start Branded for Christ Cowboy Church, he believed God would use the new church plant to reach a special people group.

A year later, his faithfulness has been rewarded with an attendance increase from a core group of 10 who met for homebased Bible study in its infancy to 80 who now

Louisiana Baptists were among the first to provide disaster relief, and for nearly a decade they have maintained a ministry presence through mission trips, sometimes multiple times each year.

After the earthquake response, some members of the Louisiana Baptist team felt led to create a permanent presence in Haiti and partnered with Pastor Odvald Louis and his members at New Evangelical Baptist Church in Croix-Des-Bouquets. The Haitian congregation and Louisiana mission teams combined to complete a Children's Village in Croix-des-Bouquets. They also teamed up to dig a well and built a church building, school and medical in neighboring Canaan.

However, the facilities in both cities were overtaken

and vandalized by gangs in early 2022, Badon said.

REFOCUSED MINISTRY

LRH has now reorganized its efforts on multiple fronts:

-- In February 2022, escalating gang violence forced the Children's Village to relocate to the Florida House, a Florida Baptist Conventionowned home for missionaries in Port-au-Prince. The facility houses 21 children and six staff members.

-- Meanwhile God opened doors in New Orleans, allowing LRH leaders to help relocate Odvald Louis and his family from Haiti, which he fled after surviving an attempted poisoning by gang members.

-- Additionally, LRH began supporting Connect International Church, a congregation in New Orleans

that in April 2022 formed and hosted an international church (led by a Haitian American graduate of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary) that reaches out to Haitians and other nationalities. In July 2022, LRH partnered with Fellowship Church, Prairieville, and worked with this newly formed congregation to conduct Vacation Bible School for 30 Haitian children. This year, they are hoping to hold another VBS and assist in other evangelistic efforts.

"It's been neat to meet, see and serve alongside Haitian Americans and those who moved here to the US," Badon said. "This is God's way of telling is that while things aren't what we hoped they would be in Haiti, He still is working through Haitians right here in Louisiana."

Nov. 28-March 31, a multidenominational spiritual outreach.

The meetings were paused for April; however, they will resume May 4-5 and will continue after that on Thursday and Friday evenings, according to OZHBC Pastor Gary Dennis.

"The continuation of the meetings is for the purpose of reaching the huge number of people along the Interstate 12 corridor who are not connected to Christ and His Church," Dennis told the *Baptist Message*. "The evangelist (D.R. Harrison) has emphasized repeatedly that the tent is a soul-saving station intended to reach people and connect them with a disciple-making church."

Area churches have formed a follow-up team that developed a strategy to connect every new believer from both spiritual events with a local congregation in order for them to begin discipleship training:

 – each person who came forward received an email or text encouraging them to find a church home;

pastors were given
 contact information and
 have pledged to reach out to
 everyone on the list; and
 churches were prepped

to form new believer classes. So far, OZHBC has

been blessed to receive 100 adults who made decisions during the awakening of the lost that accompanied the revivals, and each has been enrolled into discipleship classes. Additionally, five new small groups have been formed since January, and additional groups are planned for the summer.

"The point of this is for them to turn around and go through it with others," OZHBC Associate Pastor Blaine St. Germain said. "We are pursuing the discipleship model of Jesus, teaching everyone who is going through the book 'how to be' and 'then make' disciples."

Louis Husser, pastor of Crossgate Church, a Louisiana Baptist congregation in Robert, has led his entire church through discipleship on Sunday mornings since early February. For six weeks, more than 60 people have gathered to learn more about the fundamentals of being a fully devoted follower of Christ through messages on salvation, baptism, gracious giving and sharing one's faith.

"God is stirring in people's hearts that don't even know there's a tent in town and they are coming, too," Husser said. "So, it's incredible that the Holy Spirit is leading people to come into our church who don't even know about the revival.

"I'm 68 and have seen three great awakenings in my 50 years of ministry," he continued. "We are seeing another one. It's a God movement that has come from a prayer that a group of us pastors prayed three years ago when we met to ask God to bring revival to our community." Randy Smith, pastor of Cross Brand Cowboy Church, Loranger, also with the LBC, has seen worship attendance increase to as high as 163, for a church that averages 100. He said 40 adults have participated in Wednesday evening discipleship classes, and several are being discipled in one-to-one settings.

"We have come together a lot more since the revival and have felt the presence of God like we haven't felt in a long time," he said. "God is moving in our lives and hearts and people are growing deeper in faith through digging into the Word. That's pretty exciting for a pastor to see."

OZHBC member David Knight said God has used the revival to transform him from an angry man to a sold-out Christ follower. Amidst an unpleasant work

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environment, Knight attended the second night of the revival, and the Holy Spirit convicted him of the need to change. From that point, Knight felt at peace and soon asked others to forgive him for taking out his anger on them.

"God had dealt with me for 20 years, but I never gave in," he said. "That night, DR preached on forgiveness, and the Holy Spirit kicked me out of the chair. I could not get to my feet fast enough to the altar. Even though I was saved, I have never been one to tell others about church and Jesus. He flipped the

LBDR trains 234 for disaster response

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – During recent training sessions, Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief officials trained 234 volunteers to serve in future responses to natural disasters and other emergencies.

Held at six locations around the state in January, February and March, the sessions included training for mud-out, feeding, chainsaw, chaplaincy and shower/laundry operations. More than 80 new volunteers were trained, and two new teams were formed.

The training followed a fruitful year of ministry for LBDR teams.

In 2022, LBDR teams responded to multiple tornadoes across the state and completed 27 rebuild projects at homes and churches damaged by Hurricane Ida in Houma a year earlier. Projects ranged from smaller jobs like replacing fence boards to more complex ones such as drywall

installation, electrical line re-wiring and plumbing replacement.

Teams also were deployed to Naples, Florida, a community impacted by Hurricane Ian in 2022. Units stationed at First Baptist Church, Naples, Oct. 3-Oct. 28, 2022, prepared more than 102,000 meals for residents, and another 4,000 for Southern Baptist DR team members. Teams also were able to

complete 373 mud-out jobs and celebrated with 28 individuals who made decisions to follow Christ.

LBDR team members were assisted by Texas Baptist Men, the Ohio Baptist Convention and an estimated 400 members of FBC, Naples, who hosted the three state conventions.

Additionally, Louisiana

Clara Springs Camp: 70 years of Kingdom impact

PELICAN, La. (LBM) -During its 70th anniversary celebration, March 24-26, several hundred people gathered to celebrate the life-changing impact that Clara Springs Baptist Camp had on them.

Held on the grounds of the camp in Pelican, the event featured the traditional Fourth Friday Fish Fry as well as concerts by the Southern Plainsmen and Vines and Company. There also were fireworks, games, and the Overcoming Obstacles Ministry's American Ninja Warrior course. Additionally, the weekend included a reunion of campers and group time for sharing memories of Clara Springs.

Bubba Mills, who has served as director since 2007, said the celebration reminded him about God's hand on the camp for 70 years.

'God has brought us through the good and bad times and blessed us tremendously," Mills told the Baptist Message. "Most

people would say God has blessed the camp through the buildings on the grounds and that certainly is true. But blessings also have come from those who have accepted Christ here and the hundreds we know who committed to ministry and who are now serving Christ all over the world.'

LASTING LEGACY

Clara Springs was born when the idea for the camp was presented at the 1952 District 8 Baptist Convention Annual Meeting. After the meeting, Clara Lord passed by the vacant Wallace Community School building and donated 15 acres of land adjacent to the property. She also spearheaded efforts to purchase the former school facility.

During the first summer of operations in 1953, campers utilized the old school building for a dormitory and chapel, an open pavilion for a dining hall, a pond for swimming, a grassy area for tent camping and springs for water.

Since then, Clara

Springs has expanded its facilities and ministry offerings. Last year, more than 7,000 people participated in various camps, retreats, conferences and the Fourth Friday Fish Fry.

Ron Thompson, missions coordinator for District 8 Baptist Convention, said God has blessed the camp with directors like Mills and his wife, Mandi, who have demonstrated true servant leadership.

"When we think of all God has done through the ministry of Clara Springs Baptist Camp and Conference Center - the boys and girls who came to camp for a few days of fun, and found their Savior Jesus; the teenagers searching for significance who surrendered to the call of minis-

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gather for worship in a Leesville municipal building. Importantly, Nolde has baptized five new converts and seen even more grow deeper in their Christian walks.

Nolde, formerly pastor of Canaan Baptist Church, Leesville, credits a focus on relationships, discipleship and simplicity as the keys to growth.

'Everything we will do is inspired by the western culture," Nolde told the Baptist Message. "We seek the lost, seek the fallen away and seek to grow."

Branded for Christ Cowboy Church was recognized in November 2022 as the 300th Louisiana Baptist church planted since 2010.

The congregation, which held its kickoff service at the Vernon Parish Rodeo Arena in Leesville on Nov. 13, 2021, conducts several targeted outreaches every three months. They have continued meeting in homes on Wednesdays since July but added a Sunday worship service after their kickoff service.

Outreach events have featured Wild Horse Ministries Founder Paul Daily, who demonstrates how training a horse is similar to training a non-believer to become a Christian; a goat roping and mutton busting exhibition (riding and racing sheep); and a rodeo. Importantly, the church assesses each event for mission viability using the "five C test" of the American Fellowship

of Cowboy Churches: Christ-centered, culturally relevant, constitutional, cost effective and consensus reached by its members.

Looking to the future, Branded for Christ Cowboy Church eventually plans to move into the former "feed and seed" store in downtown Leesville.

The building will allow for additional growth, more ministry opportunities and a visible presence in the community.

Other plans include the purchase a 25-acre tract that will include a big barn (to host services) and an arena (for fellowship and outreach). We are super excited about what the Lord has

already done, for what He has in store through this ministry He has planted, and for the spiritual

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CULTURALNEWS Task Force drops pro-LGBT Guidepost Solutions

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (LBM) – The chairman of the Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force of the Southern Baptist Convention has announced that the group, which has responsibility for developing and implementing a sexual abuse reporting system, has dropped plans to hire the controversial Guidepost Solutions for the project.

In a statement to The Baptist Paper, a sister publication of *The Alabama Baptist* newspaper,

Marshall Blalock, ARITF chair, said the group had voted "for the sake of building widespread confidence in the Ministry Check website, to seek firms other than Faith Based Solutions and Guidepost Solutions to create and manage the Ministry Check system."

The SBC has been under fire for having hired the

pro-gay Guidepost Solutions, which produced the disputed "Report of the Independent Investigation" about alleged mishandling of sex abuse by the SBC EC. Likewise, the SBC Executive Committee has been criticized for hiring the pro-LGBT Bradley law firm of Nashville to represent it in a related investigation by the Department of Justice.

Southern Baptists were similarly unhappy when the ARITF announced this year that it had hired Guidepost Solutions to develop the "Ministry Check" website.

For instance, the Florida Baptist Convention's State Board of Missions took the special step of adopting a resolution "acting ad interim for the Florida Baptist State Convention" that "urges the Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force and the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention to immediately cease further engagement and

negotiations with Guidepost Solutions and its subsidiary Faith Based Solutions."

Blalock told *The Baptist Paper* there "were many factors going into the decision." However, he said "primarily" the task force had reversed itself because "breaking up the work into different parts would allow us to search for smaller firms to do the constituent parts."

"There are advantages to having one firm do it all, but in the estimation of our team, the unity of the Baptists around the country outweighed those advantages," he wrote. "The work will not be compromised by dividing the responsibilities, which was our major concern. The messengers voted in Anaheim to build the Ministry Check website to help churches identify abusers so that they cannot quietly go from church to church, causing harm to vulnerable people. The ARITF is working under that mandate and we understand the sacred urgency of this task."

In a related devlopment, the North American Mission Board has hired the pro-LGBT D.C. law firm Wilmer Hale to represent it in the Mississippi lawsuit *McRaney V. NAMB*.

SBC EC reports continued downward CP trend

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (LBM) – The Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee released the March financial report, April 5, showing that gifts through the Cooperative Program had dropped 1.18 percent while designated giving for the month had increased 5.09 percent compared to March 2022.

Meanwhile, year-to-

date figures show both funding channels were in decline.

From October 2022 through March 2023, CP contributions were down 7.62 percent overall compared to the same timeframe for the last fiscal year. Likewise, designated giving was down 3.9 percent year-to-date for the same months.

Both the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering were down for the new fiscal year through the end of March.

Only eight states showed a positive CP trend for the year, including three "old line" Southern states, Louisiana, North Carolina and a combined Virginia (which has two state conventions). Louisiana and North Carolina also showed a positive trend in designated giving.

switch that night and I cried a while. That next morning it was like the weight of the world was on my shoulder. So, I texted those guys and ended up getting right with a bunch of them. It was at that point I realized God was using me and wanted to do something with me."

Knight said he was not useful to God "with the way I was acting." Since surrendering all to Christ and finding peace, he has obtained a teaching job "out of the clear blue ... and it's a job I love."

"The revival has made me aware of things that God may have blessed me with different things in life," he explained. "When God called me and I finally answered, He made my life completely better. When you're that angry person all the time and then you're not, that's nothing but the Holy Spirit."

ÓZĤBC member Garrett Kimble said his daughter accepted Christ and his wife and son restored fellowship with the Lord during the early part of the revival.

Another memorable moment was the opportunity to lead a man to Christ in the church parking lot who had intended to commit an evil act against another individual.

Kimble said any other time his hardened heart would have prevented him from being willing to share Christ with this type of individual, but His engagement with the Holy Spirit in the services changed him.

"The Holy Spirit changed my heart and showed me that the man needed Jesus," he said. "God used my weakness that day to witness to him.

"Overall, this revival has had a tremendous, positive effect on my life and my family. Specifically, the Holy Spirit has shown me that true, Holy Spirit revival starts by individual, self-evaluation, prayer and repentance," he continued. "I'm so joyful that God chose my church and my community for such a powerful spiritual awakening. We have already observed our young people develop a hunger for the word of God. I truly believe that this is only the beginning, and we will see the lasting effects for generations to come.'

BACKGROUND

From the first revival service, which began Oct. 17, a spirit of expectancy was among the community of Independence, according to Dennis. Each night, the pews were packed out in the Old Zion Hill Baptist Church worship center and participants filled the altar as they cried out to God about their respective needs for Him.

In early November, in anticipation of the tent crusade, 355 individuals signed up to pray 30 minutes each day; and two weeks before the crusade, hundreds more gathered for prayer on site, he said.

Additionally, 81 were trained as decision counselors.

Meanwhile, due to the extent of revival among believers and awakening among the lost, the initial crusade (originally scheduled through Oct. 21) was extended five times through Nov. 18 (with pauses at various times, including for regular weekly worship).

Once that prolonged event ended, the tent crusade preparations began.

Touch Ministries, a global evangelical broadcasting effort that reached millions around the world in more than 127 languages. -- He

published 70 books totaling 10

Judge dismisses lawsuit against SWBTS, Patterson

PLANO, Texas (LBM) – U.S. District Judge Sean Jordan has dismissed claims related to a lawsuit against Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and its former president, Paige Patterson.

Jordan's judgment against the allegations of negligence (regarding protection of the plaintiff) and defamation (based on statements by others, not Patterson) relating to a sexual assault on campus was issued "with prejudice," meaning that the plaintiff, "Jane Roe," cannot refile the claims, although she is able to appeal the ruling.

Jordan rejected portions of Roe's evidence as "opinion" and "irrelevant," noting "Patterson and SWBTS immediately notified local law enforcement authorities of Roe's outcry," and "Roe declined to pursue charges against Doe."

Patterson was fired by SWBTS trustees in 2018 after "a series of media reports alleging that Patterson had committed various misdeeds while at SWBTS and his former institution, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary ("SEBTS"), as well as a petition signed by thousands of Southern Baptist women criticizing Patterson for his past conduct," according to court documents.

SWBTS trustees elect Dockery, president, and Hawkins, chancellor

FORT WORTH, Texas (LBM) – Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary trustees have elected David S. Dockery as the 10th president of the institution and O.S. Hawkins to the new role of chancellor.

Dockery had been serving as interim president, and Hawkins was acting as senior adviser and ambassador at large.

Dockery succeeds Adam Greenway who resigned amid trustee concerns of "dysfunctionality amongst senior leadership, budget mismanagement, overspending resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars of deficits per month and attempts to pass the blame for these matters onto three different chief financial officers who were each removed," according to an Oct. 18, 2022, SWBTS press release.

Greenway followed Paige Patterson who was fired in 2018 because of negative media reports and social media activism regarding women's issues.

Dockery and Hawkins are SWBTS alumni.

Before serving in their temporary SWBTS roles, Dockery was on the SWBTS faculty (since 2019) and Hawkins was retired, after serving 25 years as president and CEO of GuideStone Resources until March 2022.

The new position of chancellor is a volunteer position that will allow Hawkins to continue advising Dockery, and the title "will greatly aid his efforts in supporting the seminary," according to an April 19 SWBTS press release.
