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GBO: 30 BCM students sowed Gospel seeds during GOLA VBS

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – A frequently asked back-to-school question is "how did you spend your summer vacation?" Thirty students from the state's Baptist Collegiate Ministries can answer, "I helped lead Vacation Bible schools (VBS) in Louisiana and Wyoming.

Celebrating a 14th year of summer service, GOLA (Go Louisiana) VBS is an emphasis by Louisiana Baptists' collegiate ministry that allows college students to serve on teams who share God's love through what is the largest evangelistic outreach (VBS) of the year for many congregations. The teams typically conduct VBS for churches with low baptisms and who could not hold such an outreach without the help of the GOLA volun-

Five teams of five to eight students each served at churches around the state, June 1-July 15, while another team of six students conducted VBS in Wyoming, June 7-July 30. Louisiana Baptist Collegiate Min-

istry Team Director Mark Robinson said the experience allowed the students to gain experience working with children and churches to advance the Gospel.

"They saw faith in action through practical, everyday ministry with children," Robinson told the Baptist Message. "From a church's perspective, they were encouraged by the young, energetic students who served in their churches.

"Recently, I was able to talk to members of some of the churches in which the students served and they mentioned what a great thing this has been for the students," he continued. "We are helping to train future church leaders who one day will join churches after graduation

and be leaders in them."

All the students were commissioned to share the Gospel either in the highways and hedges of Louisiana or in the mountaintops and valleys of Wyoming, and each had

the July 2023 financial summary, August 4, reporting that gifts for the month to SBC causes through the Cooperative Program and via designated giving were down 8.19

percent and 15.63 percent, respectively, compared to July 2022.

Year-to-date figures also showed both funding

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Monthly sponsors of Haitian children needed

CAP-HAITIEN, Haiti (LBM) – Louisiana Reach Haiti President Darrin Badon has issued a plea for individuals and churches to sponsor Children's Village residents who recently relocated to a safer location in the country.

Badon noted that LRH needs \$60,000 to cover the ministry's basic needs through the end of the year.

Most of those funds will be used to pay for educational and medical needs for 28 children (18 are Children's Village residents who have yet to be reunified with their families; another 10 are former residents who have been placed back with their families).

"The work we do to reunify families is the work God called us to do back in 2016 when we bought the land for the Children's Village in Croix-des-Bouquets," Badon told the Baptist Message. "The children in our care belong to the Lord. They are in a place where 30,000 children live on the street, and some are child slaves. We are called to defend and restore families.

"We need about \$12,000 a month to feed the kids and pay the salaries of our Haitian staff to keep doing the work we are doing in Haiti," he said. "We don't want the work to end. We don't want to fail these children. We need people willing to support what God has called us to do in Haiti.

"I don't believe God would have allowed the children and our staff to have relocated for the work to end," he continued. "He wouldn't have allowed the safe return of two of our staff from being kidnapped by gangs

this year if the work in Haiti was complete. God has a purpose in this. Yes, I am concerned. I feel the weight of taking care of these kids and staff and it's tangible. We are trying to show them love and share See SPONSORS, page 5

WEST MONROE, La. (LBM) – Louisiana Baptist congregations get to celebrate being part of some wonderful ministries around the world. By giving through the Cooperative Program, we are part of God's work around the globe.

But sometimes smaller

tions also wish they could do overseas missions "on their own," too. However, it's often difficult to do because of modest resourc-

congrega-

es. Still, we learned at Ouachita Baptist Church that even with our moderately sized membership we could make a direct impact to the ends of the earth.

Three years ago, we were contacted on Face-

book by an interpreter in Zambia who had assisted me during a week of evangelism there nearly two decades earlier. Edward Mulenga was now the pastor of "Word of Truth Ministries," but the congregation had no building. Still, he simply asked us to partner with his church in prayer.

And we did.

Through that commitment, God began to move us to help these fellow believers, half a world away.

It was a step of faith for several reasons.

About 200 worshipers regularly gather each week in our West Monroe facilities. But 2020 was punctuated with COVID stay-athome mandates. Also, we were engaged in a focused effort to pay off our debt.

But we moved forward purposely.

First, we made sure there were no doctrinal conflicts between our two congregations, in accor-

dance with Amos 3:3 "Can two walk together, unless they are agreed?" When we confirmed our theological alignment, it spurred both congregations to even greater commitment in prayer.

Then, in 2022, Ouachita Baptist completed a six-year effort to gain financial freedom.

Even though our people had just finished

an extended time of financial sacrifice to retire our debt, many came to me to give toward the \$15,000 cost to build a worship center for our Zambian friends. Moreover, Randy Harper, pastor of Bellaire Baptist Church in Bossier City, reached out to me on behalf of his congregation to provide funds to furnish chairs and dry erase boards for the project.

The miracle of giving and cooperation has continued with our congregation contributing half the money raised from an annual sportsmen banquet (previously used to pay toward our mortgage) to dig a well in Zambia. Like-

wise, the generosity of our congregation and the work by the Zambian church inspired their village elders to donate land for a school. Bellaire Baptist Church was so moved by the vision of educating 50 village children that they have already given \$5,000 toward the \$15,000 building fund goal.

Meanwhile, our members have been faithful to give toward projects at home (needed renovations which had been delayed for six years) while still supporting the Cooperative Program and other funding efforts in our commitment

the Gospel and it's difficult to do this without the support of others."

BACKGROUND

Louisiana Reach Haiti was formed in 2015 to promote Louisiana Baptists' evangelism and church planting in Haiti, and to raise funds for specific projects there.

A Louisiana Baptist team partnered with Pastor Odvald Louis and his members with New Evangelical Baptist Church in Croix-des-Bouquets. The Haitian congregation and Louisiana short-term mission teams combined to complete a Children's Village in Croix-des-Bouquets, and they teamed up to dig a well and build a church building and school in neighboring Canaan.

However, the facilities in both cities were overtaken and vandalized by gangs in early 2022, Badon said.

LRH then refocused its ministry on multiple fronts:

— In February 2022, escalating gang violence forced the Children's Village to relocate to the Florida House, a Florida Baptist Convention-owned home for missionaries in Port-au-Prince. The facility housed 21 children and six staff members. However, gangs have begun terrorizing this area as well.

— Meanwhile God opened doors in New Orleans, allowing LRH leaders to help relocate Louis and his family from Haiti, which he fled after surviving an attempt on his life.

Additionally, LRH began partnering with Connect International Church, a congregation in New Orleans that in April 2022 formed and hosted an international church (led by a Haitian American graduate, Pastor Dawest Louis, of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary) that reaches out to Haitians and other nationalities. In July 2022 and 2023, LRH partnered with Fellowship Church, Prairieville, and worked with this newly formed congregation to conduct Vacation Bible School for more than 30 children.

MIRACULOUS MOMENTS

Badon is thankful for God's hand over the children and staff, including his protection of Children's Village Director Antonio Auguste in March, who was kidnapped by gang members in Port-Au-Prince but miraculously was released three weeks later.

'We had an army of a few thousand praying for him," Badon said. "The captors never knew he was associated with an American organization, or they likely would have asked for an impossible amount of money for his release. When I was notified about his release on Good Friday, I cried and got on my knees and thanked God for His faithfulness. There are missionaries that die on the field and there are those God chooses to deliver. It's not for us to question or to understand. Sometimes the outcome is what we prayed for and other times it's not. In this case our prayers were aligned with His will, and he rescued Antonio."

On July 1, Badon flew into Cap-Haitien and met with a small group

of Haitians to prepare a new rental home for the children and staff. On July 4, Auguste, the staff and children loaded on a bus and traveled from Port-au-Prince to the new Children's Village home near Cap-Haitien. On July 8, for the first time in more than a year, the children and staff were able to travel outside their facility and worship with other Haitians without fear of being kidnapped, robbed, beaten or even killed.

In September, the children will begin attending local schools. Trips to a museum and beach are

among possible field trips, Badon said, noting that the northern coast of Haiti is much safer than Port-au-Prince area.

"The joy of being able to freely go to church is something we in America take for granted but for these children, they physically couldn't go outside their own building for a long time because of fear," Badon said. "And it's real fear. People are being kidnapped at church and on the way to church. They had worship and church time in their building but

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

21 people make waves with baptisms at aquapark

SHREVEPORT, La. (LBM) – Twenty-one people were obedient in believer's baptism, making a splash during a recent service at a Shreveport water world.

Organized by 29

churches of various denominations in the Shreveport-Bossier City area, the June 24 event at Splash Kingdom drew 156 people who looked on and cheered as each person came in and out of the water.

Eric Cunningham, pastor of Narrow Gate Cowboy Church, Vivian (a congregation planted in 2021 by First Baptist Church, Oil City), said the evening was a highlight of his time in ministry.

"We didn't even know this many people would want to get baptized but they kept lining up after the devotion I gave," Cunningham told the *Baptist Message*. "The Holy Spirit was really working on people that night and they were excited to have the chance to show others how they had accepted Christ.

"With all the things going in the country today, you wonder if people are still looking for truth," Cunningham said. "That night showed me people still hunger for Christ and we had so many, including a lot of young people, who

took part in baptism that night."

The baptisms were part of a follow up event for individuals who made decisions during Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames that was hosted, June 4-6, by Narrow Gate Cowboy Church and 28 other churches at Vivian High School. More than 1,100 individuals turned out for the play that was a combination of dramatized scenes that portrayed people in everyday situations.

Each scene ended with a person's death, whether by an accident, suicide or natural causes. Additionally, those who died in the play were escorted to Heaven or Hell.

By the end of the play, 149 individuals in the audience had filled out cards indicating decisions made for Christ. Members of Narrow Gate Cowboy Church and other congregations will follow up with each person in the coming weeks.

Dyna Sibert celebrated with four family members who were among those baptized: daughter-in-law, Heather, granddaughters, Carley and Lexi, and niece, Shelby. They turned to Christ while attending a Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames event in March in Texarkana, Texas.

"Christ can come back right now, and I can rest easy knowing those four in my family now would be in Heaven," said Silbert, a member of Narrow Gate Cowboy Church. "I am so thankful so many churches came together for this memorable evening.

"This service was something that came full circle for me," continued Silbert, a participant in a Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames event 30 years ago at First Baptist Church, Blanchard. "The baptisms and then the event at the school a few months ago really made me appreciate how much an outreach to the community can make."

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'America's Top Model' contestant to headline 'Gift of Life' banquet

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – During the fifth annual CENLA Pregnancy Center 'Gift of Life' fundraising banquet at the Randolph Riverfront Center, Sept. 12, former "America's Top Model" reality show contestant Leah Darrow will share how she became an outspoken advocate for women.

"She has a phenomenal story of redemption," CPC Executive Director Kim Lyons told the Baptist Message. "Her father came to help rescue her out of a destructive lifestyle, one that the world promoted as important, the opposite of where a woman should find her identity, which is in Christ."

According to her website, leahdarrow.com, she was caught up in a lifestyle of worldly success that led to suicidal thoughts, depression and low self-confidence. But soon after appearing on "America's Top Model" in 2004, she found Christ during a photoshoot in New York City. Now, Darrow travels the world and shares her story of

how Jesus changed her life.

The largest fundraiser of the year for the pregnancy center also will feature Claire Lemoine (former CPC executive director, who will emcee of the event), a testimony by a former CPC client, music by a local band comprising members from area multi-denominational churches and updates about how God has used this ministry to help serve moms in

need so they can experience healthy pregnancies,

Lyon said.
"We will celebrate the joy of bringing life into the world," Lyons added.

Located on the Louisiana Baptist Building campus at 1254 MacArthur Drive in Alexandria since December 2017, CENLA Pregnancy Center (along with centers in Marksville and Vidalia that opened several years later) has served more than 1,400 women, completed 6,000 client visits, 1,700 pregnancy and 1,200 ultrasound

tests, and provided 25,573 resources through counseling, referrals, classes and material support.

"To me, those numbers represent the love of God and the fact that our team is answering a very unique call to serve these women in a very specific way," Lyons said. "Our team shows up for these

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


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

Evangelism fuels FBC Leesville's amazing growth

LEESVILLE, La. (LBM) – An emphasis on "out of the box" evangelism has helped bring about a recent uptick in baptisms and worship attendance at First Baptist Church, Leesville.

"When people walk into our church, there is a level of excitement of what God is going to do," Pastor Darin Worthington told the Baptist Message. "Our people are excited about what God is doing. Even though we may be a smaller church in size, God is using us to accomplish so many amazing things for Him."

Since September, the church has celebrated 32 baptisms, compared to eight the previous year; and the most baptisms in any single year for the church, since 2016, when they recorded 19.

Moreover, the church

has seen growth in Sunday worship attendance, increasing from 100 in January 2022 (when Worthington became pastor) to 200 in early August.

Charlene Linton, along with her four children, are among those who have celebrated life in Christ through baptism this year. Linton, who previously accepted Christ as a child but never followed through with baptism, was encouraged to pursue baptism after her children accepted Jesus during an in-home visit from Worthington in early April.

Since the baptism, she has held ongoing Bible studies with her children at home, attends Bible study and worship each week and most recently led her three siblings to Christ during a family gathering in Eldorado, Kansas.

"Once I got baptized, my heart was yearning for more and I surrounded myself with others who helped me grow deeper in my faith," she said. "Now that I have His love, I am on cloud nine and don't just want others not to go to hell. I want them also to experience the joy that comes with following Jesus."

REVAMPED OUTREACH

In January 2023, the church revamped its Wednesday evening activities for children, adding a meal before children's choir and Awana mission classes. Attendance increased within 16 weeks for choir (5 to 25) and Awana (15 to 35).

The church also has added pickleball and adult fitness classes that draw 40-50 participants each week.

Worthington said he is amazed at his church's commitment to reaching Vernon Parish through those efforts, along with a fall festival, Easter extravaganza, Vacation Bible School and ministry to teachers and students at nearby West Leesville Elementary School.

Kiersten Nolen, children's minister at FBC Leesville and a teacher at West Leesville Elementary, said the community has responded positively to outreach efforts.

"This year we have chosen to strengthen the relationships with those near us and we have seen more people coming," she said. "The kids are invited and then the parents come, which allows us to get to know them over a meal or in Bible study they attend while their children are in the other activities, or at some other events we hold outside of church. Even our older adults have embraced this and have really gotten excited about being a part of this new approach to

ministry"

Likewise, middle and high school student ministries have seen substantial growth.


Since November 2022, eight students have been baptized (four after Youth Evangelism Celebration held in November and another four after Centrifuge that took place in June).

Attendance has also increased for youth gatherings, from 5 in August 2022 to 20 a year later.

Student Minister Rodney Blackwell said he is thankful for how his youth have embraced their desire to serve Christ and to lead their classmates to a relationship with Him.

"They just heard the message of the Gospel during YEC and have responded," Blackwell said. "Our students dove into the Word and invited their

Preddy's legacy lives through paintings inside 150 church baptisteries

FOREST HILL, La. (LBM) – More than 150 Baptist churches in Louisiana, five other states and Paraguay may not realize they share a common bond inside their baptistries.

J. Phil Preddy, who died in 1995, spent decades painting murals of scenes depicted in the Bible that were placed inside baptistries of churches in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina and Paraguay (some of those worship centers have been destroyed by hurricanes, fire, floods or tornadoes). Such was a labor of love for a man who did not charge churches for his work but only wanted to honor the Lord by using his artistic

His daughter, Judi Kent, who along with her husband, Tom, served as International Mission Board medical missionaries in Paraguay for 33 years

and recently paid a visit to view one of his paintings at Elwood Baptist Church, Forest Hill. His grand-daughter also served as an IMB missionary and a great granddaughter is nearing her departure for mission work (their names and locations are with held because of security reasons).

"God had given him the talent of art, and he wanted

to give back to the Lord in a way that would have a presence in baptisms," Kent told the Baptist Message.

"He wanted to challenge the pastors and churches to be reminded to keep their baptistries wet."

Born in Rogers, Texas, Preddy moved to Crowley in 1921 to sell farming equipment. He married Ruth Roller in 1924 and shortly afterward painted scenery on a float that won an award at the International Rice Festival in Crowley.

Preddy then moved to New Orleans in the 1940s to work as display manager for Krauss Company and remained in that position until he was 90. He painted more than 150 murals, including his first at Elysian Fields Baptist Church, New Orleans (which was later destroyed by Hurricane Katrina).

Other locations in New Orleans where his artwork appeared included First Baptist Church, where he was a long-time member, the Baptist Friendship House, and the Sellers Home and Adoption Center. One of his paintings was even featured in an issue of the Cable magazine, which was published by the New Orleans Federation of Churches.

Preddy signed each painting with a monogram that contained the initials J and P, along with the year he completed each piece of artwork.

channels continued to be below 2022 levels. From October 1, 2022, through July 31, 2023, total SBC CP contributions were 4.91 percent lower compared to the same timeframe during the last fiscal year. Likewise, combined designated giving was 3.38 less for the same months, with both of the two largest funds down compared to last year. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering was off 4.96 percent, and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering was lower by 0.49 percent (less than one-half of a percentage

point).

LBC Giving

The national report showed monthly giving by Louisiana Baptists to SBC causes in July was down 31.83 percent through CP and 51.36 percent for special offerings.

However, the yearly data was less volatile.

Louisiana Baptist contributions for 2023 through the CP were off slightly, 0.16 percent (less than one-quarter of one percent), but designated giving was higher by 7.70 percent.

"One thing I loved about GOLA was that it's about building possibly life-long relationships, with team members, churches and the kids," she said. "Another is helping the churches and the


kids, experiencing their gratitude daily with hugs and smiles."

it was not with other believers. The joy of getting up to get ready and go to and from church has been amazing for them."

BRIGHT FUTURE

Now that they are in

a safer area, the children have more possibilities for a brighter future. But that is only possible if they secure enough financial donations.

"We just don't have the giving we used to," Badon said. "Because we haven't

had the teams here who see first-hand what is going on and then get excited to give after their trip, we have less people donating. We are hoping to get our first mission team to the Dominican Republic in 2024 and serve alongside Haitians in that country. Over 1 million Haitians live in the Dominican. We

remain hopeful we will one day be able to get teams back to Haiti but for now it remains so volatile to do so.

"Now, we have no fat to trim off our expenses," he continued. "We are as lean as we can get. There is nothing more to cut. In fact, we reduced our staff when we moved. We need food and to pay staff and we need help from others. All we need is people to commit to sponsoring a child for just 30 dollars a month, whether it be an individual, Sunday school class, WMU group or more. God is not done here in Haiti, and we look forward to great days ahead."

allows you to turn a qualified charitable distribution into a stream of income for yourself or others while still leaving a gift to your church or other ministries after your death.
