Louisiana Baptist Convention baptisms soar 31 percent

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – Recently released information that updated the Annual Church Profile database for 2023 shows

that the number of baptisms performed by Louisiana Baptist congregations jumped to 8,770 in 2023, a surge of 2,080 more baptisms, or 31.1 percent above the numbers for 2022. This growth nearly

doubles the 1,060 additional baptisms reported in 2022 (6,690), which was an 18.8 percent rise above 2021 (5,630).

The Southern Baptist Convention also reported increases for both years,

almost 26 percent in 2023 and about 16 percent in 2022.

The soaring LBC numbers coincide with what has been described as a "rebound" from the CO-VID pandemic in 2020, but also occur with the launch of a soul winning emphasis by Louisiana Baptists that was announced preceding the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting, which was held



SBC HIGHLIGHTS Southern Baptists conduct business, enjoy fellowship, share the Gospel

INDIANAPOLIS (LBM) – Here are the highlights from the 2024 SBC Annual Meeting, June 10-12. Law Amendment (ban on

women pastors)

Messengers cast 5,099 ballots in favor (61.45 percent) of the Law Amendment and 3,999 against (38.38 percent). However, the majority fell short of the two-thirds (66.67 percent) threshold needed to amend the SBC Constitution.

Last year, in New Orleans, 80 percent of messengers approved the measure to ban women pastors.

However, failing in 2024 means the issue is dead for now because any constitutional amendment needs to be passed by the su-

permajority of messengers in two consecutive annual meetings. Disfellowshipped (legacy

Virginia congregation) Nearly 92 percent (6,750) of ballots sustained the Credentials

INDIANAPOLIS (LBM) A variety of evangelistic efforts preceding the Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting produced saving knowledge of Jesus in 185 new believers.

According to the North American Mission Board, 44 churches in the Indianapolis area participated

in Crossover, which took place June 3-8 in the city. The events had 1,469 volunteers who shared the Gospel with 5,393 people.

DERIDDER, La. (LBM) – Alan Knuckles was a

year into his first pastorate after retiring as a director of missions when he sustained an injury that forever changed his world. But he was reminded of God's goodness by the love that was shown to him by Louisiana Baptists from across the state.

Knuckles, on August 20, 2019, had just attended a meeting in the Louisiana Baptist Building, Alexandria, when he fell and injured his head in the parking lot. An ambulance transported him to Rapides Regional Medical Center, where doctors determined he needed surgery to remove a tumor in the brain.

In the ensuing months, Knuckles received prayers, visits, calls and text messages that helped him persevere through the trials.

"I had great support from people around the state and can remember people sitting with me in the emergency room and later in my private room," Knuckles told the *Baptist Message.* "I can't tell you the names of everyone who was there to see me, but I appreciate each and every one of them so much because they were a real blessing to me."

After physical rehabilitation, Knuckles continued serving as pastor of Shiloh

Baptist Church, DeRidder, faithfully teaching through Facebook videos while the congregation was not meeting in person due to the pandemic. He resigned in the summer of 2020, and now he and his wife, Helen, are members of Dry Creek Baptist Church.

Knuckles said his time as a pastor and director of missions were a blessing.

"I did everything I could to encourage the pastors and to be there for them," said Knuckles, who was honored in November as a 2023 Louisiana Bi-Vocational Pastor and Retiree of the Year. "I put a lot of miles on a vehicle as I visited the pastors as director of missions. I tried to have strong relationships with them."

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Knuckles grew up in Southern Baptist churches but did not accept Christ until he was 24 while attending a Billy Graham Crusade in Raleigh, North Carolina. Shortly after, he felt the call to ministry and en-

IDUISIANANEWS FBC Baton Rouge to celebrate 150th anniversary

BATON ROUGE, La. (LBM) – First Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, has a series of scheduled events to coincide with a 150th anniversary that will give members a chance to remember their storied past as well as look to a hopeful future.

'First Baptist Church Baton Rouge has stood as a beacon of faith, hope and love for a century and a half," FBCBR Music Minister Christian Vige told the Baptist Message. "This milestone is not just a marker of time, but a celebration of countless lives transformed, hearts touched and communities served. It's a time to reflect on the rich history of the church, honoring those who laid the foundation of faith and those who have continued to build upon it.

"The sesquicentennial anniversary provides a unique opportunity to reflect on the church's journey and renew our commitment to the mission and vision that God has placed before us for the future," he added. "As we look back on the past 150 years, we are reminded of the countless ways God has worked through our church to spread His love and message."

EVENTS

The church will kick off its anniversary with "Stars, Stripes and Sounds: A Patriotic Musical Celebration" July 4 at 7 p.m. The event will honor the country's heritage, faith and freedom through music and dancers from the Baton Rouge Ballet Theater. Afterward, those in attendance will be able to head to the Mississippi River front near the church for a city-wide fireworks display.

The following month, FBCBR will host its second Gathered Voices concert. Scheduled for Aug. 17 at 6:30 p.m., the evening will feature a diverse and interactive worship experience blending liturgical and Gospel choral music with a background of singers and orchestra players.

And on Sep. 29, the church will wrap up its festivities with a sesquicentennial 150th anniversary celebration at 10 a.m. The special service will feature remarks from Louisiana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn, music led by a mass choir comprised of past and present choir members, full orchestra, organist and responsive readings.

REFLECTIONS

Long-time member Monica Eskine was part of the church when it commemorated 100 years of ministry and is looking forward to another grand celebration this year.

"Here we are now 50 years later, and it's a big privilege to be able to serve and to show that First Baptist Church is still a viable part of the city," she said. "We can still be a shining light for God to show Himself.

"A lot of contemporaries of mine were also married in the church and the people have such longtime loyalty to First Baptist," she continued. "Our new pastor is going to be a young influence on our church. I think that First Baptist is going to need to be flexible and show that we still have what God wants for the city and that we can grow and show that Baton Rouge is still going to be able to be a witness for God.'

Bob Reeves, another

long-time member, said he is looking forward to how God will use FBCBR in its 150th year and beyond.

"Many of the members have been here a long time and they are dedicated to seeing the church be a beacon to the community both in downtown and other parts of the city," he said. "So, I'm confident we're in God's will and are excited about what's going to happen."

FBCBR was founded in 1874 after 18 members met in a rented hall off what is known today as Fourth Street in Baton Rouge. Since then, the church has been led by 22 pastors, started 29 mission churches, relocated to its current location, completed several building additions on the property, helped construct the Baptist Student Center at Louisiana State University and, most importantly,

4 LOUISIANANEWS Alabama native Ingram retiring to Mississippi after 16 years of Louisiana ministry

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – For the past 16 years, Jeff Ingram has traveled the state helping Louisiana Baptist congregations discover how to better carry out the God-given mandate to make disciples.

Ingram, who is set to retire June 30 from the Evangelism and Church Grown team, told the *Baptist Message* he is thankful for having had the opportunity "to serve the churches."

"I really value the relationships I've had through the years with our LBC staff, but also with associational mission strategists, pastors, church staff and lay leaders," he said. "Just 'thank you' for the opportunity to get to know you, to work with you and to see how God is working through Louisiana Baptists to reach and minister to the people in their communities."

CALLED TO SERVE

Ingram grew up in Jeff Ingram a home where church

attendance was a priority, but during his teen years he became less engaged. After he graduated high school and began attending the University of South Alabama, he felt the need to join the Baptist Student Union and attend Spring Hill Baptist Church, Mobile, Alabama, he said.

However, it was during a revival service at Agricola Baptist Church, Lucedale, Mississippi, that Ingram



made his relationship with Christ personal.

During the next 39 years, Ingram devoted himself to vocational Christian ministry and served the Lord through several congrega-

tions: youth minister, Agricola Baptist (1984-1986); minister of youth, First Baptist Church, Sanford, Florida (1986-1988); minister of education, youth minister, children's minister and senior adult minister, First Baptist Church, Wiggins, Mississippi (1988-1996); minister of education, Highland Baptist Church, Vicksburg, Mississippi (1996-2000); and minister of adults, First Baptist Church, Brandon, Mississippi (2000-2008).

In 2008, Ingram accepted the call to join Louisiana Baptists as the adult ministry strategist. Ten years later, he took on the added role of church administration strategist.

During his time on the state mission services team, Ingram served churches through coordinating Sunday school and discipleship training events that ranged from one-to-one meetings to large group events with several hundred attendees.

"Over these past 16 years that I've been here I have thoroughly enjoyed working with the different churches around the state," Ingram said. "Louisiana is a very interesting state with great



Throughout the weekend, efforts included block parties, door-to-door witnessing, compassion projects and more evangelistic events.

Sixty-five students and professors from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary participated in evangelism classes each morning and in the afternoon shared the Gospel door-to-door around the city.

NOBTS had the largest group, with 20 NOBTS and Leavell College students and evangelism professors Preston Nix and Jeff Farmer. By the end of the week, NOBTS team knocked on 1,756 doors and had 227 Gospel conversations that resulted in 33 decisions to follow Christ.



led their very first person to faith in Christ and they were thrilled," NOBTS Professor of Evangelism and Evangelistic Preaching Preston Nix told the *Baptist Message.* "Now that they have seen that the Lord can use them to help bring people to salvation, they will do it again. Mission accomplished by this evangelism professor."

Among the most memorable moments for Nix was when a NOBTS team led a mother and her son and two daughters to Christ at their home along with another individual nearby to a relationship with Jesus.

"While one team member was leading the mother to Christ, which by the way was the first person she has ever won to Christ, another team member shared with her kids and led three of them to Christ," he said. "Meanwhile, the third team member engaged a guy working on a nearby house when he was walking back to his work truck parked in front of the lady's home. All of them finished praying to receive Christ at virtually the same time and there was great rejoicing in that Indianapolis front yard that afternoon. Hallelujah."

Committee's recommendation to oust the historic First Baptist Church, Alexandria, Virginia. The congregation, which has a female pastor on staff, was found not to "closely identify" with the SBC.

The move comes a year after messengers, during the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting, disfellowshipped three churches who were found to be "not in friendly cooperation" with the SBC: Saddleback Church, Lake Forest, California (three ordained women pastors), Fern Creek Baptist Church, Louisville, Kentucky (female senior pastor), and Freedom Church, Vero Beach, Florida (mishandling of sex abuse allegation).

ARITF recommendations

Two years after voting to form a task force to investigate sexual abuse allegations in SBC churches, messengers approved two recommendations: (1) expand a ministry toolkit (to include a fivestep program to combat sexual abuse: train, screen, protect, report and care), establish a ministry check website and create a permanent home for abuse prevention and response; and

(2) assign the SBC EC to finalize the structure and funding to implement and support these objectives, and report back to messengers next year.

Meanwhile, the ARITF reported that after two years the ministry check website, sbcabuseprevention.com, still has not been populated with names of known sexual offenders connected to SBC church-

GCR Evaluation Task Force

Messengers approved six recommendations by the six-person GCR Evaluation Task Force (chaired by Jay Adkins, pastor, First Baptist Church, Westwego) that was formed last year to study and report about the impact the 2010 Great Commission Task Force recommendations have had on "the effectiveness of our North American Gospel mission effort ... and ... on the relationships between SBC ministry partners."

The GCR Evaluation Task Force recommended that the SBC:

category of, and any language related to 'Great Commission Giving''' in favor of reaffirming "the Cooperative Program as the primary method of giving for Southern Baptist churches";

(2) "restructure and simplify the ACP in an effort to effect more participation from churches, limiting the SBC requested information to a total number of 6 categories and 2 questions" (amended to clarify that CP giving still would be reported);

(3) request NAMB to "conduct an annual survey of the status of churches planted, revitalized, or otherwise assisted using CP funds 10 years out from their launch" to specifically report: how many still exist; how many remain SBC connected via CP giving & ACP reporting; and report this information to messengers at each annual meeting and publish the data in the Book of Reports;

(4) request the SBC EC use its CP allocation to increase IMB's CP allocation to 51 percent by 2026-27 (as voted by messengers in 2010);

(5) request the Southern Baptist Historical Library and Archives to index the audio recordings of the 2010 Great Commission Task Force meetings to ready the materials for "public access" by June 16, 2025, when a 15-year embargo ends;

(6) request the SBC EC to propose governing document changes that require "entities, institutions, committees, or commissions of the Convention to report on the action they have taken on messenger approved recommendations coming from special work groups or task forces" (including all such

matters in the Book of Reports).

ELECTIONS

Clint Pressley, pastor of Hickory Grove Baptist Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, was elected SBC president (from among six candidates) after winning a second runoff with 4,244 votes (56.12 percent) to Tennessee Pastor Dan Spencer's 3,305 votes (43.71 percent).

In other office races, messengers elected: -- Brad Graves (pas-

tor, First Baptist Church Ada, Oklahoma), first vice president;

-- Eddie Lopez (pastor, Hispanic ministry, First Baptist Church, Forney, Texas), second vice president;

-- Don Currence (administrative pastor, First Baptist Church, Ozark, Missouri), registration secretary; and

-- Nathan Finn (provost, North Greenville University, South Carolina), recording secretary.

HOWDY IN DALLAS for '25

Now that the 2024 Annual Meeting has concluded, messengers will prepare for next year's gathering of Southern Baptists. The 2025 Annual Meeting is scheduled June 10-11 in Dallas.

RESOLUTIONS SUMMARIES

-- On integrity in SBC leadership (emphasizes repentance and accountability for leaders who commit a disqualifying sin)

-- On Defending Religious Liberty (opposes "any effort ... to establish Christianity as the state religion of the United States of America") -- On Just War and the

Pursuit of Peace (restates the "historic, Christian principles" of "Just War Theory")

-- On Justice and Peace in the Aftermath of the October 7 attack on Israel (condemns Hamas' terrorist attacks on Israel as well as anti-Israel and pro-Hamas activities on university campuses)

-- On the Ethical Realities of Reproductive Technologies and the Dignity of the Human Embryo (expresses concerns with in vitro fertilization, which assists couples with reproduction but often results in the "destruction" or "stockpiling" of embryos which are not implanted) -- On the God-given Rights and Responsibilities of Parents (affirms "that parents are the primary stewards of and decision-makers for their children, rather than teachers, doctors, or the state")

-- On Evangelism and the Great Commission (urges Southern Baptists "to make every effort ... to share the [G]ospel message")

-- On Appreciation for Indianapolis (expresses gratitude to all those who contributed to the 2024 SBC Annual Meeting and related events).

Two additional resolutions were not considered because of time constraints:

-- On the Pro-life Ethic in a Pro-Roe Society -- On the Danger of Abusing No-Disclosure and Non-Disparagement Agreements

SUMMARY OF MOTIONS

Messengers adopted a motion to unseat members from the First Baptist Church, Alexandria, Virginia, (related to the issue of a woman pastor on staff).

They rejected a motion to abolish the Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission, another that would have censured SBC leaders for signing an amicus brief that was considered harmful to sexual abuse survivors, and five more that requested:

-- a BF&M 2000 review -- fact-finding about the Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force





in New Orleans. one percent In May 2023, LBC decade.

Executive Director Steve Horn shared with LBC Executive Board members his desire to restore a "culture of evangelism" among Louisiana Baptists. His vision accompanied the announcement of Send Network Louisiana, a church planting partnership (launched in August 2023) with the SBC North American Mission Board that includes a God-sized task to see His Kingdom expanded in Louisiana by

one percent over the next decade.

Researchers estimate that 62.4 percent of 4,648,794 Louisianans are lost (or, 2,789,276).

If successful, 28,875 Louisianans will be added to the Kingdom through 231 new churches planted in the state by 2033 (based on each reaching 125 people with the Gospel). These salvations will be in addition to those recorded by already established Louisiana Baptist congregations.

SBC EC declines transparency motions

INDIANAPOLIS -Leading up to the 2024 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting, the **Executive Committee** declined to act on two motions that called for enhanced transparency in the financial reports provided by Southern Baptist entities.

Presented by messengers during the 2023 SBC Annual Meeting in

New Orleans, the motions would have required Convention entities to provide Southern Baptists with detailed information about highly compensated individuals -- like other taxexempt organizations that are mandated to submit the Form 990 to the Internal Revenue Service.

The motions would not have required entities to submit Form 990 to the IRS, but only provide the detailed breakout information about executive salaries to Southern Baptists.

Instead of requiring such transparency, the EC urged Convention entities to uphold all current reporting standards and promised to review the Business and Financial Plan "to determine ways to enhance transparency and clarity of reporting to the Convention, and will report its findings and recommendations to the messengers at the 2025 SBC Annual Meeting in Dallas."

Baptisms mark launch of FBC Moss Bluff's second campus

DERIDDER, La. (LBM) – Sensing God's call to plant a church for several years, Bubba Sharpton said it was easy to say "yes" in June 2023 to an invitation to become pastor of a second campus of First Baptist Church, Moss Bluff.

Ten months later, the church's second campus celebrated its first service, March 31, with four baptisms and 420 people packing the congregation's temporary home at the Wooten Theater in DeRidder.

'We were overwhelmed and humbled at the tangible joy and excitement experienced by all who were able to join us," Sharpton told the *Baptist Message*. "God exceeded our ex-

pectations and moved in a powerful way through baptism, song, and the sharing of the Word."

BACKGROUND

In 2020, Sharpton was enjoying a career in the chemical plant industry when he and his wife,

Brandi, who were both members of FBCMB at the time, sensed that God wanted them to get their finances in order. As the couple began to pay down their home mortgage. FBCMB staff conducted a survey on the church's health and readiness to take the "next step" in following God. Compiling the inputs, a plan emerged to plant a second campus in DeRidder.

By early 2023, FBCMB Pastor Bryan Carter believed Sharpton was the man to lead the church's north campus. Sharpton became a staff member of the church, completed North American Mission Board church planting assessment and assembled a core team of 26 members and a launch team of 75 members of FBCMB.

Together they began to pray and dream about how God could use them to reach DeRidder.

After meeting in small groups and for worship services throughout March 2024, the first official service finally took place on Easter Sunday.

Carter said this has

been a time of faith-building for the FBCMB congregation.
