ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – The 10 Commandments may be viewed from several perspectives:

-- Some believers see them simply as a list of dos and don'ts.



-- Others consider them in the context of their origins: As the first formal instruction to the Hebrew nation after escaping from Egypt, these

were something of a primer for Israel to transition from being a people of Pharoah for 400

years to becoming the people of the one true God in perpetuity.

-- More, still, look at these basic tenets in terms of how they are grouped (the first four address a relationship with God; the fifth involves family relationships; and the last five broadly describe relationships with everyone else). Together, these commandments reveal a hierarchy of relationships within the relational world God created for us as relational beings. In other words, God tells us to make Him the priority in our relationships, then family (and by inference, marriage) and, finally, yet importantly, our neighbors.

Regardless, in all three perspectives, the stricture in the third commandment is the

MESSENGERS ADDRESS KEY ISSUES AT SBC23

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) - Messengers to the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting enjoyed fellowship and inspiring worship, but also conducted a lot of important business, June 13-14, in New Orleans.

CHURCHES PURGED

Messengers voted to disfellowship three churches who were found to be "not in friendly coopConvention.

Representatives from Saddleback Church, Lake Forest, California (three ordained women pastors), Fern Creek Baptist Church, Louisville, Kentucky (female senior pastor), and Freedom Church, Vero Beach, Florida (mishandling of sex abuse allegation), made appeals regarding their respective cases. After each of these speakers, a representative of the Convention responded. Messengers then cast a ballot vote.

The results were overwhelmfound to be "not in friendly coop-eration" with the Southern Baptist Creek, 9,700 (91.85 percent) "for" and 806 (7.63 percent) "against"; Freedom Church, 9,984 (96.46 percent) "for" and 343 (3.31 percent) 'against"; and Saddleback Church, 9,432 (88.46 percent) "for" and 1,212 (11.36 percent) "against."

In his appeal for his former congregation, Saddleback Church, Rick Warren claimed there were "1,928 churches with women on pastoral staff" in the SBC.

BOTH

Please submit the candidate's name and identify the committee or board for which you are nominating him or her and include information about the nominee's church membership and current employment.

No more than the pastor and two members from any church may serve on all boards and committees, combined, at any one time. Likewise, no more than one member of the same church may serve on the same board or committee at any one time.

RESOLUTIONS

The first Committee on Resolutions meeting is scheduled for Sept. 21 and submissions are requested to be sent as early as possible for consideration. Resolutions may be submitted for review and consideration no more than 90 days and no fewer than 15 days prior to the LBC annual meeting, Nov. 14, providing a window of opportunity from Aug. 16 through Oct. 30.

All statements should be typewritten, titled, and dated, and accompanied by a letter – from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention – certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing. The letter should include complete contact information for both the person submitting it and his or her church.

No person may submit more than three resolutions per year.

NOBTS' Fred Luter Jr. Student Center dedicated

NEW ORLEANS (NOBTS communications) – More than 4,000 friends and dignitaries gathered in front of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College June 14 to celebrate the dedication of the Fred Luter Jr. Student Center, and to hear the presentation of a state resolution accompanied by local proclamations honoring "the pastor of New Orleans."

Meanwhile, the air of festivity was enhanced by the smell of New Orleans' signature char-grilled oysters cooking onsite combined with the sound of the Franklin Avenue Baptist Church choir's singing.

DOUBLE HONOR

Jamie Dew, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College president, turned to the guest of honor, Fred Luter Jr., pastor of Franklin Avenue Baptist Church in New Orleans, and a former president of the Southern Baptist Convention, during the ceremony and asked him to survey the large crowd.

"Do you see them?" Dew asked. "Do you see the people you've had an impact on? Do you see the people throughout our Convention that you have had an impact on?

"You have been faithful. You have been diligent. You have labored hard, and God, through your humble obedience to Jesus Christ, has used you profoundly," Dew continued. "We celebrate you tonight, my friend."

The Fred Luter Jr. Student Center faces the busy Gentilly Blvd. that runs in front of the seminary. The building once housed a well-known clothing department store. Now the renewed facility is a central feature of the NOBTS

task force to investigate sexual abuse allegations in Southern Baptist churches, messengers to the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting, June 14, extended the Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force another year.

Meanwhile, the task force announced that a prototype website, sbcabuseprevention. com, was live. For the time being, searches for potential predators will produce only

placeholder information. However, when fully operational, it will allow churches to identify those who have: -- confessed an abuse in a

nonprivileged setting; -- been convicted of abuse

in a court of law; -- had a civil judgment

rendered against them for committing abuse; or -- been "credibly accused"

according to the preponderance of evidence, as exam-

ined by an independent third party.

However, the website also provides a "Ministry Toolkit' that offers congregations key resources to train, screen, protect, report and care. The online materials include sample forms and references to ministries who can assist with each of these five areas.

MISSIONARY REPORTS

International Mission Board President Paul Chitwood, in his report, said that last year SBC missionaries working with in-country partners recorded 178,000 salvation decisions, baptized 102,000 new believers and started 21,000 new churches. Chitwood pleaded with messengers to support the

"home team" that is the IMB, acknowledging that 1,200 missionary candidates currently are in the application process. After the report, the IMB held a commissioning service for 79 missionaries entering the field.

The IMB's inputs to the 2023 SBC Book of Reports noted the overseas force had declined by 71 from 2021, ending 2022 with 3,521 missionaries on the field. Additionally, the entity's website showed the count had dropped to 3,486 (including 123 unpaid volunteers) as of May 31, 2023.

Meanwhile, North American Mission Board President Kevin Ezell, in his report, said 10,000 new churches have been planted since 2010. He noted that these church

plants have a four-year survival rate of 86.2 percent, make up nearly 25 percent of all SBC congregations in the non-South and are responsible for nearly one-fourth of all baptisms in the non-South.

NAMB's data in the 2023 SBC Book of Reports indicated 639 new churches were planted in 2022, the highest number since 2018 when 691 congregations were started; but below the 1,364 church plants in 2009, the year prior to a major shakeup resulting from recommendations by the Great Commission Resurgence Task Force.

ELECTIONS

Bart Barber, pastor of First Baptist Church, Farmersville, Texas, was re-elected SBC president, winning against Georgia Pastor Mike Stone by a margin of 7,531 votes (68.38 percent) to 3,458 votes (31.40 percent).

In other elections, messengers elected Jay Adkins (pastor, First Baptist Church, Westwego,) first vice-president; Kason Branch (pastor, Creekstone Church, Richland Hills, Texas) second vicepresident; Don Currence (administrative pastor, First Baptist Church, Ozark, Missouri), registration secretary; and Nathan Finn (provost, North Greenville University, South Carolina) recording secretary.

Two Louisiana Baptists also ran but were unsuccessful. Gevan Spinney (pastor, First Baptist Church, Haughton) received 587 votes to Adkins's 2,393 in the election for first vice-president and Shane Terrebonne (pastor,

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

Gulf Coast Baptist Church, Golden Meadow) received 2,098 to Branch's 2,502 votes in the election for second vice-president.

LOUISIANA PASTOR ELECTED EC CHAIR

SBC Executive Committee members elected Philip Robertson, pastor of Philadelphia Baptist Church, Deville, as the next chairman.

After two votes (36-35 in favor of Russ Barksdale and 35-35) did not produce a winner by the needed majority, Barksdale of Arlington, Texas, withdrew his name.

Robertson said several individuals approached him

about submitting his name for the position. After much prayer he agreed, but only when David Sons, pastor of Lake Murray Baptist Church, Lexington, South Carolina, decided not to serve in that role again. Sons has served since April, after then EC Chairman Jared Wellman resigned to be considered for CEO and president of the Executive Committee but failed to be elected to that capacity.

MOTIONS

Messengers considered more than 30 motions, and in the end approved three: -- a change to the Baptist

Faith and Message 2000 that emphasizes only men may serve as pastor;

-- appointment of a task force to study the impact of the Great Commission Resurgence and

recommendations that were adopted in 2010; and

-- creation of a task force to study what it means to be "in friendly cooperation" with the Convention.

Other motions were referred to entities for further study: IMB (3), Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission (2), ERLC and Executive Committee, jointly (1), and EC (12). Eleven other motions were ruled out of order. Another asked that Southern Baptists pray for peace in Jerusalem and was affirmed by common consent.

RESOLUTIONS

Messengers approved nine resolutions:

-- On the importance of revitalization and replanting; -- On needed care and

support for pastors and ministry leaders;

-- On artificial intelligence and emerging tech-

nologies;

-- On wisely engaging immigration;

-- On the legacy and responsibility of women fulfilling the Great Commission;

-- On Southern Baptist confessional heritage of the

office of bishop/elder/pastor; -- On Christ's sole Lordship over every human

conscience; -- On opposing gender

transitions; and

-- On appreciation to the City of New Orleans for hosting the SBC Annual Meeting.

MESSENGER COUNT

This year's SBC Annual Meeting drew 12,737 messengers, including 1,286 from Louisiana (second only to Texas, which registered 1,291).



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

for this God-sized goal," Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn told the *Baptist Message*. "Louisiana Baptists showed up for training and we showed up to serve. In fact, Louisiana Baptists had the second highest messenger count of any state.

"As we work toward establishing a culture of evangelism, we're going to continue to ask God for big things and we are going to celebrate every decision, he continued. "I rejoice that 336 people got off the road to Hell and on the road to Heaven and will continue to pray God will bless the seeds that were scattered and watered. I believe this is a small glimpse of the incredible potential when we cooperate together for evangelism.

"I was blessed to see faithful pastors and people from across the country doing hard work in hard places," he said. "That's the real SBC."

BACKGROUND

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Professor Preston Nix first suggested setting a combined goal of 2,023 people to accept Christ through "Serve Tour" and "Crossover." Then, in his report to the LBC Executive Board in September and at the LBC Annual Meeting in November, Horn stated his support, and committed to pray that 2,023 people be saved during the two evangelistic efforts.

COOPERATIVE EFFORT

During the North American Mission Board report, June 13, SBC messengers were told that 84 Crossover and Serve Tour events across Houma, New Orleans and the Northshore had 1,300 volunteers from 21 states. Furthermore, the events drew 12,180 individuals and resulted in 3,487 Gospel conversations.

Throughout the weekend, efforts included block parties, door-to-door witnessing, prayer walks, compassion projects and more evangelistic events.

"Serve Tour helped remind me of what God is able to do in our churches and communities when we work together in unity," Serve Tour Coordinator Alex Brian said. "This event drew thousands of Southern Baptists into both the complexity of needs in our cities and, at the same time, the ability of our God to meet those needs and change lives through his people. God saved people, he strengthened local churches, and he moved powerfully in our community, bringing us further in and further up along his way."

Jacob Crawford, Crossover coordinator, echoed the thought.

'Crossover provided a wonderful opportunity for the evangelistic mobilization of the local churches across the New Orleans and Houma areas," he said. "The NAMB, LBC and associational leaders were a tremendous asset to our outreach efforts. I thank God for their leadership and the cooperation that took place between so many groups! It's my prayer that Crossover serves as a catalyst for an evangelistic movement that sweeps across our state. It was amazing to see so many volunteers from across the United States come to our areas to share Jesus! We have and continue to pray for more laborers because the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. We thank God for the 336 professions of faith! May the Lord multiply those

disciples."

NOBTS and Leavell College students and several faculty members and students from other SBC seminaries joined Crossover to share the Gospel around the city.

Jeff Farmer, NOBTS professor of church ministry and evangelism, led Crossover teams in the community of Christ Baptist Church, Gretna, where he serves also as pastor. Farmer noted it was a blessing to serve together with other seminaries.

"We have one purpose and that's to make disciples. We love each other. We have a sweet worship time in learning and equipping, and we're out to share the gospel," Farmer said. "And, that's the SBC." First Baptist Church, Covington, hosted an appreciation lunch for first responders after members saw two individuals come to Christ when they canvassed their community with the Gospel.

"We just wanted to offer a time for our first responders in our area and their families to come and have a day of decompression," Ministry Co-Coordinator Stephen Babin said. "We wanted to show how much we love them and what they do for us to keep us safe every day and show them the love of Jesus."

Wayne Ivey, a member of New Zion Baptist Church, Covington, along with his wife, Dianne, and church member Brenden Spears, who recently accepted Christ, led a young woman named Gina to Christ during an in-home visit near the church. Members of New Zion Baptist saw three in all come to Christ during inhome visits.

"My wife and Brenden both commented, independent of each other, how excited they were to see someone say, 'Yes,' to Jesus and that in turn encouraged me," Ivey said. "I was elated they took a bold step to share Jesus and now they want to make that part of their lifestyle."

For their part, the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries,

In Bayou Baptist Association, mission teams completed "handyman" projects for senior adults in Gibson and participated in a shrimp boil and block party at Grand Caillou Baptist Church, Houma. Volunteers also provided 150 meals to Louisiana State Highway Patrol officers and their families in Houma and gave them 160 hygiene kits for the troopers to deliver to homeless individuals they encounter.

campus as a home for NOBTS and Leavell College offices, classrooms, study rooms, the North American Mission Board Church Planting Center, and the Global Mission Center in partnership with the International Mission Board.

Elizabeth Luter, wife of the honoree, was herself celebrated in a surprise announcement that drew shouts and cheering from the crowd. Dew announced that the newly renovated study rooms, also referred to as carrels, inside the Fred Luter Jr. Student Center were named in her honor.

'He calls you his 'prime rib' so we thought it was fitting that something inside would be named after you,' Dew said.

Tony Evans, LifeWay author, pastor of Oak Cliff Bible Fellowship and president of the Urban Alternative, sent video congratulations to his "good friend," praising Luter for his impact and investment in the SBC.

'Most important of all is your commitment to our great God and His Word, your faithful proclamation and dedication and illustration

of kingdom commitment,' Evans said. "I am proud to be your friend. I am proud as an African American to join you in this first-in-a-lifetime opportunity and recognition. I hope generations to come will come to know and appreciate the life and legacy of Pastor Fred Luter."

Gary Shows, chairman of the NOBTS and Leavell College 2022 board of trustees that unanimously voted to name the center in Luter's honor, said Luter is known widely as "the pastor of New Orleans" for his leadership and for the "special place he holds in the hearts of NOBTS and the city."

Waylon Bailey, chairman of the NOBTS board of trustees and pastor of First Baptist Church, Covington, Louisiana, praised Luter's impactful ministry and told of the first time he heard Luter's name decades earlier. Bailey recounted hearing that Luter was "the new pastor of Franklin Avenue Baptist Church and is reaching men for Christ." He also pointed to the significance

backstage at the Convention when the election results were announced to overwhelming joy.

Other Southern Baptist Convention leaders also were present: Bart Barber, SBC president; Willie McLaurin, interim president and CEO of the SBC Executive Committee; Paul Chitwood, president, International Mission Board; Jason Allen, president, Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary; Jonathan Howe, vice president for communications, SBC Executive committee; Ben Mandrell, president and CEO, Lifeway Christian

ers who represented the SBC Executive Committee and the NOBTS trustee board.

Dew recognized several politicians and city dignitaries in the crowd and welcomed them to speak.

State Senator Joseph Bouie Jr. read from Louisiana Senate Resolution No. 167 that commended Luter for being "an exemplary leader, devoted servant, and unwavering advocate for the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Bouie, along with State **Representatives Jason Hughes** and Matthew Willard, authored and sponsored the resolution.

The resolution reads that the occasion marks "one of the first buildings named for an African American on a Southern Baptist Convention seminary campus"; notes Luter's service as the first African American president of the SBC; praises Luter's commitment to the New Orleans community with

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service marked by "compassion, vision, and dedication to empowering others to live transformed lives in Christ": and commends Luter for his 'selfless service, exemplary leadership, and transformative impact on the lives of countless individuals."

Further recognition came from the city of New Orleans:

-- Mayor LaToya Cantrell noted the importance of the faith community to the city and praised Luter for his legacy.

-- City Councilman Eugene J. Green Jr. presented a city proclamation honoring Luter's lifelong ministry in New Orleans that is "exemplary and greatly appreciated.'

-- City Councilman Oliver Thomas presented a proclamation that included Luke 14:11 and praised Luter and his "devoted" wife Elizabeth Luter and reads, "Your warm demeanor and your passion to share the gospel continues to edify the Body of Christ."

Dew recounted that as a new Christian he listened to Luter's sermons on cassette tape and admired him as a "hero of the faith." Dew said his admiration for Luter did not change after meeting Luter four years ago when he came to NOBTS as president.

'Southern Baptists, I know you know him. I know you love him. I know that you esteem him ... but I can tell you having lived four years in this city, and seeing the impact ... God has made through him, that this man is exactly who we always thought he was.'

SBC annual meeting helped mobilize a new generation of Southern Baptists

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) -- Equipping students to be mature followers of Jesus who impact the campus and become catalysts for advancing the Gospel globally is at the heart of the mission of Baptist Collegiate Ministries across Louisiana, according to Mark Robinson.

He is the director of

Baptist Collegiate Ministries for Louisiana Baptists.

Louisiana BCMs accomplish these growth objectives by training students in evangelism and mission outreach as well as preparing them through church life and leadership experiences, Robinson said. Moreover, he was enthusiastic about the extraordinary opportunity the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting provided in giving insights to these young men and women about the size and scope of the work Southern Baptists do worldwide, while giving these students the opportunity to serve and grow as leaders.

As Louisiana Baptist BCM student ambassadors, these volunteers helped register, greet, and be the face of Louisiana Baptists to the more than 12,000 messengers who came to New Orleans this year.

"The ambassador program is a reimagining of the state council from the past, expanding it to involve more leaders," Robinson said.

Moving forward, Robinson said the benefit (for BCMs and Louisiana Baptists as a whole) is that these students will be "more invested students, involved in a process that will help them grow in their discipleship and make them stronger church leaders in the future."

It was this opportunity to inform students and involve them in the process of Southern Baptist life, as well as provide networking opportunities, spiritual

growth, and leadership skills, that was the goal for the ambassador program, he said.

According to participants, the "arrow hit the mark."

"I'd never heard of the SBC before," Audie Owens, a McNeese State University elementary education student, said. But her BCM Director Blake Grundy suggested she serve.

"When he told me, I was like 'ABSOLUTLEY!" Owens stated. "I was excited to talk with people I've never met and learn more about discipleship."

Austin Grooms, Northwestern State University senior, indicated he was glad to be able to fill an essential supporting role with the Convention and loved being part of the "grease that holds the machine together."

Others echoed his sentiments.

"I love seeing everyone coming together and uniting," Carter Manning, University of Louisiana Lafayette said. "Even though we're in the same denomination we still disagree on issues, but everyone is still so passionate about Christ, the church, and reaching the lost."

Manning, who just finished her freshman year in nursing, also said the annual meeting was an



same: Do not use God's name in vain.

It is a key to obedience. It is an essential element of how we set ourselves apart as His people. It is part and parcel of making God the top relationship in our lives.

Moreover, throughout the Word the third commandment is reinforced with instructions not to profane God's name by invoking it in oaths (Mt. 5:34-35), using it to falsely imply His will or authority in a matter (Mk. 7:6-9), or casually offering it in a flippant comment or remark (Mt. 12:36).

Indeed, God warns us that our words reveal the condition of our hearts (Mt. 12:34).

In that context, I grieve about what might appear to some to be a "smallish" incident that took place during our recent SBC Annual Meeting in New Orleans.

What caused my hurt?

During a seemingly minor moment of tension during a discussion from the floor, a glib comment was made from the platform that even Jesus would have had to stand in line to wait His turn to speak at a microphone.

In context, the speaker clarified that he had heard someone else make the comment. Still, he shared the remark for effect, nonetheless.

And my soul cringed. It might look "nitpicky'

or read like a "potshot" or 'gotcha" attempt to complain about this incident in an editorial.

But my spirit truly was in pain – not just because 'WE" had failed to revere "the name above every name"

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at that moment. Instead, I also was convicted about how many times "I" might have loosely invoked Jesus' name, perhaps to be glib, when I could have employed His words or His example to have an even better effect.

In a recent episode of the television series, Jeopardy, the three contestants were challenged with a clue from the Model Prayer: "Matthew 6:9 says, 'Our Father which art in Heaven,' THIS 'be thy name.'

Not one of them buzzed in, and the hostess had to tell them the answer, "What is 'hallowed."

Since then, there has been a cascade of criticisms on social media about this game

show incident and what it says about the participants and perhaps something even larger about the state of our culture.

However, for me it serves as an important lesson, and a matter for personal reflection, not to forget that God's name is holy.

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14 SBC23 SBC amendment on male pastors passes first vote

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) – Messengers to the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting voted by a twothirds majority to adopt an amendment to the SBC Constitution that specifies the role of pastor is limited to a man.

Article III, Section 1, currently lists five requirements for congregations to be SBC members. If the proposed amendment receives a second favorable twothirds vote during the 2024 SBC Annual Meeting in Indianapolis, Indiana, a sixth requirement will specify that a church in friendly cooperation with the SBC "affi¬rms, appoints, or employs only men as any kind of pastor or elder as quali¬fied by Scripture."

The vote resulted from a motion made during the 2022 SBC Annual Meeting by Mike Law, pastor of Arlington Baptist Church in Virginia.

However, Law's proposal, which was referred to the SBC Executive Committee last year, was amended this year by a motion offered by Juan Sanchez, pastor of High Pointe Baptist Church in Austin, Texas. The change did not alter the intent of the amendment, but states "only men" are qualified to serve as pastors rather than the original wording that "a woman" is disqualified from that role. If amended next year,

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the SBC Constitution Article III will parallel Article VI of the Baptist Faith and Message 2000, the consensus statement of doctrinal beliefs for Southern Baptists, which states, "While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture."

In New Orleans, the SBC Executive Committee recommended not to amend the Constitution on the basis that it would unnecessarily restate the BF&M 2000.



SBC23 LBC pastor elected SBC EC chairman

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) -Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee members, during a June 12 meeting, elected Philip Robertson, pastor of Philadelphia Baptist Church, Deville, with a second campus in Alexandria, as the next chairman.

'Just to have this opportunity is very, very humbling," Robertson said during a news conference after the vote, before answering several questions about the EC and its work within the SBC.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Robertson said the Executive Committee needed to be 'reliable again.'

We have been entrusted by the messengers of the Convention to serve an

important role. I think our Convention is looking for an Executive Committee that is reliable and ready to do what it's commissioned to do."

ENTITY TRANSPARENCY

Robertson noted he has served on the SBC EC Committee on Finance and Stewardship and has been deeply engaged with the "financial details" of SBC entities.

'I am absolutely confident that our committee has all the access to the numbers, the audits, the transparency that we need," he said.

However, he said the SBC EC is charged to review the audits of the other entities, "not ... to oversee" [the other entities].

'I would just encourage the trustee members of those other entities to make sure that they are doing their

fiduciary responsibilities."

SEXUAL ABUSE TASK FORCE

"We have to address the issue and I'm grateful that we have," he said. "We can disagree on how maybe that will happen, and possibly moving forward we have some work to do. I'm very grateful for the work that the [Abuse] Reform Implementation] Task Force is doing and the direction we are heading. I just very strongly feel like we need to continue that work to make sure every person in every church in the SBC is protected and safe in every reasonable way."

MOVING FORWARD

Robertson said that despite apparent divisions within the EC, he believes there is hope for moving for-

ward in a positive way.

'We are brothers and sisters in Christ," he said, adding that Southern Baptists share the "same Holy Spirit."

'Our ultimate objectives are the same," Robertson offered. "I think there is far more that we agree on than we would ever disagree on.

Robertson conceded that the "disagreements are

real." But he explained, "We have to work through those things.'

'But my desire has been and continues to be that we can do that in a collegial manner, loving one another in Christ, respecting one another even if we have different opinions. I really do feel like that is the prevailing climate with the EC now."

eye-opening experience. "I don't think I realized before how many behind the scenes people it takes to run a meeting like this,' Manning said, "but now that I've seen it, I have a new appreciation for it."

Robinson said the 41 students from the 13 Louisiana BCMs gleaned a valuable insider view into the inner workings of the Convention, and seemed to deepen in their appreciation of the rich heritage they are a part of as Southern Baptists.

'When these students

make it back to their campuses, they will spread the word," he said. "This will help many others in their generation to get a better understanding and catch the passion to be God's hands and feet as part of the SBC."
