


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# Record crowd shines at annual Champions Camp

WOODWORTH, La. (LBM) – The Champions Camp for individuals with special needs recorded its largest attendance ever, drawing 91 campers and their buddies for a weekend of activities tailored to them.

The Louisiana Baptist summer camp for people with special needs matched participants with buddies who accompanied them during the event. The camp, whose previous record attendance was 50 set in 2024, featured karaoke, snow cones, ice cream party, fishing, games, bazooka ball, crafts, disco party and worship designed for children and adults from ages 8 and up who have intellectual or development

PRAIRIEVILLE, La. (LBM) – Kirk Jones, pastor of Fellowship Church, Prairieville, will be nominated for the office of Louisiana Baptist Convention president during the 2025 annual meeting of church messengers.

Bill Dye, pastor of North Monroe Baptist Church, shared with the Baptist Message, Sept. 10, his intention to make the nomination.

The yearly gathering of Louisiana Baptists is scheduled to be held in the facilities of the Randolph

# GBO advances the Gospel through ESL ministry

AVONDALE, La. (LBM)

– The opportunity to share Christ with the world has come to Louisiana Baptist churches through English

as a Second Language classes.

"The purpose of all

literacy missions ministries is to intentionally share the Gospel as God uses church volunteers to meet literacy needs," Brown told the Baptist Message. "ESL allows church volunteers to incorporate the Bible into every aspect of their classes.

"Prayer is a priority inside and outside of the classes, and the Gospel is also shared, no matter what the students' religious backgrounds are,'

she continued. "Anyone can participate in this ministry because a person doesn't have to speak another language to teach someone how to speak English."

#### FBCA, NOBTS CONNECT

Each Monday evening at First Baptist Church, Avondale, three to four lead teachers and three assistants, including New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College students, teach ESL classes to between 10 and 40 students from as many as eight nationalities, church ministry team leaders said.

Marc Daniels, pastor with FBC Avondale, realized while canvassing the surrounding neighborhood in 2023 that a large Vietnamese population lived near the church. Realizing the need to reach them and a growing Hispanic population, Daniels then consulted with missionary friends who determined starting an ESL ministry

was a good outreach tool.

After receiving training from Brown, the first semester began in August

Since then, the church has seen four of the students and even some of their family members begin attending worship and Bible study.

Daniels is grateful for the dedication of his members and the NOBTS and Leavell College students. Money from the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering provides funding for the students to travel and teach every Monday evening.

Brown added that the GBO allows her to travel across the state to train churches -- at no cost to them -- and recruit volunteers to start local ESL ministries.

"It also allows some NOBTS and Leavell College students to come

alongside some churches in the New Orleans area to teach English to Haitian Creole speakers and Spanish speakers, and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with them," she said. "It's a win-win for our churches, for the ESL students and for the seminary students. For this, I'm very grateful and appreciative of the GBO. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists.'

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

"It touches my heart," she said. "I've always wanted him to be involved in something like this. So, when we heard about this of course I signed him up because it's very exciting for them to come and do

something like this. It's all about them this weekend and I like that."

Jonathan Paul, Zimmerman's buddy and a member with His Church, Pineville, enjoyed spending some time with the campers.

"I always enjoy spending time with him and this kind of atmosphere gives me the chance to get to know him better," Paul said. "And it's just an enjoyable weekend of being around so many other campers who are getting to have the focus all on them."

Allison Winegeart, who attended her third Champions Camp, enjoyed the times of worship the most.

"You can act the way you want to act, and nobody judges you," she said.

The idea for Champions Camp was born after a similar experience at a camp coordinated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma that Louisiana Baptist Children's Ministry Strategist David Anderson and his family, including his daughter, Chloe, attended for more than 10 years. Anderson wanted to bring that same camp experience to Louisiana.

Since Champions Camp began, Anderson has seen so many special needs individuals experience camp for the first time.

"This is the greatest camp ever," said Anderson, who also serves as the camp director. "These campers get to come and just be themselves. No other place in the world do they get to just be them for a few days in a camp setting. They always have to live by rules. Here, they get to be who they are, and we love that."

#### STATEMENT OF SUPPORT

Dye commended Jones' character he has witnessed during the 15 years he has known him.

"I've watched him lead his church through a variety of challenges," Dye told the Baptist Message. "Kirk is a visionary leader with character. He not only wants to do the right thing; he wants to do things the right way. And God has blessed that."

He referenced the growth of Fellowship Church, which has grown from a few people who met in Jones' living room in 2001 to a campus of more than 1,400 with 112 baptisms in 2025.

"I know that numbers don't always tell you what's going on in a church," Dye said. "The movement of the Spirit is more than buildings, bodies, and budgets. Some of our members have moved to the Baton Rouge area and become members of Fellowship, and they are quick to tell me that something special is happening there. The Spirit is evident in the way people love each other and serve their community. Lives are being

"Kirk's a Louisiana guy through and through," he continued. "He has a deep love for his family and the respect, not only of the Baton Rouge community, but also the northeast Louisiana community. I think he'll bring some refreshing new insights to the LBC while at the same time carrying a deep respect for who Louisiana Baptists are and what they have always been about."

#### BY THE NUMBERS

The database of the Annual Church Profile shows that Fellowship Church gave 5.86 percent of its undesignated gifts through the Cooperative Program to support cooperative missions and ministries this year, amounting to \$139,602 from undesignated receipts of \$2,382,256.

Fellowship Church averaged 1,461 in Sunday wor-

ship service and baptized 115 new believers this year.

#### **CANDIDATE'S RESPONSE**

Jones told the *Baptist Message* he was honored to be nominated.

"I was approached this summer by a couple of pastors in our state asking if I would be willing to serve in this role," he said. "Through prayer and conversation with my wife and the leadership of Fellowship, I thought it was a role that the Lord might desire to use me in.

"I love the Cooperative Program and the impact

that our convention (local, state and national) has had through the years," he continued. "The church I lead was a church plant that was supported and funded through Baptist churches and the Cooperative Program. I love our history, Gospel impact and bright potential as a convention. I feel there are some things we need to work to change in how we cooperate to maximize our capacity. I think many of the things that I would hope to see be strengthened in our convention are points of focus of our current leadership. If the Lord can use me to

support them well in this, I would consider it a great honor."


Jones is a native of Ruston and has served in the ministry since 1993.

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# **EVANGELISM 101 (Part 9): Trusting God when trauma is revealed**

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a pair of articles about how to share the Gospel with people who have experienced trauma.

NEW ORLEANS (LBM) -Trauma-informed evangelism recognizes that behind many Gospel conversations lies a story of pain — and calls the messenger to respond not with pressure, but with patience, presence, and Spirit-led compassion.

Imagine two friends at a coffee shop. One, a slightly nervous Christian, has just lovingly shared the Good News. The other hesitates, eyes brimming: "I want to believe this is true... I really do. But I've been hurt so badly. Every time I've trusted someone-even Christiansit ended up breaking me.'

#### **DISCERN THE MOMENT**

In evangelism, we are laborers in God's harvest field (Luke 10:2), working alongside the Holy Spirit, whose unseen movement brings new birth (John 3:8). When trauma surfaces alongside a longing for peace, trauma-informed evangelism calls for discernment, pastoral sensitivity, and a non-intrusive presence—one that listens more than instructs, and invites rather than insists.

In our urgency to call people to repentance and faith in Christ, we must labor alongside the Holy Spirit to nurture genuine responses. Nurturing a trauma survivor toward salvation means using Scripture to reframe the Gospel as a message of both rescue and restoration; being sensitive to signs that trauma may have been triggered; and distinguishing between the faith decision to trust Christ and the longer journey of healing that follows.

### REFRAME THE CONVERSATION

In trauma-informed evangelism, the messenger listens with compassion, identifies core wounds or fears, and thoughtfully uses Scripture to reframe the conversation—showing how Jesus enters those very places with healing, truth, and saving grace. These passages serve as

bridges—connecting the deep Louisiana Baptist Message wounds in a person's life with the healing truth of Christ.

> -- Isaiah 53:4a "Surely, He [the Suffering Servant -- Jesus] has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows." Jesus enters the pain of trauma survivors, bearing what they were never meant to carry alone.

-- Isaiah 61:1-3 declares that God heals the brokenhearted, gives liberty to the captive, anoints those who mourn with the oil of joy, and lifts the spirits of those burdened with heaviness. The Savior binds up what has been shattered, and plants hope where despair once grew.

-- Romans 8:1a assures us that there is no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus. The Gospel breaks the cycle of shame, declaring that in Christ, we are no longer defined by what we have done, or what has been done to us -- but by the mercies of God that set us free.

-- Revelation 21:5a "Behold, I make all things new." The invitation to trust in Jesus marks the beginning of restoration — the divine promise that the pain of the past will not have the final word. Jesus makes all things new, including the lives of those who have experienced trauma.

The enemy often uses traumatic memories in a person's heart and mind as a dark fortress where no outsider may tread. However, the Word of God spoken by a loving messenger is the glorious light to reveal the path of life.

#### **DISARM DISRUPTERS**

Be mindful of trauma responses that signal an interruption in the Gospel conversation. These signs include

glazed or distant eyes, freeze responses, sudden agitation, or shifting the topic away from pain or Gospel truths. If the trauma survivor displays any of these, pause the conversation, acknowledge their reaction, and reassure them.

Ask for feedback. Say something like: "You just seemed to look away and appeared disengaged. Did I say something to upset you? If you feel overwhelmed right now, that's okay. We can slow down. Could you please help me understand what you are

feeling right now?

#### **NOW AND LATER**

Individuals who have experienced trauma may struggle to move forward with decisions that involve trust in relationships. Help them understand that God is seeking a relationship with them AND desires to heal them of their trauma. In fact, He is actively pursuing them.

Past betrayal may give them pause, but His movement via the Gospel is the first step in a journey towards healing and wholeness.

Encourage them to make two decisions: commit to faith in Jesus AND seek His healing power.

#### **HAVE RESOURCES READY**

Be prepared to recommend licensed counselors, trauma recovery ministries, or church-based support groups. Have a list of local referrals, such as Christian trauma counselors and ministries like Mending the Soul and Celebrate Recovery.

Above all, surround them with people who will love them back to life—even if they don't fully understand the journey. Presence is more

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) — Louisiana Baptists are invited to submit resolutions for possible consideration by messengers during the 2025 Louisiana Baptist Convention.

The first Committee on Resolutions meeting is scheduled for October 21 and submissions are requested to be sent as early as possible for consideration. Resolutions may be submitted for review and consideration no more than 90 days and no fewer than 15 days prior to the LBC annual meeting, Nov. 11, providing a window of opportunity from Aug. 13 through Oct. 27.

All statements should be typewritten, titled, and dated, and accompanied by a letter – from a church qualified to send a messenger to the annual meeting of the Louisiana Baptist Convention – certifying that the person submitting the resolution is a member in good standing.

powerful than perfection.

For survivors of trauma, the local church is more than a religious group; it is a healing community where corporate worship and biblical fellowship lead to the renewal of the mind and the healing of the spirit.

A trauma survivor may

initially struggle with large group gatherings. But keeping them engaged through small groups can help them pursue Christ and find healing.

#### **FAITHFUL NOT PERFECT**

The beauty of trauma-informed evangelism is that you do not need a degree in theology or counseling to be used by God. Be a witness

who listens well, speaks gently, admits what they don't know, and enters the mess without pretending to fix it.

You are not alone in the moment—God is with you, and He is already at work in the person in front of you. Walk into that conversation with humility, compassion, and courage. Carry the Gospel not only as a message of rescue, but as a ministry of healing. And remember:

Jesus does not need you to be perfect. He calls you to be faithful, honest, and willing to walk beside the broken... all the way to Him.



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# FIRST PERSON -- Geaux25: Calling out 'the called' for Kingdom impact

WOODWORTH, La. (LBC BCM) – On Oct. 3–4, college students from across Louisiana and beyond will converge at Tall Timbers Baptist Assembly for Geaux25, an overnight missions conference designed to awaken hearts and mobilize lives for the Gospel.

Hosted by Louisiana Baptist Collegiate Ministries, this event is more than a gathering – it is a moment of decision, a place of calling and a catalyst for movement. In a world that often encourages young adults to chase comfort, status, or self-fulfillment, Geaux25 offers a countercultural invitation: to surrender fully to Christ and follow Him wherever He leads - whether that's across the street. across campus, or across the globe.

MISSION FIELD IS EVERYWHERE

Today's college students are globally aware, socially engaged and spiritually curious. Many are asking deep questions about purpose and impact.

Geaux25 meets them at that crossroads, offering biblical teaching, practical training and Spirit-led community to help them connect their faith to their future.

But the heartbeat of this conference goes beyond inspiration. It's about calling out "the called" – recognizing that God is still raising up men and women for Gospel ministry in every sphere of life.

#### MARKETPLACE AND MINISTRY: A UNIFIED CALLING

For years, the phrase "called to ministry" has been narrowly interpreted as a call to serve on church staff or as a missionary overseas. While those are vital roles, Geaux25

affirms a broader, biblical vision - that every believer is a missionary, and that God calls people to serve Him both through the church and in the marketplace.

Whether a student is studying education, engineering, business, or biblical studies, they are being equipped for ministry.

Some will be pastors, church planters or missionaries. Others will be teachers, nurses, entrepreneurs, or artists who carry the gospel into places pastors may never go. Both are essential. Both are sacred.

Breakout sessions at Geaux25 will reflect this diversity, covering topics like evangelism on campus, discerning God's call, preparing for short-term missions and living missionally in secular spaces. Students also will hear from leaders who are faithfully living out their calling in both vocational ministry and professional careers.

#### CALLING OUT 'THE CALLED'

One of the most urgent tasks of the church today is to call out those whom God is calling. That means creating environments where students can hear God's voice, be affirmed in their gifts, and be sent with the support of their local church and campus ministry.

Geaux25 is committed to doing just that. Through worship, teaching, and intentional conversations, students will be challenged to consider how God might be calling them to vocational ministry – whether that's preaching, planting, pastoring or pioneering new Gospel work in unreached places.

At the same time, students will be encouraged to see their future careers as platforms for mission. The goal isn't to elevate one calling over another, but to celebrate the full spectrum of how God uses His people to advance

His Kingdom.

# A MOVEMENT BEGINS WITH A MOMENT

For many students, Geaux25 will be a defining moment – a time when they say "yes" to God's call, perhaps for the first time. It may be the moment they surrender their career plans, commit to a summer mission trip or begin exploring a call to ministry leadership.

More than a moment, Geaux25 is about movement -- a movement of students who are bold, surrendered and ready to go wherever God leads.

Because the harvest is still plentiful. The laborers are still few. And the call to "go" still echoes today.

# Louisiana Baptists celebrate 'Children's Baptism Sunday'

Friends, family and other members of the Haughton congregation cheered for each new convert, who made their decisions at either Vacation Bible School, summer camp or the Wednesday night Team Kids discipleship program.

"It was such an exciting day today," Leaonda Palmer, who leads the EBC children's ministry, told the Baptist Message.

"The kids were so excited to tell everyone that Jesus was their Savior. Some of our small group leaders got to be with them before the baptisms and it was so exciting to see them so excited to follow Jesus."

Paxton Lee, 7, began asking about how to turn to Jesus and on April 27 made the decision to follow Him. He was excited to share his good news through baptism, noting that 'it was fun. I liked getting into the water and I just love God.'"

Lee's mother, Aubrey, said that witnessing his baptism "was so amazing as a parent.

"Parenting is hard," she offered. "And it was a little nudge from God that we at least got the most important thing right."

## MADE NEW

EBC was among many churches who participated in the first "Louisiana Baptist Children's Baptism Sunday" that aimed to celebrate decisions made by youngsters during Vacation Bible School, mission and children's camps, sports camps and other events held throughout the year. Additionally, the statewide initiative encouraged churches to become more intentional in following up with children who need to take that next step in their faith journey.

"How exciting it has been to hear reports from several of our churches that participated in Children's Baptism Sunday," Louisiana Baptist Children's Ministry Strategist David Anderson said. "Many churches took this opportunity for intentional follow up and scheduled children, teens and even adults for baptism. Our prayer is that this has sparked a new fervor for follow up."

Anderson, who is a member with First Baptist Church, Pineville, witnessed the baptism of Callie Aguillard, 10, on the special day. He taught her when she was a student in his Sunday school class two years ago.

Aguillard's mother, Kimberly, the FBCP children's minister, said church members like Anderson have been vital in her daughter's decision to follow Jesus.

This was a day that we as parents have prayed for and was long awaited for our girl," she said. "This summer after VBS Callie accepted Jesus as her personal Lord and Savior. We are so thankful for each person that has poured into her and helped her to come to this point in her life. Her baptism and reception to follow was so special. We look forward to watching her grow into the beautiful young lady God has created her to be."

#### **FAMILY CELEBRATION**

Judson Baptist Church originally planned to hold an all-children's baptism service but expanded it to include a church-wide celebration of 20 new spiritual "children" of all ages.

Complete with a packed worship center, post-celebration tailgate party and observance of a member's 100th birthday, the day was a time to reflect on the obedience of following Christ's command to share the Gospel.

"I've been in ministry for over 30 years, and seen people saved through various evangelistic outreaches," JBC Children's and Family Pastor Robbie Isom said. "But it's surreal to see so many of our members lead others to Christ and then see them all together come forward for a big baptism service."

Jamie Jenkins, her husband, Cameron, and their two children, Oakley (10), and Hadley (8), were among those who celebrated their new lives in Christ through baptism during the service. After Cameron's suggestion that they visit the Walker church in May, the family began attending and soon after each of them were convicted of the need for a Savior.

"I felt that chance at change and I took it," Jamie Jenkins said. "I welcomed Christ with a bruised heart that was finally ready to heal. I watched my girls welcome Christ openly and



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# UPDATE: La. Baptist women offer 1,000 giftboxes, God's love to female prisoners

PINEVILLE, La. (LBC) – On Aug. 29, the Louisiana Baptist women's missions and ministry team led women from across the state to pack hygiene giftboxes for those at the Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women. With representatives from 16 Louisiana Baptist associations, the day became a powerful demonstration of cooperation and compassion.

The effort, hosted on the campus of Louisiana Christian University, brought together not only women from every corner of Louisiana but also men - including three associational mission strategists - who joined in the packing. Among the churches who participated were First Baptist Church, Gonzales, which brought donated supplies from several churches in the Baton Rouge area, and Franklin Avenue Baptist Church, New Orleans. By the close of the packing day, 912 giftboxes had been completed just shy of the 1,000-box goal.

Thankfully, the story does not end there.

In the two weeks following the packing day, churches from around the state continued to bring in additional hygiene kits to the WMM office, pushing the effort over the top.

The 1,000-box goal was the largest in the history of this ministry, doubling what was requested by LCIW last year.

"This prison ministry is a perfect example of how Louisiana Baptists can accomplish a seemingly impossible task when we cooperate," said Christine Gill, Louisiana Baptist women's missions and ministry strategist.


In total, Louisiana Baptist Women successfully packed and collected 1,004 hygiene giftboxes. The boxes will be distributed, Oct. 9, at the new LCIW prison facility in St. Gabriel, where incarcerated women will receive them as tangible reminders of God's love and care.

"We reached this goal because of two things our churches working together in cooperation and the generous support of the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering. Both are essential, and together they make ministry like this possible," emphasized Gill.

# LSU BCM: 16 salvations during 'welcome week'

BATON ROUGE, La. (LBM) – The Louisiana State University Baptist Collegiate Ministry welcomed back students for the fall semester, including 39 who made decisions for Jesus, according to LSU BCM Director Blake Grundy.

"Just like every other campus, ours is in desperate need of the Gospel," he added. "But the encouraging part is that students are actually open and receptive to Gospel conversations. Scripture reminds us that the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. So, we spent the summer praying to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His field (Matthew 9:37-38). We specifically asked Him to raise up students who would boldly step onto campus and share their faith, and we're beginning to see that happen.'



# GBO fuels DR, GOLA VBS and church growth in Morgan City

MORGAN CITY, La. (LBM) – Janice Gray was in her home when she heard a loud noise – a tree falling on her roof in the aftermath of Hurricane Fracine in 2024.

Providentially, her panic was overcome by hope because of an encounter with

Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief teams who cleared the tree.

This act of kindness led her to commit her heart and life to the Lord, and with obedience through baptism on Mother's Day.

"For me, as bad as Francine was, it was actually a blessing in disguise," Gray said in a video posted on the Georgia Barnette

Louisiana Missions Offering website. "I got the help that I needed with that tree, and it brought me back to the church. It gave me a church family that I now know that I needed.

Gray, who now is an active member of First Baptist Church Morgan City, was among 400 people who were assisted through DR efforts over a four-week period.

Tracey Smith, pastor of FBC Morgan City, also sustained some water damage to his home.

Even so, Smith kept a positive attitude and helped others like Gray find hope.

As a certified chaplain, Tracey deployed with Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief to Florida following Hurricane Ian, along with his wife, Marci, who assisted with mud-out efforts. Their service gave the Smith's the opportunity to offer hope amid unspeak-

able destruction. When disaster struck back home in Louisiana, Tracey discovered the yellow-shirted DR volunteers could open previously closed doors in their predominantly Catholic community.

"What we do in disaster relief is all about the Gospel," Smith told the Baptist Message. "Everybody's got a need, but we know the Lord ultimately is going to bring us into contact with someone that He's already been work on."

While DR teams were working on the field, 10 members helped prepare food to fuel volunteers and assisted with laundry duties. Once the teams left, the Morgans kept building relationships with some of the homeowners who they had helped. Consequently, FBCMC worship attendance rose from 60 to 80, with a peak of 110 on Easter Sunday – the first time the church has seen

more than 100 attend any service since Smith began his FBCMC pastorate in 2020.

Smith credits the growth to the church's continued efforts to reach the community.

Not only did they reach out to those impacted by Francine, but they have seen fruit from a Vacation Bible School.

In June, a GOLA team of Louisiana Baptist Collegiate Ministry students helped coordinate the VBS that drew in more than 70 children. Of those, seven indicated a desire to follow Christ.

Smith said he is grateful for the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering, which provided funding for the DR response and the GOLA team to coordinate the VBS.

"I want to thank you in advance for what the Lord

# Sept. 30 diaper drive to celebrate closing of PP facilities

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) Louisiana's largest pro-life advocacy group is celebrating the Sept. 30 closure of the last two Planned Parenthood

facilities in the state (New Orleans and Baton Rouge) by holding a diaper drive to mark the occasion.

The 2022 landmark decision by the U.S. Supreme Court in Dobbs v. Jack-

son Women's Health Organization overturned Roe v. Wade (1973) and returned the issue of abortion back to the states, triggering Louisiana's near total ban on abortion.

Additionally, President Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" (H.R.1), which was passed by Congress this year, now restricts federal funding for Planned Parenthood Federation of America, Inc. or any of its affiliates or clinics for one year.

Consequently, Planned Parenthood has decided to cease operations in Louisiana after 40

'We are thankful that the day has come in our state, that we can celebrate their complete exit," she added.

However, Richard cautioned Louisiana Baptists not to let down their guard.

"Although the brick-andmortar representation of the abortion industry is no longer present in Louisiana, there is still a very vibrant online presence of abortion pill distributors," she warned. "Our

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
