# GBO helps Goodwood Community Church reach young families

BATON ROUGE, La. (LBM) – Casey Williamson was at a spiritual crossroads in early 2023.

A former professional baseball player, Williamson had hung up his glove and spikes to serve with Campus Outreach, which hosts student ministries

on more than 100 campuses in 10 countries. As the years passed, Williamson and his wife, Jill, saw fruit at Louisiana State University, Southeastern Louisiana and University of Louisiana at Lafayette but had gotten to a point where their passion had grown more to minister to students who had graduated and now had families

of their own.Williamson knew he had been called to be a pastor and that God had him there to prepare for this next step.

After a season of prayer, Williamson and the other leaders of the sending church, Christ Covenant Church in Baton Rouge. were approached by Trinity Baptist Church in the city with an offer to

donate their facility while its congregation remained in the building for weekly worship. The aging congregation had dwindled in worship attendance (from 60 in 2019 to 20 in 2023) and sought the Lord to use another church to reach the community for Christ.

After a series of conversations with the leadership of Trinity, Williamson

believed this was where God was moving. On May 5, 2024, Goodwood Community Church was born.

"We exist to be a city on the hill and be salt and light to let our community know there's something special happening here," Williamson told the Baptist Message. "God has

# SCOTUS rulings, other court cases

WASHINGTON (LBM) – The U.S. Supreme Court recessed from its 2024-2025 term on June 26, having voted on 58 cases, decided another nine without ballots, and moved two to the 2025-26 term (which begins October 6) with a number addressing public policies that touch the homes, workplaces and ministries of Louisiana Baptists.

### **VULNERABLE CHILDREN**

In United States v. Skrmetti, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld a 2023 Tennessee ban against "performing on a minor or administering to a minor a medical procedure if the performance or administration of the procedure is for the purpose of enabling a minor to identify with, or live as, a purported identity inconsistent with the minor's sex.'

# 2025 Q2: Send Network La. yields 190 decisions, 115 baptisms

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) - Send Network Louisiana churches celebrated a Gospel harvest to start the new year, producing 190 decisions for Christ and 115 baptisms by 44 church plants from

April to June.

Additionally, the Louisiana Baptist church plants reported 6,959 Gospel conversations and an average of 72 in weekly worship attendance, according to a recent second quarter report by Send Network Louisiana. Since

# Georgia Barnette equips **Toledo Bend ministry to** be fishers of men

ZWOLLE, La. (LBM) -Mary Gore has seen many souls added to the Kingdom during 32 years of "fishing for men" as director of the Toledo Bend Resort Ministry.

With the help of staff and hundreds of volunteers, the Gospel has been shared at more than 30 parks, marinas and lowincome housing projects through worship services, block parties, fishing tournaments and area fairs.

HARVESTS REAPED This year, the ministry has reaped Gospel fruit because of multiple outreach events:

-- During Easter weekend, volunteers from 15 churches shared Christ's love during a block party attended by 250 people at Wildwood Resort in Zwolle and 128 at a worship service held during the block party that Satur-

day morning. There were also 30 people who attended the ministry's first Easter Sunrise service the next morning on the pier at Wildwood Resort.

-- In May, eight people made decisions to follow Jesus through a children's fishing tournament at San Miguel State Park in Zwolle.

-- In July, a team from First Baptist Church, Cotton Valley, Texas, saw three people indicate a need to come to Christ during a Backyard Bible Club held at several apartment buildings in Zwolle.

- Also in July, a team from First Baptist Church, Spurger, Texas, coordinated a backyard Bible club at an apartment complex in Zwolle and conducted a Vacation Bible School with Middle Creek Baptist Church in Florien.

-- In August, the ministry took part in a back-

to-school rally at Many Elementary School and volunteers gave 175 students from across Sabine Parish the opportunity to receive some of the physical supplies they will need for a successful school year. Additionally, these students with their 84 family members in attendance were shown love, support and encouragement by more than 40 volunteers from multiple churches and community organizations from Sabine Parish and beyond.

"This been one of best years for God to allow us to see results," Gore told the Baptist Message. "Prayers of His people and faithfulness to remind us He is still going to move in response to our obedience. We have planted seeds and been blessed to see His fruit."

The ministry has celebrated several new additions.

In April 2024, the ministry celebrated the opening of a new 4,000-sq.-ft. meeting facility that will allow others to grow in their relationships with Christ and become better equipped to share the Gospel in the area and beyond. The building, which replaced a meeting facility used since it was built in the early 1970's, has provided a more comfortable place for groups to worship, have training events and host small meetings.

Later in the year, the ministry received a grant from the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering that helped purchase a new ministry truck and trailer.

"This has helped us be more recognized," Gore said. "We've even had opportunities to pray with people who stopped us after seeing the truck."

Gore asked for continued prayers as they seek to

impact the lost population in Sabine Parish.

mer of 2026 to assist with Backyard Bible Clubs held in apartment complexes across Sabine parish and to assist smaller membership churches with their Vacation Bible Schools.


"Pray that the Gospel will continue to be shared in a clear and concise manner that is appropriate for children and youth at our

made us to worship Him and be a light that shines far brighter than what our community has seen before. Our prayer and vision is that people from different areas and backgrounds would feel the love of Christ and find answers to questions they are seeking. Our desire is that people would come to Christ who are young and old, and come to a place where they can mature in the faith and then impact others."

Since the church began with a launch team of 47, attendance for Sunday worship has grown to more than 100 and nine have been baptized, according to Williamson. Moreover, 70 percent of GCC is comprised of families with young children.

Williamson said GCC has found creative ways to become a city on a hill.

Each week, discipleship groups and Bible studies meet throughout Baton Rouge to enhance the opportunity to reach out to neighbors who have a need for Christ.

One church family has hosted a jazz concert in their backyard, leading to one young couple coming to Christ and being baptized. Others have begun to hold home-based Bible studies with their neighbors

Additionally, GCC hosted a men's prayer breakfast, fall festival, an Easter Egg hunt in partnership with the neighborhood property owners' association and recently their first Kids Club drew more than 50 children from the community.

Williamson said he is thankful for the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering, which provided funds to help them add bathroom facilities, install flooring and update the foyer of their facility.

"We, at Goodwood Community Church, are so very grateful to the churches in our state that give through the GBO," he said. "They are helping advance the kingdom of God and facilitate the preaching of the Gospel in our area of the state and beyond."

The Court's ruling will impact 25 other states with similar statutes, including Louisiana whose lawmakers overrode a veto, by then-Governor John Bel Edwards, to make HB648 a law (Act 466). This 2023 legislation, authored by Rep. Gabe Firment, a deacon with the First Baptist Church, Pollock, prohibits 'procedures to alter the sex of a minor child" and was largely influenced by the 2022 Louisiana Baptist Convention RESOLUTION 2: ON PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM THE PERMANENT PHYSICAL HARM OF SEX CHANGE SURGERIES AND DRUGS.

### **PARENTAL RIGHTS**

In 2023, after receiving an overwhelming number of "opt-out" petitions, Montgomery County Public Schools in Maryland rescinded a 2022 policy that allowed parents to request that their children be excused from elementary-school English lessons that included storybook readings about LGBT characters. MCPS said it could no longer accommodate "the growing number of opt out requests" because they resulted in "unsustainably high numbers of absent students." Parents argued that the materials impinged upon their right "to direct

the religious upbringing of their children" because the lessons undermined the religious beliefs they wished to instill in their children.

The matter landed with the U.S. Supreme Court in Mahmoud v. Taylor, with the Court ruling 6-3 to grant an injunction "prohibiting the School Board from forcing [their] children and other students over the objection of their parents—to read, listen to, or discuss" the storybooks.

This ruling reinforces the parental rights embedded in Louisiana Act 680 (2024), championed by Rep. Raymond Crews, a member with First Baptist Church, Bossier City, which requires school employees to "use the name for a student listed on his birth certificate, or a derivative thereof, unless granted written permission by parents to do otherwise."

Both the ruling in Mahmoud v. Taylor and the provisions of Act 680 (2024) support the primary emphasis in LBC 2023 RESO-LUTION 1: ON PARENTAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSI-BILITIES that urges enactment of laws and public policies that "uphold parents' rights and responsibilities for their child, particularly with regard to teaching fundamental Christian concepts about the human condition and human sexuality."

### **PRO-LIFE CULTURE**

In Medina v. Planned

Parenthood South Atlantic the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 6-3 that South Carolina can deny Planned Parenthood from receiving healthcare funds for non-abortion procedures. South Carolina had taken the position that giving funds to Planned Parenthood for any service effectively subsidizes its abortion services and consequently denied funds to the largest provider of abortions in the nation.

Louisiana has been engaged in litigation since 2016 to remove Planned Parenthood from participating as a healthcare provider (non-abortion services) in the state's Medicaid program based on Act 304 (2016), authored by then-Rep. Frank Hoffman, a member with the First Baptist Church in West Monroe. A year earlier, Louisiana Baptists had passed **RESOLUTION 3: ON** DEFUNDING PLANNED PARENTHOOD which called for the state legislature "to defund Planned Parenthood ... of any and all state monies."

After the SCOTUS ruling in Median v. Planned Parenthood South Atlantic, Planned Parenthood announced that it would be closing its two remaining clinics in our state.

### **CHILDREN'S INNOCENCE**

In Free Speech Coalition, Inc. v. Paxton, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld a Texas law that required age verification before patrons could access pornography websites. In 2023, Texas enacted a statute via House Bill 1181, that required websites with sexually explicit materials to use "reasonable age verification methods' to ensure that persons seeking access are 18 or older. Porn distributors sued almost immediately to stop the law.

By a vote of 6-3, the justices determined that the Texas law is constitutional, declaring that the "power to require age verification is within a state's authority to prevent children from accessing sexually explicit content."

Although the Texas statute was challenged by Free Speech Coalition, Inc. v. Paxton, Louisiana led the nation in passing an age verification statute in 2022 when HB142 was signed into law as Act 440, allowing Louisiana parents to sue porn distributors if a child is exposed to adult content and the company did not use available technology to deny minors access.

In 2015, Louisiana Baptists passed the resolution

"On Protecting Children from Pornography." Since then, they have helped (via the LBC Office of Public Policy) to pass HCR 100 (2017) declaring the proliferation of pornography a health hazard; SCR 56 (2019) which established a state task force to develop bills to protect children from pornography; and Act 440 (2022) which requires age verification by porn sites.

When Act 440 went into effect on Jan. 1, 2023, PornHub (the world's largest porn site) posted the following warning on its landing page: "Louisiana now requires us to put in place a process for verifying the age of users who connect to our site from Louisiana. The privacy and security of the PornHub community is our priority, and we thank you for your cooperation.'

According to Politico. com, since Act 440 became active on the first day of 2023, traffic to PornHub's website from Louisiana has dropped 80 percent.

### **OTHER CASES**

-- In United States v. Shilling, the Supreme Court issued a May 6 stay against a March 31 order

by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals which prevented the military from moving forward with a policy of banning transgender members in the armed forces. The latest legal decision effectively allows the Department of Defense to discharge transgender individuals while legal challenges continue.

In 2016 Louisiana Baptists adopted RES-**OLUTION 5: AGAINST** THE SEXUAL POLITICS **OF TRANSGENDERISM** which celebrated God's creation of "male and female (Gen. 1:26-27) and condemned the "attempt to re-engineer basic concepts of sexual identity, man and woman, which are key constructs of the social notions of family and home.'

-- The state of Wisconsin denied tax exemptions to a religious group, concluding that its charitable work with the poor was not "religious enough" because it didn't exclusively serve the group's denomination or actively proselytize. However, in the lawsuit that followed, Catholic Charities Bureau, Inc. v. Wisconsin Labor & **Industry Review Commis-** sion, the Supreme Court declared that Wisconsin had violated the First Amendment's protection for religious freedom.

Since 2015, Louisiana Baptists, with the adoption of RESOLUTION 3: ON PROTECTING RE-LIGIOUS LIBERTY, have actively advocated for state and federal laws which protect freedom of "speech and religion" and called on Christians to "exercise their religious beliefs ... in all areas of life, not just their houses of worship.'

-- Finally, in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, Tyler Division, the National Religious Broadcasters and two Texas congregations (Sand Springs Church, Athens, and First Baptist Church Wascom - both listed as Southern Baptist on SBC.net) succeeded in overturning the 1954 Johnson Amendment to the U.S. Tax Code that prohibited all 501(c)(3) non-profits from endorsing or opposing political candidates. The IRS announced, July 7, that moving forward a "house of worship" may speak to congregants "in connection with religious services' about "electoral politics viewed through the lens of religious faith" - and it would be viewed the same as a "family discussion concerning candidates."

Louisiana Baptists have not adopted a consensus statement specifically about the Johnson Amendment restrictions but have consistently stated that Christians should apply the Bible in all spheres of and this would include the voting booth.



# Brazil: 700 saved, 75th chapel constructed

BELO HORIZONTE, Brazil (LBM) – A Louisiana Baptist-led mission team which ministered in Brazil witnessed more than 700 people turn to Christ and celebrated the fulfillment of Wayne Jenkins' dream to construct 75 church facilities in the country.

Jenkins, who had led 34 mission trips to Brazil, died of cancer on Nov. 13, 2018, having catalyzed the effort to build 68 chapels. Prior to his death he served as the director of evangelism for Louisiana Baptists and co-founded Beyond the Walls, the Louisiana-based ministry that continues to serve in Brazil.

In 2019, his son-in-law, David Denton, picked up the baton and began leading this overseas emphasis.

The theme for this year was God's faithfulness," Denton, senior pastor with Highland Baptist

Church, New Iberia, told the Baptist Message. "We were eyewitnesses of God's faithfulness to work through His people but also in His people."

'This trip was not just about reaching a goal," he continued. "It was about the treasure of the Gospel in jars of clay. We heard testimonies of what God was doing in people's lives to bring healing and to further them along in their walk with the Lord."

#### **GOSPEL HARVEST**

Sixty-nine members of a Louisiana Baptist-led mission team from Florida, Louisiana, Michigan, North Carolina, Texas and Utah saw a harvest of 700 Brazilians, July 11-22.

While there, they split into 14 ministry teams and participated in personal

January, these newly formed congregations have seen 341 come to Christ and baptized 183 new converts.

Send Network Louisiana Director Lane
Corley said the work
would not be possible
without Louisiana
Baptist churches who
contribute to the Cooperative Program, Annie Armstrong Easter
Offering 'and Georgia
Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering.

"Baptisms doubled in church plants this quarter from quarter one," he said. "Church planting is evangelism that leads to a new congregation. It's great to see churches starting through healthy evangelistic growth."

#### **GOSPEL VISION**

The Send Network Louisiana partnership between Louisiana
Baptists and the North
American Mission
Board, which went into
effect Aug. 1, 2023, has
helped the state further
its God-sized vision to
see His Kingdom expanded in Louisiana by
one percent over the
next decade.

Researchers estimate that 62 percent of approximately 4.6 million of Louisiana's citizens are lost (about 2.85 million). If this church planting and soul winning initiative is successful in the state, 28,875 new believers will be added to the Kingdom through 231 new churches planted in the state by 2033 (based on each new church reaching 125 unbelievers with the Gospel). These salvations will be in addition to those recorded by already established

Louisiana Baptist congregations.

Since the partner-ship began, the new church plants that currently receive Cooperative Program funding through the North American Mission Board and Louisiana Baptist missions and ministries team, have reported, collectively: 1,221 salvation decisions, 793 baptisms and more than 22,089 Gospel conversations.

### KINGDOM DEVELOPMENTS

In the second quarter, four new church planters and one church planting apprentice were added to the force of church planters on the field. They are working on church planting and replanting efforts in New Orleans, Kenner,

Mandeville, Lafayette and Shreveport.

Additionally, 41 church planting candidates are in the church planting pipeline, Corley said. Potential church planters and replanters start out with an application process with the North American Mission Board. After being thoroughly vetted through biblical qualifications of a pastor and by the Baptist Faith and Message 2000, the candidates move to an assessment process, which affirms their unique ability to take on the role of planting and replant-



evangelism visits, drama ministry, construction of two church buildings, compassion ministry that included food distribution, and street evangelism ministry.

#### IN THEIR WORDS

Craig Beeman, pastor with First Baptist Church,

Winnsboro, participated in his fourth mission trip to Brazil and third with Beyond the Walls. His wife, Susanne, and son, Joshua, taught Vacation Bible School while Beeman shared the Gospel in homes.

During one home visit, Beeman and one of his members, Neire, shared Jesus with a woman. This was the only day that the other translator, Natalia, was unable to accompany the team, so Neire stepped in to fill the role.

Not only did the woman turn to Christ but Neire was able to use her experience working with autistic children to communicate with the woman's son who has this condition.

Out of all the days that we visited this lady and of all the days that Natália was unable to be with me, Neire was with me," Beeman recalled. "She was just the person we needed. I also found out later that she had been beaten three times by autistic children. She was a little cautious but felt that this child's mother needed to know Jesus, and so she took him to be with his brother and to play with him while I shared. God knew I needed Neire that day. He knew I would encounter that family that day. He had a plan long before I got off

the plane of what He was going to do on that day. All I had to do was join Him in His work.



ed to open our mouths."

# EVANGELISM 101 (Part 8): A trauma-informed church will win souls

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a pair of articles about how to share the Gospel with people who have experienced trauma.

**NEW ORLEANS (LBM)** -- Obedience to the Great Commission requires churches to be ready for the complex realities of ministry, including the kinds of situations where trauma has fractured trust, distorted identity, and left people wary of both God and others.

Preparation for these situations is the focus of a new field known as trauma-informed evangelism, which equips believers with strategies to respond with grace, truth, and intentional relationships, as they invite those who have experienced trauma to find healing in Christ through spiritual formation, conversion, and discipleship.

### **COMMON SCENARIOS**

It's Wednesday night,

and a 9-year-old first-time guest hits another child in line for snacks. You're told he has "anger issues." Will you let him return next Wednesday?

A new visitor to your women's group won't make eye contact during the Bible lesson on forgiveness. Will anyone notice her detachment, or will they dismiss her as being introverted?

A teenage boy in the youth group constantly jokes, derails conversations, and never opens up. Will you lash out in annoyance at his constant humor or attribute it to immaturity?

A woman walks into your church for the first time after leaving an abusive partner. She doesn't sit during the service—she stands near the back, ready to flee if anyone raises a voice. Will any of the women welcome her, or will everyone eye her suspiciously?

#### TRAUMATIZED TO TRUSTING

Sadly, these kinds of behaviors could be signs of

Evidence reveals that in the U.S. 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys will be sexually victimized by their 18th birthdays. Meanwhile, according to research from Tulane University, 200,000 adults experienced domestic violence in Louisiana in 2023. In both cases, victims face betrayal that forces them into isolation.

According to the Scripture, God has hardwired us for relationships. Consequently, betrayal in relationships can cause immense pain and resistance to trusting others.

Importantly, because of our relational nature, healing does not happen in isolation.

Indeed, the early church modeled habitual biblical community, leading the writer to the Hebrews to remind his readers not to forsake the gathering of the saints (Acts 2:42-25; Heb. 10:24-25).

If done right, trauma-informed evangelism expresses the Gospel as an

invitation into a healing community and challenges the church to cultivate what Rosaria Butterfield calls "radically ordinary hospitality," yet explicitly evangelistic. In her book, The Gospel Comes with a House Key, she writes, "Radically ordinary hospitality is this: using your Christian home in a daily way that seeks to make strangers neighbors, and neighbors family of God."

You've heard the old axiom, "People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care." Trauma-informed soul-winning counseling begins with being "swift to hear, slow to speak" (James 1:19) so that everyone, even those persons who have withdrawn into the darkest, most wounded places, can hear the Gospel and experience "the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes" (Romans

At its core, trauma-informed evangelism sees biblical truth confirmed

in modern neuroscience research. However, while many modern ideologies create victims that the church needs to be ready to receive, trauma-informed evangelism does not adapt the Gospel to the culture. Instead, it calls the church to embrace the timeless truths of God's design to help victims of culture find healing as members of God's family.

In the second article on trauma-informed care, I will share specific steps a counselor and a congregation must take to be ready to respond when traumatized individuals step forward in worship, Bible study, times of ministry, or evangelistic

outreach.

# LBC VBS: Gospel conversations, baptisms

ALEXANRIA, La. (LBM) - Several Louisiana Baptist churches celebrated baptisms during Vacation Bible School, the single-largest evangelistic outreach event of the year for most churches.

"Vacation Bible School has changed in many ways over the years," Louisi-ana Baptist Children's Ministry Strategist David Anderson told the Baptist Message. "However, several things have remained the same.

'The Gospel message and emphasis on the Bible has not changed. The unifying effort of the entire church being involved has not changed," he said. "And the need of children to encounter the real Jesus has not changed. VBS continues to be the largest evangelistic effort of our churches, year in and year

"Lifeway published a recent book called "Is It Worth It" and it lays out how VBS, not matter what a church calls it, still works in today's world," he continued. "I am so proud of our churches and

their commitment to reach children and their families. It has been a great year for Vacation Bible School, and we are already planning for next year."

His Church in Pineville celebrated its VBS with a baptismal service, June 6, of 11 children who made decisions for Christ.

Pastor Steve Speer said VBS ended on a high note in a year that has been marked with 82 baptisms, including 33 at Pineville's Buhlow Lake in May.

"It really put a nice touch on Vacation Bible School," Speer said. "The kids were able to acknowledge their big step in their faith before so many families and friends."

Jackson Cavanaugh was among those baptized after accepting Christ earlier in the week.

"I was just sitting in class, and I felt like Jesus was talking to me," he said. "I really wanted to make sure, so I went to ask some questions. Then when I got back to the room, I just knew Jesus wanted me to say 'Yes' to Him."

His mother, Teri Mayeux, was overcome with emotions.

"I was both surprised and overjoyed to hear that Jackson felt such a deep conviction, so much that he immediately raised his hand, eager to speak with Brother Steve and (his son) Austin (associate pastor), she said. "Soon after, he went back to pray and invited Jesus into his heart."

**Elwood Baptist Church** in Forest Hill celebrated decisions made during VBS with six baptisms on July 27. Another six are scheduled to be baptized in the coming weeks.

Pastor Mike Evans said prayer played a key role in the decisions among the 120 children who attended VBS, July 10-14.

"For all those hours we prayed and then worked on VBS, it's great to see decisions made," Evans said. "VBS is the best evangelistic tool that we have and amid the noise that happens we turn it to God's hands to stir in the hearts of those who come."

Jefferson Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, also saw an increase in attendance and decisions for Christ.

Children's Minister Taylor Nelson shared that 276 children and 212 volunteers turned out, compared to 261 children and 178 volunteers in 2024. Additionally, 30 children made decisions for Christ.

"We magnified the bigness of God at Jefferson this week thanks to our amazing families and supporters," Nelson said.

Leaders with First Baptist Church, Pineville, shared that 123 children and 125 volunteers came to VBS, and that six children turned to Christ during VBS and another made the commitment afterwards.

'First Baptist Church had an incredible week of VBS as we Magnified God and zoomed into what Scriptures says about Jesus," said Kimberly Aguillard, who leads the FBCP children's ministry. "We had the opportunity to share the Gospel with our kids and as a result we had six salvations. This is what VBS is all about - leading boys and girls to Jesus and helping other kids to deepen their walk with the Lord."

Baptist entities.



Billy Joe Pierce was welcomed into the arms of Jesus on Thursday, July 10, 2025, after a lengthy illness. Services were held Cypress Baptist Church, July 15, 2025

at 11a.m. Dr. Gene Henderson will officiate and Pastor John Fream assisting. Tommy Patton and Philip Wade will provide music. It would be hard to overstate the impact this one man's life had on the many he encountered in his ministry. Whether through his preaching, his support during both the joyous and tragic events of those who knew him, or his volunteer work, Billy was "always there" when needed. Everyone who knew him has a personal "Brother Billy" story. Pierce was born October 6, 1934, in Mississippi, the only child of William Oliver (WO) and Tommie Irene Pierce. He grew up in Mississippi where he was saved as a young man. He later attended Clark College where he met his future wife, Tommie June Lee, then on to Mississippi College, and finally New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. After pastorates in several Baptist churches in Mississippi, Billy moved to Bossier City, Louisiana in 1968 as Assistant Pastor for First Baptist Church of Bossier City where he worked closely with Damon Vaughn who led him to the Lord. He served 15 churches in the Bossier and Shreveport area including Ford Park Baptist, Barksdale Baptist, First Baptist Haughton, First Baptist Doyline and First Baptist Bossier for a second time.
